CLASSIC WINNER GUN RUNNER IN GOOD ORDER

reeders in Kentucky will soon **D** get the chance to see "a piece of art," trainer Steve Asmussen said Nov. 5 at Del Mar.

Gun Runner, who defeated Bob Baffert-trained Collected in the Breeders' Cup Classic (G1) to likely sew up Horse of the Year honors, will fly from California to Louisville, Ky., Nov. 6, and then head to Three Chimneys Farm near Lexington for some post-race downtime. He will be available for inspection before he rejoins Asmussen's string at Fair Grounds Race Course & Slots in New Orleans.

While Gun Runner will eventually be retired to stud at Three Chimneys, plans call for the 4-year-old son of Candy Ride to remain in training for the Kentucky operation and co-owner Winchell Thoroughbreds—at least for a start in the Jan. 27 Pegasus World Cup (G1) at Gulfstream Park, a race he missed last year because of an equine herpesvirus outbreak and quarantine at Fair Grounds.

"What's next is celebrating every day from now until they give him the Horse of the Year trophy," Asmussen said. "The horse deserves it. I can't tell you the level of appreciation I have for him. Because very few horses accept the amount of pressure that was applied to him. Especially in the style in which he did it.

"It feels wonderful standing here the day after; the plan came together so well and (we) feel the season has earned him the golden trophy."

Gun Runner emerged well Sunday morning from his 2 1/4-length victory over Collected, and walked the shedrow as Three Chimnevs chairman Goncalo Borges Torrealba stopped by for a visit. The chestnut colt landed his fourth consecutive grade 1 victory Saturday—fifth overall and improved his career earnings to \$8,988,500. He won for the first time going 1 1/4 miles, and

handed 2016 Classic winner Arrogate, who finished fifth, a resounding defeat after finishing behind him twice—including a tough second in the Dubai World Cup (G1) this March.


"It came together," Asmussen said of Gun Runner's Breeders' Cup campaign.
"And on this stage, when you need to be your best, we were our best. ... The Breeders' Cup here at Del Mar, what a wonderful setting. (I was) very much concerned about a different racetrack, a racetrack he hadn't run on—all of those

variables. He accepted them, did his job, and came through like the champion he is. That little bit of

MORNING AFTER CLASSIC, BAFFERT REFLECTS AT DEL MAR

ob Baffert gave the loser speech Nov. 5 at Del Mar. Coffee in hand, blue-tinted sunglasses in place, the white-haired one had everything but a new Breeders' Cup victory to go with his California cool the morning after the World Championships.

"A lot of seconds. But they're better than fifths," he said of his stable's results at the two-day event.

A few stalls down the shedrow in Barn BB. Juddmonte Farms' 2016 Breeders' Cup Classic (G1) winner Arrogate stood alert and bright-eyed at the front of his stall—not off another victory, but off a mediocre fifth behind Gun Runner in this year's edition of the Classic run the night before.

Ranked the World's Best Racehorse after blazing to four straight grade 1 wins from the summer of 2016 to the Dubai World Cup (G1) this March, Arrogate emerged from his attempted Classic defense no worse for the wear. But the spark with which he dazzled en

route to a course-record win in the Travers Stakes (G1), the dominance he showed handing Horse of the Year California Chrome sound defeats in the Classic and Pegasus World Cup Invitational Stakes (G1), and the brilliance with which he overcame Gun Runner in his Dubai World Cup victory, were missing from his final run.

"He didn't have the fire he usually has," the trainer said. "He just went through the motions."

Even before the Classic, plans called for Arrogate's retirement. The 4-year-old son of Unbridled's Song will ship Nov. 6 to Lexington to begin his career at stud. The Breeders' Cup curtain call left his record at 7-1-1 from 11 starts, with earnings of \$17,422,600. In two starts between the Dubai World Cup and the Classic, he was a flat fourth in the TVG San Diego Handicap (G2) and ran second to Collected in the \$1 million TVG Pacific Classic Stakes (G1), both at Del Mar.

"I was worried about bringing him back here (after those losses), but at Santa Anita I thought he was working well enough to do it," Baffert said. "At least he came out of it well. He's sound, he's healthy. It's gotta be mental with him right now. It's a shame now

> he didn't get Horse of the Year last year after winning the Breeders' Cup. But that's the way it goes, I guess."

With 14 Breeders' Cup wins already in the record books, including a 2015 Grand Slam with Triple Crown winner American Pharoah. Baffert does not have much to complain about. But the weight of expectations hangs heavy on Thoroughbreds who dare to gallop boldly into rarefied air, and for those who condition and care for them, the tailing

off of form can be a bittersweet letdown at the end of a career.

"The biggest disappointment, other than not winning one, was the big horse not showing up," Baffert said. "I thought he would show up. I'm not blaming the track or anything. I think it's just him, mentally."

