TAX DEPRECIATION OPPORTUNITIES FOR THOROUGHBRED OWNERS

Pederal depreciation incentives included with the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act continue to benefit Thoroughbred horse and farm owners. This article provides an in-depth look at the rules surrounding the 100% bonus depreciation, generally the most useful of these incentives to industry participants.

This discussion is intended for those active owners operating their horse and farm activities as businesses that use the cash method of accounting.

The new law significantly expanded bonus depreciation. The percentage that may be currently deducted for tax purposes increased to 100% of the purchase price for qualifying property placed in service through 2022. After 2022, the percentage drops by 20% each year until it becomes 20% in 2026. In addition, the definition of


qualifying property was expanded to include assets that have been previously owned but not those being reacquired by the purchaser. Previously, assets used by a prior owner did not qualify.

Common equine assets that may qualify for this 100% writeoff include racing prospects (yearlings, 2-year-olds in training), racehorses, broodmares, stallions, equipment, fencing, land improvements, and barns. To qualify, these items must be predominantly used in the United States (which makes sense given the desire to stimulate economic growth in the United States).

A person claiming bonus depreciation is not limited by taxable income. The deduction may be used to create or increase a net loss and there is not a specific dollar amount limitation on an annual basis.

For these reasons it is much more valuable than the Section 179 depreciation, which is limited to net income and also to a fixed annual dollar amount. Bonus depreciation also is not prorated based on the timing of the purchase. So a qualifying purchase made on Dec. 31, if placed in service then, is eligible for the same

amount of bonus depreciation as property purchased for the same price earlier in the year.

In order to claim the bonus depreciation, the asset must be "placed in service" during the tax year. For tax purposes, racing prospects may be placed in service either in the fall of the yearling year when training begins or when they begin racing.

Breeding stock may be placed in service when available to be bred, even if the purchaser does not plan to breed the horse until the following year, or when bred. Quite commonly, mares are purchased in the breeding stock sales in the fall and placed in service upon purchase, even though they typically would not be bred in the Northern Hemisphere until the following winter to spring. The same is true for stallions or stallion shares. Once a methodology for placing horses in service is chosen, it should be followed consistently for tax reporting purposes.

However, just because the cash has been paid does not necessarily mean the horse has been placed in service. For example, if shares in a stallion prospect are purchased while the horse is still racing to secure ownership in the stallion, these would not be placed in service until the horse is retired from racing and available to be bred or begins breeding. On the other hand, a horse that has been purchased and placed in service but not yet paid for would be eligible for bonus depreciation.

In addition, some leases might be "disguised purchases" and may enable the lessee/purchaser to currently claim bonus depreciation. So, it is important to look beyond the label on the contract or the time at which cash is expended to determine whether bonus depreciation is currently available.

Those purchasing farms also may currently use bonus depreciation to deduct the purchase price allocable to qualifying items such as barns, land improvements, fencing, and equipment.

This could result in a substantial portion of the purchase price being eligible for immediate deduction. Addressing this allocation prior to purchase via agreement with the seller in the closing documents or by an appraisal that allocates a portion of the purchase price to these depreciable assets is important to maximize potential deductions.

While bonus depreciation is a timing difference, it can be financially meaningful. To illustrate what this is worth to a horse owner, let's use the following example. If a yearling is purchased for \$500,000, this \$500,000 may be fully deducted in year 1 (subject to

some limitations briefly mentioned later in this article), rather than over an eight-year period. (Yearlings use seven-year lives for tax depreciation, but this is actually claimed over an eight-year period.) This is a federal tax savings of \$185,000 if the purchaser is in the highest federal individual tax bracket. By accelerating this deduction versus claiming it over time, the cash savings in this specific example are roughly \$30,000 if a 5% rate of return is used.

This cash savings increases if a higher rate of return is used, if the asset is depreciated over a longer life, or as the purchase price of qualifying assets increases.

Opt-Out Option

Owners may opt out of this immediate write-off by filing an election to do so with their tax return. So why would someone choose to elect out of this bonus depreciation?