Further down the way from Arrogate's stall, Classic runner-up Collected moved about with restless energy. In Speedway Stable's fiery son of City Zip-who was defeated for the first time this year after running to four consecutive wins, topped by his half-length victory over Arrogate in the Pacific Classic-Baffert found a plucky contender with whom he wants to take on Gun Runner again in the Jan. 27 Pegasus World Cup at Gulfstream Park. The chestnut colt pressed Gun Runner's quick pace throughout in the Breeders' Cup Classic, and finished second by 2 1/4 lengths.

"He just got a little tired there at the end," Baffert said. "For an instant there I thought maybe he was going to put him away, but Gun Runner was just too tough, the great horse that he is."

Gary and Mary West's West Coast, munching calmly on the contents of his hay net Sunday morning, will also be Pegasus-bound. The Flatter colt who won the Travers in August and Pennsylvania Derby (G1) in September—and jumped into deep waters after training from that score to the Classic-made a good account of himself in third.

"West Coast, I thought would be coming late, but I think he wanted to be a little bit closer, too. But I didn't want to have all of them too close..." Baffert reflected. "West Coast definitely is (pointing to the Pegasus). (Owner Gary West) bought a spot, and Collected, we will find a spot. Unfortunately I'm sure that Gun Runner will be there, but stranger things have happened."

Breeders' Cup results decide the fate of runners. Not just year-end championships, but careers are on the line. Longines Kentucky Oaks (G1) winner Abel Tasman—second to Forever Unbridled in the Nov. 3 Longines Breeders' Cup Distaff (G1)—will stay in training for a 4-year-old season, and talk of a potential Pegasus run has been thrown about by her connections since May. Mubtaahij, off the board in the Classic, will also stay in training with Baffert for Sheikh Mohammed bin Khalifa al Maktoum. Meanwhile, Coolmore connections retired grade 1 winner Cupid off a 10th-place run in the Las Vegas Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile (G1), and where fellow Dirt Mile runner Mor Spirit is concerned off an eighth in that race for owner Michael Lund Petersen, "We've gotta figure something out on him, I'm not sure," Baffert said.

Baoma Corporation's Drefong, the champion sprinter of 2016, is another whose performance will be evaluated after a sixth while favored in the TwinSpires Breeders' Cup Sprint (G1). After dropping jockey Mike Smith in the July 29 Bing Crosby Stakes (G1) at Del Mar when he ducked to the chute via which he typically goes back to the barn, the son of Gio Ponti seemed to consider such shenanigans again when he broke from Post 2 in pursuit of his Sprint title defense.

"We're supposed to have a meeting about him, probably in the next week or so," Baffert said. "He's fine. He came over to that gap like he was wanting to try it again, and he lost all momentum.

"My two that I thought I really could win, it just didn't go right. I just didn't get the racing luck, and the big horse just didn't show up for some reason."

While many horsemen jetted straight from the World Championships to Kentucky for the breeding stock sales, Baffert will remain at home in California. He'll get his string in order, and they'll fight another day.

"I'm afraid if I go back there, I'll buy a mare, so I'm going to stay here," he joked with a wry grin. "I didn't make enough (at Breeders' Cup) to buy a horse." BH

Tt's impossible to traverse the barn area of the ▲ Fasig-Tipton November sale without feeling a sense of awe with the broodmares, racehorses, and well-bred weanlings that will be offered during the Nov. 6 sale near Lexington that begins at 4 p.m. ET.

Included among the 203 horses in the regular and supplemental catalogs are three champions, 21 grade 1 winners or producers, 53 graded stakes winners, and foals from the first crop of Triple Crown winner American Pharoah. As of early Nov. 5, there had been more than 50 head withdrawn from the sale.

"Nearly 80% of the racing/broodmare prospects and broodmares cataloged are black-type earners or producers," Fasig-Tipton president Boyd Browning

said. "We're obviously thrilled with the quality of the catalog and think it's one of the finest collections of horses we've had the opportunity to present to the marketplace. The marketplace craves quality and we certainly have quality on offer this November."

The Fasig-Tipton sale last year saw 88 horses sold for gross receipts of \$54,152,000, an average price of \$615,364 and a median of \$377,500. The 2016 saletopper was the Distorted Humor mare Baffled, in foal to leading sire Tapit, purchased by Bridlewood Farm and Don Alberto Corp. for \$3.5 million.

Highlighting this year's catalog is Songbird, the 4-year-old daughter of Medaglia d'Oro who won 13 of 15 career starts, including nine grade 1 races, and finished second in the other two outings. A champion at ages 2 and 3, Songbird earned more than \$4.6 million for Rick Porter's Fox Hill Farm.

"Rick Porter is a seller; he's not in the breeding game," said Mark Taylor of Taylor Made Sales Agency, which consigned and is heavily promoting the filly. "He's dabbled in it a few times and that's just not his thing. He has one of the most successful racing stables in the country but he's not somebody that wants to breed foals and wait for them to get to the races. It's tough to part with them. ... She's going to be on the market and it's going to be a very fair reserve and we're going to see what anybody wants to pay for one of the best race mares of all time."

Taylor Made is marketing Songbird in a campaign called "Soar With Songbird" that includes a book-size video player distributed to buyers and a giant wooden display built by Studio 34 Productions that is in a prominent location near Barn 2.