If the horse venture is otherwise profitable, an owner might wish to report a net profit for hobby loss rules that shifts the burden of proof to the IRS if profits are reported in two out of seven years. Additionally, horse owners might prefer to align the related depreciation expense better during the period of time that horses or the farm would produce income in future years.

Also, passive investors in the horse business participating via multi-member entities may receive little-to-no-tax benefit by accelerating this deduction and instead create a state withholding tax issue in future years when purse winnings are generated or the horse is sold with no remaining tax basis.

Alternatively, the 100% bonus depreciation may be claimed on certain classes of assets while electing out of others. So, if it makes sense to deduct the depreciation on barns over the standard 20-year life while claiming the 100% write-off on horse purchases, an election could be filed to opt out of the 20-year asset class only.

This is made on a class-by-class basis and not an asset-by-asset basis. Horses should be categorized appropriately when evaluating on a class-by-class

basis, given that different types of Thoroughbred horses have either a three-year or a seven-year life.

Property acquired from a related party or via inheritance or gift does not qualify for bonus depreciation. Inventory not yet placed in service, such as typical weanling-to-yearling pinhooks, or weanlings not yet placed in service also are not eligible.

Limitations

As with most other tax incentives, a few limitations that might currently reduce or eliminate this 100% deduction may apply. The tax law created a provision that limits net 2018 losses from all business ventures for individuals, trusts and estates to \$250,000 (\$500,000 for individuals filing jointly). This limit is indexed for inflation after 2018. Any net business loss that exceeds the limit is converted to a net operating loss.

Bonus depreciation might significantly increase the net business loss generated and cause this business loss to be currently limited. For many industry participants who are affected, this creates a one-year deferral of this excess loss that then might be used to offset all sources of income in the subsequent year, subject to the normal net operating loss carryover rules. So owners faced with excess business losses might still want to currently claim bonus depreciation.

Another item of caution: Many states have decoupled from this favorable bonus depreciation so this may be a Federal tax benefit only, depending in which states a horse or farm owner operates.

As sales season kicks into high gear, this 100% write-off option presents some planning opportunities for those looking to reduce taxable income. It is important to speak with your tax advisors regarding your specific situation prior to making any purchases, but the potential tax benefit of utilizing bonus depreciation could be substantial.

DEL MAR REPORTS STRONG SAFETY NUMBERS AT SUMMER MEET

With the national spotlight on equine safety and welfare, Del Mar concluded its 80th summer meeting Sept. 2 as the safest major racetrack in the United States for the second consecutive year based on available racing numbers.

After introducing a comprehensive series of safety programs in 2017 and 2018, Del Mar expanded its safety measures this summer, including additional pre-race veterinary observation protocols and an independent panel of veterinarians and racing officials to review all horses scheduled to race. There was not a single serious injury during racing this summer, an unprecedented feat. Last year, The Jockey Club's Equine Injury Database ranked Del Mar as the safest major racetrack in the U.S.

"Without a doubt, this is the most gratifying meet
I have ever been part of," said Del Mar Thoroughbred
Club CEO Joe Harper. "Given the current climate,
especially after the first half of the year in Southern
California, we had three goals this summer:
continuation of our exemplary safety record, to provide
stability and a dependability to racing in California,

and to offer a consistent, five-day-a-week schedule that would reward fans and horsemen alike.

"With a wonderful display of teamwork from our owners, trainers, jockeys, vets, track personnel, and the CHRB, we accomplished these goals in exceptional fashion."

Del Mar officials said it was an important meeting following the equine safety issues earlier this year at Santa Anita Park.

"We are very proud of what we achieved this summer," said Del Mar executive vice president of racing Tom Robbins. "To average eight runners per race, in less than optimal circumstances, was remarkable. Credit goes to racing secretary David Jerkens, our track crews, led by Dennis Moore and Leif Dickinson, and, of course, the horsemen. We dedicated significant time and resources to safety and welfare and we set a very high bar for ourselves. The results of this summer prove that when we all work together we can uphold our responsibility to our equine and human athletes while staging on-track competition at the very highest level."

Faced with fewer horses than last year but determined to race five days a week—the only meet

in California to do so—Del Mar carded 21 fewer races (down 6.6%) than its 2018 summer meet. All-sources handle on the 36-day session fell 10.9% after growth of 6.8% in 2018 and 5.1% in 2017. The lower all-sources handle, which was expected after the tumultuous winter and spring at Santa Anita, was due primarily to declines from off-track betting and simulcasting outlets.