Taylor said the agency has long marketed some of its outstanding sale offerings as individuals rather than part of the bigger consignment as a way of showcasing the horse's accomplishments.

"The goal is not to over-promote, but to celebrate the horse," Taylor said, noting that Porter and Fox Hill's Victoria Keith were supportive of the campaign.

"When you own a horse like Songbird, it's not that the marketing is necessarily going to inflate her price, but you want her to have a proper tribute going out the door."

Although Songbird is the highest profiled champion in the catalog, the other champions on offer are Tepin, the \$4.4 million earner in foal to Curlin consigned as Hip 130 by ELiTE, as agent for Robert Masterson; and Finest City, a 5-year-old daughter of City Zip who was voted champion female sprinter for 2016 after winning the Breeders' Cup Filly and Mare Sprint (G1), consigned as Hip 171. Catch a Glimpse, who earned more than \$1.8 million and won the 2015 Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies Turf (G1T) to notch Canadian Horse of the Year honors, is also being offered.

Included among the other grade 1 winners cataloged are Big World, Birdatthewire, Dacita, Illuminant, Miss Temple City, and Nickname, among others. Also entered in the sale is grade 1-placed American Cleopatra, a full sister to American Pharoah who is in foal to prominent sire Uncle Mo.

With all bloodstock markets trending upward this year, there is reason for optimism heading into the mixed sale season that begins at Fasig-Tipton.

"The yearling sale started off strong and finished strong and demonstrated strength throughout," Browning said following Fasig-Tipton's recordbreaking October yearling sale. "It bodes well for the November sale what we saw throughout the yearling sale season, which was consistent with what we saw in the 2-year-old season. It's a pretty healthy market right now."


"We're seeing an upturn in the economy and I hope it comes back to register in the horse sales and our industry as a whole," said consignor Wayne Sweezey of Timber Town. "I feel good about everything. The economy is kicking along, everybody is positive, and hopefully they will be here to buy some horses."

With an abundance of well-bred, elite racehorses on offer, consignors are hopeful that there will be plenty of depth at the top.

"There are a lot of really nice mares in the sale and I hope there are a million-dollar plus tickets to get them all sold," said Sweezey. "To me there is a little bit of a flood in the market for really top horses.

In addition to strength at the top, the November sales provide an opportunity for breeders operating at other price levels to move stock that no longer fits their programs and/or to upgrade their bloodstock.

"I think everybody in the horse business is just trying to upgrade from wherever they are," Taylor said. "If you're on the bottom you're trying to get to the middle and if you're in the middle you're trying to get as close to the top as you can." BH

SONGBIRD, TEPIN TOP PROSPECTS AT FASIG-TIPTON

The list of horses to watch during the ■ Fasig-Tipton November sale reads like a who's who of recent top North American distaffers, headed by champions Songbird and Tepin.

Cataloged as Hip 120 by Taylor Made Sales Agency as a broodmare prospect, Songbird is the 4-year-old daughter of Medaglia d'Oro who won 13 of 15 career starts—including nine grade 1 stakes—and finished second in the other two outings. 



LADY ELI WITHDRAWN FROM KEENELAND NOVEMBER SALE

heep Pond Partners' five-time grade 1 winner Lady Eli, who sustained a number of significant lacerations and a puncture wound to her hind legs in the Nov. 4 Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Turf (G1T) at Del Mar, has been withdrawn from the Keeneland November breeding stock sale.

Trainer Chad Brown reported the mare was being diligently tended to Nov. 5, the morning after her seventh-place finish in the \$2 million race, 3 1/2 lengths behind winner Wuheida. Though not life threatening, the injuries mandate stall rest, and Lady Eli's connections decided the best course of action was to scratch from the sale.

"Lady Eli got pretty banged up on Saturday," Brown said. "We will continue to do what we've always done for Lady Eli, which is to put her welfare

first. She is a horse of a lifetime."

John Sikura of Hill 'n' Dale Sales Agency, had the 5-year-old daughter of Divine Park listed as part of his November consignment.

"She got cut really bad," Sikura said. "She got stepped on and has several puncture wounds. She deserved a swan song to win that race or give her best performance."

The finish was the only one in the mare's 14-race career in which she did not run first (10 times) or second (three times), while earning more than \$2.9 million.

"After lengthy discussions with Chad Brown following the Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Turf, we have decided that we are going to scratch Lady Eli from this week's Keeneland November sale," read a statement issued by Sheep Pond's Jay Hanley and Sol Kumin. "Unfortunately, Lady Eli was banged around and stepped on from behind heading into the first turn. She suffered a number of significant lacerations to both of her hind legs and she lost one of her hind shoes in the incident. The fact that she raced another mile and finished the race with these injuries and shoeless is amazing, and a further testament to her toughness and courage.

"Right now our efforts are focused squarely on trying to get her well again. Putting her through the trials of a sale in her current condition is simply out of the question. As soon as she can travel, she will go to John Sikura's Hill 'n' Dale Farm near Lexington to rest and recover."

Despite Saturday's loss, Sikura said he is convinced Lady Eli will be crowned champion turf mare in year-end balloting.

"There wasn't an (American-based) filly that dominated the race or had a world-class performance that exceeded her body of work this year, and certainly her entire race career, in which she showed nothing but the highest level of class. She is unique and remarkable. Though disappointed to scratch one of the greatest turf distaffers of all

time, our philosophy at Hill 'n' Dale has always been to put the safety, soundness, and well being of our horses first. We trust the advice of the horse's owner and trainer."

Lady Eli won her first six starts, including the 2014 Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies Turf (G1T), before a serious bout of laminitis sent her to the sideline. Her courageous efforts to overcome the condition were well-documented, as she recovered and went on to excel at the highest level.

A grade 1 winner at 2, 3, 4, and 5, Lady Eli had three wins from five starts this year, including victories in the Gamely Stakes (G1T) at Santa Anita Park, Diana Stakes (G1T) and the Woodford Reserve Ballston Spa Stakes (G2T) at Saratoga Race Course. Her additional top-level victories included the 2016 Flower Bowl Stakes (G1T) at Belmont Park, and the Belmont Oaks Invitational Stakes (G1T) in 2015.

"I've never seen one up close with this much heart and determination," Brown said. BH

rainer Wesley Ward said Stonestreet ■ Stables and Peter Leidel's dual group 1 winner Lady Aurelia came out of her 10th-place finish in the Nov. 4 Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint (G1T) "good," and when asked if she would return to racing in 2018 as a 4-year-old his response was sharp and immediate.

"Absolutely," the trainer said of the Scat Daddy filly.

Ward indicated Lady Aurelia would get the rest of the year off and didn't have much of an explanation as to why the 4-5 Turf Sprint favorite ran so poorly behind upset winner Stormy Liberal.

"She came out of the race good, sound—no problems. Unfortunately we were just beat," Ward




Lady Aurelia out for morning exercise at Del Mar ahead of the Breeders' Cup

said. "It was a long season and we lost that sizzle from earlier in the year."

Causeway Stakes win to start her season April 15 at Keeneland, then a score at Royal Ascot in the King's Stand Stakes (G1) June 20. She was a nose back behind Marsha at the wire in the Aug. 25 Coolmore Nunthorpe Stakes (G1) at York in her last start before the Breeders' Cup.

Two horses that didn't exit Saturday Breeders' Cup races all that well were Filly & Mare Turf (G1T) participants Avenge and favorite Lady Eli. Trainer Richard Mandella said Sunday that Avenge needed stitches to close up some cuts she sustained during the race, and Lady Eli was withdrawn from the Keeneland November breeding stock sale because of a number of significant lacerations and a puncture wound to her hind legs.

Mandella said Avenge will travel to Claiborne Farm for a quarantine period before she moves to England to be bred to Frankel.


Lady Eli and Lady Aurelia were two of several short-priced favorites to misfire during Breeders' Cup Saturday, and the rest—Moonshine Memories (Juvenile Fillies), Unique Bella (Filly & Mare Turf Sprint), Drefong (Sprint), and Bolt d'Oro (Juvenile) all came out of their races in good order, according to their trainers.

The two juveniles, Moonshine Memories and Bolt d'Oro, will rest for the remainder of the season and return to training for 3-year-old campaigns.

"He came back great, ate all his feed, and bit me on the arm," said Bolt d'Oro's owner/trainer Mick Ruis. "I think he was pissed off."

Ruis said the Del Mar Futurity (G1) and FrontRunner Stakes (G1) winner will get 60 days off and point to the San Felipe Stakes (G2) and the Santa Anita Derby (G1).

The Juvenile winner, Good Magic, also came out of the race well, but trainer Chad Brown did not say what the future plans for the Curlin colt were. BH

orsemen have long held the intuition, and have since verified with research, that a broodmare's best runners are most likely to appear among her second through sixth foals.

Of course, exceptions exist, but this phenomenon is backed by such elite runners as Take Charge Lady, Fun House, Cara Rafaela, Personal Ensign, and Weekend Surprise. These mares were not only exceptional racehorses, but outstanding producers as well, and all were recognized with the coveted title of Kentucky Broodmare of the Year. Such a commonality raises the question of whether the "second through sixth" rule also influences the success of a mare's daughters as producers.

BloodHorse MarketWatch pursued the answer by compiling the progeny statistics for the daughters of mares with at least two producing daughters between 1998-2008 in North America. Besides looking at the overall performance records of these daughters' foals as winners, black-type stakes winners, and graded/ group winners, we also subdivided the group into

the daughters of dams that were black-type winners and the daughters of dams that were graded/group winners.

The results showed that birth order indeed matters, both on the racetrack and in the breeding shed. Of the last 50 Kentucky Broodmare of the Year recipients, for example, 35 (70%) were among their dams' second through sixth foals.

The data also support another industry principle that quality begets quality. Generally speaking, the best racemares are producing the best racehorses and producers.