"Based on the first half of the year, we knew maintaining the handle trends of the last two years was going to be challenging this meet, especially running fewer races," said DMTC president Josh Rubinstein. "However, the bettors continued to support us, especially the last three weeks, when our field size rallied. At the end of the day we had extremely safe racing, handled over \$432 million, and paid out over \$21 million in purses. We are very pleased."

Horsemen noted the importance of the meeting.

"On behalf of the California Thoroughbred owners,
we want to both thank and congratulate the Del Mar
Thoroughbred Club and their management team," said
Thoroughbred Owners of California chairman Nick
Alexander. "The 2019 Del Mar summer meet delivered
exactly what the California horse racing industry
needed at a critical time: safe racing, full fields, and
large crowds. It was an outstanding season on all levels
and we very much look forward to returning for the
Bing Crosby meet in November."

In 2020, summer racing at Del Mar will receive an additional weekend, as the meet will be held over eight weeks from Saturday, July 18 through Labor Day, Sept. 7. Racing resumes at Del Mar this fall, Nov. 8-Dec. 1. BH

LEADING YEARLING BUYERS BY RACETRACK PERFORMANCE

Sharp eyes are required to comb through the yearlings offered at auction and find the ones with the most athletic potential.

On the cusp of the world's largest yearling sale, held at Keeneland Sept. 9-22, *BloodHorse MarketWatch* looked at the buyers who have the best track record from yearlings purchased at North American sales in 2014 through 2017, with racing statistics compiled up to Aug. 15 of this year.

No single metric adequately defines the most successful buyers. While earnings are certainly important, so is the ability to find horses that will thrive in stakes competition and—even better—graded stakes. We've tried to cover most of the bases by providing three leading buyers lists: by average earnings from the horses purchased, by number of black-type winners, and by number of graded/group winners.

Identifying the buyer is not a straightforward exercise. Bloodstock agents and trainers buy dozens of horses for clients who are often not identified. *MarketWatch* did its best to give credit to the person or outfit actually putting in the effort to evaluate and

acquire the horses. If an owner used multiple agents, however, then we used the owner to give them overall credit for the volume of horses bought. There is potential in these statistics for an owner and an agent to get credit for the same horse. Also note our leaders lists include only buyers that bought 10 or more yearlings during the four-year period.

Juddmonte Farms was the runaway buyer by average earnings

due to the extraordinary ability of its champion Arrogate, who the farm bought for \$560,000 at the 2014 Keeneland September sale from the breeder/consignor Clearsky Farms. The son of Unbridled's Song went on to win four grade 1 stakes and earn more than \$17.4 million. Arrogate's earnings gave Juddmonte overall average earnings of \$1,159,026 from the 16 runners it has out of 25 yearlings purchased for an average \$446,600.

Trainer Ken McPeek ranked at the top of the buyers' ranks by number of black-type winners and by number of graded stakes winners. He was the co-leading buyer alongside the late J.J. Crupi by stakes winners at 16 apiece and was the leading buyer by number of graded stakes winners with 10.

During our time frame, McPeek bought 125 yearlings that averaged \$107,064 at auction and went on to earn an average of \$99,616 at the racetrack. Among the horses he bought as yearlings, 37% earned more in purses than they cost as sale yearlings.

Crupi is the co-runner-up in our buyer study by number of graded stakes winners among his yearling purchases with nine alongside agent Mike Ryan, who was also co-ranked third by number of black-type winners with 12 along with Gatewood Bell's Cromwell Bloodstock.

It should be noted these statistics do not capture the residual value of these yearlings as breeding stock, which can be significant. A good example is a Pure Prize filly that McPeek bought named Dothraki Queen. He bought her for \$35,000 at the 2014 Keeneland September sale from the Hill 'n' Dale Sales Agency consignment. She went on to win the Pocahontas Stakes (G2) and was runner-up in the Darley Alcibiades Stakes (G1). She sold as a broodmare prospect to China Horse Club International for \$950,000. BH

GIANT GIZMO SOLD TO PANAMANIAN STUD FARM

Prominent Canadian sire and multiple grade 3 winner Giant Gizmo has been sold to top Panama stud Harás Cerro Punta, according to Alberto Paz Rodriguez, who brokered the deal. The former Adena Springs North stallion will commence stud duties in Panama in 2020.