Now let's examine the specifics of *MarketWatch*'s findings.

Overall, it is among fillies born seventh or later that producing ability, much like racing ability, begins to diminish. Producing ability will see minor spikes in some spots, particularly among 12th foals within all sets and subsets of daughters. The data pool for each of the categories of daughters analyzed, however, might be too small for this spike to be significant.

A mare born second or third produces the highest percentage of black-type stakes winners, with 5.36% of runners achieving this distinction, higher than stallions such as Candy Ride, Kitten's Joy, and City

> Zip, who were ranked fourth, fifth, and sixth, on the leading sires list in 2016, respectively. Mares born fourth lead all other age groups by percentage of graded stakes winners produced at 2.41%.

Just as with racing success, multiple factors affect the producing ability of the second through sixth foals, according to breeders and pedigree analysts.

"So many cross currents are at play, intra-uterine environment, genetics,

epistatic impacts, stallion choice, and commercial trends, just to name a few," said Alan Porter, who has been a pedigree analyst and mating consultant for more than 30 years. "Ideally you'd be able to normalize the sire so that could potentially be removed from the equation, but that would give you a data set too small to be significant. Overall, it is a combination of all these cross currents that create the trend in front of us."

One major influence could be tied to the concept that DNA is not static and changes over the course of a horse's, or human's, life.

It has been well established that in humans a woman's eggs degrade with age and children born to older mothers are subject to a higher rate of medical issues. Recent studies also have shown that men who have children at an older age are more likely to father a child who will develop medical issues as well, including increased rates for autism, breast cancer, and epilepsy.

Methylation is one of the biggest topics in the field of epigenetics, which studies how genes respond to an individual's environment over his or her lifespan. Over time, methyl groups can be added to DNA molecules. The overall sequence does not change, but the function of the affected genes can. An older mare has more chances to have her DNA altered simply due to her age; therefore, her later foals have the potential to receive this altered DNA. While the resulting later foal might physically look fine, it could possess a DNA mutation that affects its ability to perform as a racehorse, such as a mutation on a gene that influences fast or slow twitch muscle fibers. Even the slightest change in these could make a significant impact on the racetrack, where winning is determined by fractions of a second. In the case of this study, it means those fillies born later pass that compromised DNA on to their foals, potentially resulting in decreased progeny performance.

While most of the research within this field has been aimed at human medicine, it is not entirely farfetched to think the concept could apply to equine reproduction as well.

Black Type Worth Its Weight in Gold

The importance of black-type ability to a successful breeding program cannot be overstated. Some of the numbers in this study scream out, particularly the 13.16% strike rate of black-type stakes winners from daughters born third to graded stakes winners, almost a 1 in 8 shot. Daughters born second to graded stakes winners also boast an incredible strike rate, with 12% of their offspring winning black-type stakes races. These percentages of black-type stakes winners are higher than War Front's, who led the sires list in this category in 2016 with 11.8% of BTSW from runners, and higher than even Galileo.

Daughters born second and third to graded stakes winners have a higher success rate at producing a graded stakes winner (6.9% and 7.6%, respectively) than leading sires Tapit (4.9%), who has topped the North American sires list three consecutive times, and Uncle Mo (6.3%), who had the second-highest percentage of graded stakes winners from runners (War Pass leads the list with 6.45% but only had a crop of 31).

The second and third daughters of black-type stakes winners are nothing to sneeze at either, with more than 10% of them producing a black-type winner of their own and hitting in the mid-high 4% range for graded stakes winners produced.

This study also shows both first and later-born daughters of superior runners maintain their pool's higher-than-average strike rate of black-type and graded stakes success when compared to the overall pool, suggesting that daughters of superior mares might have more leeway when it comes to birth order and producing ability.

This phenomenon could have its roots in mating choice. Mares, for the most part, tend to see a decrease in quality of suitors as they age, especially if their progeny have moderate to mediocre success on the racetrack. Mares that are black-type or graded stakes winners are coveted in any stallion's book, so their credentials, regardless of progeny success, encourage breeders to continue sending them to higher-quality stallions. This means daughters born later to these mares theoretically could have better genetics than the average population because their dam was given more chances with higher-quality sires, thus giving them a leg up in their future careers as producers.

Mating choice also might be behind another pattern seen in the data that showed the third foals out of mares that were black-type winners or graded/group winners became the best overall producers in both subgroups.

Porter thinks this pattern mirrors what is sometimes seen with stallions' third crops.

"Just like with stallions and their books or progeny, you look at a maiden mare and pair her with a stallion you think will complement her physically," Porter said. "Sometimes, the resulting foal and how she passes on her traits turn out to be completely different than how you predicted. Often times you book a mare to her second stallion before she foals out her first, so it is her third mating choice that generally you really have the chance to refine your stallion choice."

Where to Go From Here

Thoroughbred breeding is a complex mix of science, art, sport, instinct, and pure luck. Knowing the influence of birth order, however, provides yet another tool for breeders and buyers in evaluating market value and the potential breeding success.

"It's a trend I always suspected was there, and it is something I do look at when I'm analyzing a mare," said James Keogh, whose Grovendale consignment specializes in broodmares and foals. Keogh has consigned the likes of Seeking Gabrielle (dam of 2016 Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands, G1, winner Nyquist) and Kim's Blues (second dam of 2009 Horse of the Year Rachel Alexandra).

"The statistic given regarding 70% of the past 50 Broodmares of the Year being from foals two through

sixth is simply remarkable. The numbers also justify the importance of black type with a mare. Black type is crucial," Keogh continued. "We've known that black type, whether it's a black-type stakes or a graded stakes, is key when it comes to a mare and her chances to produce runners, but now it justifies the value of it when it comes to her chances to establish a female family. Physical, black type, and family are the things I key into the most, and the market does as well. The sales are rewarding quality, and those are the boxes you need to check."

Thoroughbred breeding has few concrete rules, and individuals that buck the trends abound. For example, Silken Cat bookended her broodmare career with multiple graded stakes winning Irap (Tiznow). Her first foal, by Gone West, went on to be multiple graded stakes winner and current top-ranked sire Speightstown. Even more famous was Somethingroyal, who produced 12 foals of varying ability before providing racing with the immortal Secretariat as lucky foal 13.

While the statistic that 35 (70%) out of the past 50 Kentucky Broodmares of the Year recipients were born as the second through sixth foals of their dams is staggering, we have to remember that 30% were not. That is 15 topshelf broodmares that would be theoretical culls if judged by the second-through-sixth rule.

Those 15 mares include such heavyweight blue hens as Better Than Honour (born 10th), Toll Booth (9th), Grecian Banner (7th), and Cosmah (1st). For these

mares, it can be argued that they hail from such deep female dynasties that birth order cannot diminish their superior genetics. Porter summed this concept: "In individual cases, quality will overcome broad trends."

Statistics are valuable, but most industry professionals adhere to a basic rule: Judge the horse standing in front of you for what it appears to be.

"These numbers are there for a reason. It's mathematical proof, the numbers don't lie, but at the end of the day you take everything on a case-by-case basis and look at the individual," said top bloodstock agent David Ingordo. "In regard to a stallion's book, you obviously need a blend of mares in any book. Young mares, older, proven mares, etc. Ultimately we try to stay out of the breeder's way."

When asked about horses he is evaluating at a sale, he provided the following anecdote, "I'm sitting here in my office looking at this big tree out my window. Families are exactly that, trees. Some of the branches are full right from the get go; others have some as you go further down the branch; others nothing yet. But I bet if you call me back in a couple of weeks those branches with nothing or are only half full will have more, they just take a little more time. Good families are like that. It might take them a little bit, but they repeat themselves and that's what holds weight when we look at a horse, regardless of age or purpose. Good families speak for themselves. If the individual looks the part and comes from a good family, but maybe is from one of those 'thinner branches', then there's no reason not to think that the horse in front of us is going to be that big leaf." BH

'PHAROAH' FIRST FOALS SHOWING ATHLETICISM, GOOD MINDS

The first foals by any sire with the stature of American Pharoah, who ended the 37-year American Triple Crown drought in 2015, would garner great anticipation and excitement.

But American Pharoah's reputation, is not why consignors and breeders are buzzing over his first crop of weanlings being offered at the upcoming Fasig-Tipton November and Keeneland November breeding stock sales.

The quality and athleticism of the weanlings cataloged is what's capturing everyone's attention.

"What you see is a physical that gets you excited. The buzz is well deserved," said Kerry Cauthen with Four Star Sales, which is offering Hip 20, the first American Pharoah weanling to sell at the Fasig-Tipton November sale Nov. 6. The filly is out of the Pulpit daughter Pulsating, from the family of multiple group 1 winner Minstrella and graded winner A Little Warm.

"She has fantastic size, great scope with a wonderful shoulder and hip, and she just moves well. She has so much scope that you can project forward and see classic form," Cauthen said. "For us, I think it is terrific to have the first 'Pharoah.' "

Reiley McDonald with Eaton Sales also was impressed with the seven or eight American Pharoah weanlings he's seen.

"I am blown away by how good they are," McDonald said. "They all have that big shoulder with great depth through the girth. It is unusual to see babies that deep at this point in their lives. They're really athletic, and like ours, they have minds like their dad's. They are all easy to be around."

Eaton Sales is offering Hip 46 at the Fasig-Tipton sale, an American Pharoah filly out of Untouched Talent (Storm Cat), the dam of grade 1 winner

and leading second-crop sire Bodemeister. At the Keeneland sale, the consignment is offering Hip 984, a colt out of multiple stakes winner J Z Warrior (Harlan's Holiday).

Hunter Valley Farm has two American Pharoah weanlings for sale at Fasig-Tipton and two at Keeneland. The farm's co-owner Fergus Galvin said they all show good athleticism.

"The ones we have are seriously good walkers. They're well-made, but what stands out is how they move," Galvin said. "'Pharoah' was a lovely horse at the end of a shank and even lovelier when he got into stride."