The 15-year-old son of Giant's Causeway is the sire of nine black-type stakes winners and 16 stakes horses, led by grade 3 winners Amis Gizmo, who was also Canada's champion 3-year-old colt for 2016, and Brooklynsway.

The leading sire of his generation in Canada from 2013 to 2015, the stallion found early success when he sired two Canadian classic winners in his first three crops with Amis Gizmo and Brooklynsway. Giant Gizmo's success continued with his later crops when he finished fourth on Canada's general sires list in 2015, second on the list in 2016, and ended the season in the top five the next two years.

Giant Gizmo has sired 30 winners in 2019, led by last week's OLG Halton Stakes Presented by Tipperary Equestrian winner Cooler Mike.

"Our success has been based on bringing good, proven sires to continue our tradition of being the best in our world with a focus on the Clásico del Caribe," Rodriguez said. "Over the years we have had

great results importing stallions such as Pumpkin Moonshine, Screen King, Proud Truth, and Concerto. We are looking forward to continuing that success with Giant Gizmo, who has proven to be a top sire in Canada since his first runners stepped on the track."

The winner of six of his 11 starts for more than \$500,000 in earnings, Giant Gizmo beat 11 stakes winners in his two grade 3 victories when he was trained by Bobby Frankel for Stronach Stables. He will ship to Panama in late September. BH



MR. MISUNDERSTOOD TACKLES DEEP OLD FRIENDS STAKES

After starting the year with two third-place runs, Flurry Racing Stables' Mr. Misunderstood will try to regain his winning form Sept. 5 in the \$250,000 Old Friends Stakes at Kentucky Downs, a mile and 70-yard event for 3-year-olds and up who have not won a sweepstakes this year.

The 5-year-old Archarcharch gelding trained by Brad Cox has won four stakes at Churchill Downs, including the Wise Dan Stakes (G2T) last summer. After 60 days off, Mr.

Misunderstood got sick while working toward a return at Fair Grounds Race Course & Slots and was given more time off to recover. He returned at Churchill June 27 in a two-turn allowance optional claimer before tackling the Aug. 4 Kentucky Downs Preview Tourist Mile at Ellis Park.

"A mile and an eighth is a little long for him in his first race back, but it was running out of your own stall at Churchill," said owner Staton Flurry. "The Preview at Ellis Park, I think the 10 hole hurt us, and there

was a downpour right before we started saddling. That might have dampened the ground enough that he couldn't get his total footing to make his late, late charge like he normally does.

"I hate to say we're giving him excuses. But he hasn't had ideal conditions that we'd have liked this year. We're going to take full advantage of the 'nonwinners of a stakes this year' (condition) and see what

we can do."

The main threat from the 12 entries and two also-eligibles comes from Woodford Racing's Catapult, who ships from John Sadler's Southern California stable. The 6-year-old son of Kitten's Joy won two grade 2 events last year before missing in the Breeders' Cup Mile (G1T) by a half-length. His four starts this year include a nose loss in the March 30 Frank E. Kilroe Mile at Santa Anita Park.

Wes Welker and Elizabeth Kumin's 9-year-old veteran Undrafted is looking for his first win this year after three starts. He last visited the winner's circle in a November allowance at Churchill, but has not won a stakes since April 2016. The Purim gelding is best remembered for his 2015 Diamond Jubilee (G1) victory at Royal Ascot with trainer Wesley Ward. BH

WEEKEND STAKES RESULTS BOOST KEENELAND YEARLINGS

Consignors of sales horses always keep a close eye on racing siblings, as one horse's success on the track can often translate to a boost in value for those bound for the ring.

Graded stakes conducted Labor Day weekend saw several yearlings get a welcome "catalog update" ahead of Keeneland's September Yearling Sale, set for Sept. 9-22.