While many breeders will wait to sell their first-crop American Pharoah foals as yearlings, Hunter Valley has been particularly successful selling weanlings. The consignor is offering Hip 30, a colt out of stakes-placed winner Sheraton Park (Cozzene); and Hip 68, a filly out of stakes winner Flattermewithroses (Flatter) at the Fasig-Tipton sale. At Keeneland, Hunter Valley is offering Hip 54, a colt out of grade 1 winner and graded stakes producer Harmony Lodge; and Hip 69, a filly out of graded stakes-placed winner Jemima's Pearl (Distorted Humor).

"Some people wait to sell as yearlings, but if we're happy and we like them then we predominately sell them as weanlings," Galvin said. "It been our MO, and it's paid dividends for us."

Dermot Ryan, manager of Ashford Stud where American Pharoah stands, said there is no comparing the buzz surrounding this sire with any other first-crop stallion.

"From the extra public attention to the excitement from breeders to the quality of mares he attracted in his first year, he takes it to a whole new level," Ryan said. "He was very well supported in his first year and, on the strength of his first foals, he bred an even bigger book in his second year.

"With Mendelssohn's win yesterday at the Breeders' Cup, Leslie's Lady showed again what an outstanding mare she is and she was bred to him this year, so that's the kind of quality you are talking about."

As for what the weanling market may indicate about the value of American Pharoah's first foals, Ryan said the yearling market will provide the greatest insight.

"The weanling market is generally a teaser for what's out there, but it is really the yearling market that gives you the bulk of horses to look at," he said. "In saying that, a strong foal sale can build momentum for a first-year horse, and we have seen that even before now with the amount of repeat business we got based on the reports of his first foals when they were born in the spring.

"American Pharoah has some very good-looking horses on the sales grounds but for every one in the sale there are probably three or four other good ones we've seen out on the farms so it is very exciting," Ryan said.

The observations by Cauthen, McDonald, and Galvin all square with what Ryan said he's heard from many breeders.

"The biggest thing that stands out about them is probably the way they move," Ryan said. "American Pharoah is such an exceptional mover and you can see it in his foals, they glide across the ground. He also passes on a good frame, they have size, scope, and strength, and the mindset to go with it."

American Pharoah shuttled this year to Coolmore Australia, where Ryan said the sire was oversubscribed about 24 hours after it was announced he'd be sent.

"The Triple Crown is one of the longstanding achievements that resonates with everyone," he said. "Horses like Seattle Slew and Secretariat are known the world over and that has certainly been true with American Pharoah. He achieved so much that sometimes it's easy to overlook that he was a champion 2-year-old, but he was also very precocious and that suits the Australian market." BH

GRADE 1 WINNER CUPID RETIRED FROM RACING

wo days after his last-place run in the Las Vegas ▲ Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile (G1), Coolmore's Cupid has been retired from racing, trainer Bob Baffert said Nov. 5 at Del Mar.

A grade 1 winner and earner of more than \$1.7 million, the gray son of Tapit never really got involved in the Nov. 3 Dirt Mile after a troubled start, but earned his top-level victory earlier in the year with a 3 1/4-length score in the May 27 Gold Cup at Santa Anita Stakes (G1).

Cupid came back off a nearly three-month layoff to win the Harry F. Brubaker Stakes at Del Mar Aug. 23, but finished a dull fourth in the Awesome Again Stakes (G1) Sept. 30 in his final start before the Breeders' Cup, and Baffert opted to put him in the Dirt Mile instead of the Classic (G1).

During his 3-year-old season in 2016, he won a trio of grade 2 events—the Rebel Stakes at Oaklawn Park, the Indiana Derby (G2) at Indiana Grand, and the West Virginia Derby (G2) at Mountaineer Casino Racetrack & Resort. His six wins from 13 starts came

at five different racetracks. The only track he won two races at was Santa Anita Park, where he broke his maiden in February of 2016.

Cupid will enter stud for the 2018 breeding season at Coolmore's Ashford Stud in Kentucky, the farm announced Oct. 26. A fee has not yet been set.

"Cupid has all the credentials you look for in a sire," said Charlie O'Connor, Coolmore's director of sales. "He's a grade 1 winner by Tapit, from one of the most commercial families in the stud book and he has the looks to match. We can't wait to get him to the farm, so breeders can come by and see him. I'm sure they won't be disappointed." BH



MARMELO, TIBERIAN HEAD MELBOURNE CUP

Tf you thought Talismanic's Lon-**⊥**gines Breeders' Cup Turf (G1T)-winning form was good, Marmelo and Tiberian should figure prominently in the AU\$6 million Emirates Melbourne Cup Nov. 7 at Flemington Racecourse.

Both horses have raced well against Talismanic in France this year, and—in the case of Tiberian—beaten him.

With 23 horses running and plenty of form, the two-mile Cup is never an easy race to pick, but form against Talismanic should be worth noting.