Victory by Baoma Corporation's Bast in the Del Mar Debutante (G1) at Del Mar added to the already black-type heavy page for Hip 881, a California Chrome colt consigned by Taylor Made Sales Agency. Bast, trained by Bob Baffert, was purchased by Donato Lanni for \$500,000 from Taylor Made's offerings at The Saratoga Sale, Fasig-Tipton's selected yearling sale in Saratoga Springs, N.Y. Bast was initially consigned by Taylor Made to the 2017 Keeneland

November Breeding Stock Sale, where she was purchased by Taylor Made's Bloodstock Investments for \$200,000. The Debutante improved the Uncle Mo filly's record to 2-1-1-0 with earnings of \$192,200.

Bast and the California Chrome colt are out of the Arch mare Laffina, a half sister to grade 2 winner Mananan McLir and stakes winners Big Sur and Charming N Lovable, the latter the dam of grade 1 winner Fault. The California Chrome colt was bred in Kentucky by BlackRidge Stables, a partnership entity of Bill Daugherty and Bill Barr, co-founders and managing partners in BlackRidge Resource Partners, a Lexington-based energy exploration and resource company.

While the benefit of a major catalog update prior to a sale can be hard to

quantify, Taylor Made's Mark Taylor said it could be significant in the case of the California Chrome colt, since 7-year-old Laffina is a young mare off to a good start with Bast being her first foal.

"It is definitely a big deal, with the fact this mare is so young," Taylor said. "It would be different if she was an older mare who had been bred a lot and had a grade 1 winner. I think it's very important, especially when you have an unproven stallion like 'Chrome.' You have a mare who's shown she can really produce the goods. It moves the needle a little more than other scenarios where you have an already proven stallion."

Taylor said Daugherty and Barr have only recently begun investing in Thoroughbreds and are members of the California Chrome syndicate. Laffina is one of the mares they purchased with the express purpose of being bred to the two-time Horse of the Year who stands at Taylor Made.

"It's worked out well; the foal she was carrying when they bought her (Laffina) turned out to be Bast, and she

has this nice California Chrome colt and a Pioneerof the Nile filly in the pipeline as well," Taylor said. "I love Arch mares and she puts a lot of quality and substance into her foals. Her Chrome colt looks more like her than Chrome, but is a really nice horse I think will sell well."

Basin's victory in the Runhappy Hopeful Stakes (G1) at Saratoga Race Course enhanced the page for Hip 3583, an Orb colt consigned by Brookdale Sales, agent for the Estate of Tommy G. Ligon. Basin, A Liam's Map colt purchased by owner Jackpot Farms for \$150,000 from Brookdale at the 2018 Keeneland September Sale, Basin has earned \$261,000 while winning two of three starts, with one second.

Appenzell, the dam of Basin and the Orb colt, is a two-time winning daughter of Johannesburg who also has produced Rise Up, a \$1.2-million earning son of Rockport Harbor whose 12 victories include a score in the the Delta Downs Jackpot Stakes (G3).

DAM OF WINX FOALS DEEP IMPACT FILLY

Vegas Showgirl, dam of recently retired mare Winx, has given birth to a filly by Japan's late champion sire Deep Impact at Segenhoe Stud in the Hunter Valley.

Peter O'Brien, who manages Segenhoe Stud, described the filly as Vegas Showgirl's 'best foal ever' and added that the result rewarded her owners' willingness to embark on an international breeding program with their band of high-class mares.

"She has thrown leggy types, and Winx herself was a very leggy foal but she has lovely quality with very good limbs and really what you would expect," O'Brien told ANZ Bloodstock News.

"I was speaking to Harry Sweeney from Japan—and Vegas Showgirl stayed with him when she went up there—and he was telling me that the bigger, leggier, and scopey Deep Impacts are the better ones, so I hope he is right."

The eighth foal and fifth filly out of the dual listed stakes winner and group 1-placed Vegas Showgirl, the foal was born at 10:54 a.m. (local time) Sept. 3.

"I was just talking to John (Camilleri) a few minutes ago and I said that I have never seen a mare

foal like her," said O'Brien. "The whole process from breaking water to passing the placenta takes about 15 minutes. She is just a foaling machine, and her foal was just straight on her feet like Winx was. She is bouncing around the yard this evening and everything was just completely textbook."