Marmelo, a 4-year-old Duke of Marmalade colt, trained by Hughie Morrison in England, is the favorite with many Australian oddsmakers at around 7-1. He raced once against Talismanic this season, finishing second to the

subsequent Breeders' Cup Turf winner in the 13/4mile Prix Maurice de Nieuil (G2) by 1 1/4 lengths.

He then won the 1 7/8-mile Darley Prix Kergolay (G2) from subsequent Doncaster Cup Stakes (G2) winner Desert Skyline, and then made up ground very well to finish sixth to Boom Time in the 1 1/2-mile BMW Caulfield Cup (G1). The Prix Kergolay has been a good prep to the Melbourne Cup in the past, and Marmelo has the benefit of being capable on good footing.

Tiberian, by the teaser stallion Tiberius Caesar, has run five times this year for four victories. They include consecutive races in which he relegated Talismanic into second place—though both were on soft footing, ground that Talismanic does not relish.

Tiberian, however, won twice in August on good ground, including the 1 9/16-mile Lucien Barriere Grand Prix de Deauville (G2). He has won up to 1 7/8 miles.

The form around Talismanic and Marmelo also works well for Thomas Hobson, second in the Doncaster Cup over 2 1/4 miles. One of three runners trained by Irishman Willie Mullins, he is

> lightly weighted but there will be questions of whether he's sharp enough as most of his form is at 2 1/4 miles and beyond.

Mullins also saddles 2015 runner-up Max Dynamite, and Wicklow Brave.

Contesting favoritism with Marmelo is last year's winner Almandin, one of six runners owned or co-owned by five-time Cup winner Lloyd Williams. Almandin, a son of Monsun, is in good form but will carry more weight than last year. Humidor is also expected to be among the favorites though there is doubt over his stamina. If the Teofilo gelding repeats his outstanding run for second place in the Ladbrokes Cox Plate (G1) behind Winx, he will be right at the finish.

The O'Brien family of Ireland has three runners. Aidan O'Brien saddles Johannes Vermeer, who will be a great chance following his Caulfield Cup third-place finish. His son Joseph brings the out-of-form 2016 Investec Derby (G1) at Epsom runner-up US Army Ranger and this year's William Hill St Leger Stakes (G1) fourth-place finisher Rekindling.

Belmont Gold Cup Invitational Stakes (G1T) winner Red Cardinal is lined up by German trainer Andreas Wohler, who won with Protectionist in 2014. Another threat is the English-trained Wall Of Fire, second in the Ladbrokes Herbert Power Stakes (G2) Oct. 14.

Caulfield Cup winner Boom Time and runnerup Single Gaze can't be ignored, even though their breeding suggests they would have trouble with one mile, let alone two. Amelie's Star is one of the most promising of the other locals. BH

AVERY ISLAND SPURTS AWAY IN NASHUA STAKES

odolphin homebred Avery Island recovered from J being bumped at the start and kicked clear in the stretch to secure a win in the \$200,000 Nashua Stakes (G2) at Aqueduct Racetrack Nov. 5.

It was the second straight win and the first graded victory for the Kiaran McLaughlin-trained Street Sense colt, who entered off a gate-to-wire, 5 1/4-length score in a Belmont Park maiden event Sept. 30. He has been ridden in all three starts by Joe Bravo.

"It was a great race for only his third start," McLaughlin said. "Joe Bravo did a great job. He was pressured early and then he kind of drew off late. We're tickled to death. He's nice horse. We'll look at the Remsen (Stakes, G2, Dec. 2) back in four weeks.

"It's encouraging that it wasn't a wet track or sealed or anything this time," the trainer added of the colt whose first win came on a good, sealed track at Belmont. "He's always trained well and we've always liked him, and that was a great result today. The longer the better. He's a big strong horse with a big stride. He wants to run all day."

In the one-mile race for juveniles, Under the Graydar went for the early lead, taking the six-horse field through an opening quarter-mile in :23.66, as Avery Island raced in a close second and Super Sermon stalked from third. Avery Island took over after three furlongs, leading a half-mile in :47, with Super Sermon tracking from third, and favored Aveenu Malcainu moving up from fourth.

As six furlongs went in 1:11.95, Avery Island extended his lead to 1 1/2 lengths and came twowide entering the stretch. Super Sermon and Aveenu Malcainu tried to catch the runaway leader, but Avery Island hit the wire 4 3/4 lengths ahead. With a late surge, Super Sermon finished a half-length ahead of Aveenu Malcainu for second. The final time was 1:37.58.

Crea's Bklyn Law, Blue Ridge Scout, and Under the Graydar completed the order of finish.

The winner returned \$6.30, \$3.70, and \$2.40 across the board.

> "It's always exciting to have 2-year-olds coming around," Bravo said of the winner. "If you look at this horse, he's big and he's just going to keep growing into himself. I have some high expectations.

"He really finished up the last eighth of a mile. I was very happy about that. He's in the right hands; Kiaran will do right by him."

Out of the winning Darley homebred mare Kinda Spicy (A.P. Indy), Avery Island improved his record to two wins from three starts with earnings of \$165,332. BH