Courchevel out of Vegas Showgirl who is trained by Ciaron Maher and David Eustace, while he has also chosen to retain her 2-year-old Exceed And Excel daughter named Covent Garden. She is currently in training with Chris Waller at Rosehill.

As for the Deep Impact filly seeing an auction ring, O'Brien was blunt, saying: "I would say the odds of this one going to a sales ring are a billion to one.

"In fairness to John, he had the vision to take Vegas Showgirl

to Japan to go to Deep Impact and she was 17 years of age when she went up. The key is that John sends a lot of mares internationally and, for example, to Kingman this year. He has got three who went to

Deep Impact and it is all about the long-term breeding program with these out-cross mares, so when we get fillies, it is like winning the Lotto."

Vegas Showgirl will be covered by Yarraman Park's I Am Invincible this year, as will Winx in her maiden season at stud.

Underlining the Camilleris' determination to access the best global bloodlines, they also have dual group 3 winner A Time For Julia due to foal to Deep Impact.

He also has mares due to be covered by Juddmonte's exciting stallion Kingman, such as the group 3 winner Florentina, who last year had a filly by Dubawi, and Pattini, who is a half sister to Tooheys New Golden Slipper Stakes (G1) winner Vancouver.

Group 2 winner Empress Rock, who is the dam of the promising Fairway Thoroughbreds-owned and Brad Widdup-trained 3-year-old filly Darling Point, was also sent to the UK in July to be mated with Kingman (GB).

O'Brien said: "John does everything right. All the mares are quality mares and he breeds them to quality stallions.

"There is a hell of a lot of thought that goes into the matings and he is willing to take risks as far as travelling mares goes, so everything will pay off in the long term."

IRISH-BREDS ROUND OUT TOP THREE IN DEL MAR FILLIES TURF

Trish breeding was very much to the fore in America Sept. 2 after an enterprising piece of placing by Fozzy Stack saw Yesterdayoncemore lead home two other juveniles who had begun life on the other side of the Atlantic in the Del Mar Juvenile Fillies Turf Stakes at Del Mar.

Stack's runner, who came through smoothly under Victor Espinoza to win by a length, was a maiden in five starts in Ireland, running a close fifth in a nursery at Galway last time and contesting two group races.

Bred by Llang Bloodstock and sold to Stack and agent Cormac McCormack for 110,000 guineas (US\$151,225) in Book 1 of the Tattersalls October Yearling Sale, she is a half sister to several minor winners and a daughter of Coolmore's No Nay Never.

Yesterdayoncemore is from the family of Dr Devious, who took the 1992 Ever Ready Epsom Derby (G1) after an audacious attempt in the Kentucky Derby (G1), and Stack reported afterwards that she would remain in the U.S. to explore more options.

Four of the 11-strong field were Irish-bred and runner-up Croughavouke had won a maiden at Limerick in July for Aidan Fogarty before a transfer to the Jeff Mullins barn.

Fogarty's father Joe bred the daughter of Dandy Man from their Kilfeacle Stud in Tipperary and she had been led away unsold for just €4,500 (\$5,166) at last year's Goffs Sportsman's Yearling Sale.

Completing the clean sweep was Applecross, a Bath maiden winner for Michael Bell in the spring who finished down the field in the Queen Mary (G2).

Bred by Sophie Hayley and Thomas Cahalan of Rahinane Farm in Leinster, the daughter of Sir Prancealot had been pinhooked by Tally Ho Stud and sold to Alex Elliott for £60,000 (\$77,400) at the Goffs UK Breeze-Up before switching connections to Richard Baltas.

BAST CARRIES ON LATE ARCH'S LEGACY

The last day of August was a remarkable one for the late stallion Arch. His son Preservationist added a Woodward Stakes Presented by NYRA Bets (G1) victory to the one achieved in the Suburban Stakes (G2) earlier this year. Another son, Blame, was responsible for the Glen Falls Stakes (G2T) victress Mrs. Sippy, and as a broodmare sire Arch featured as sire of the dam of the Del Mar Debutante Stakes (G1) heroine Bast, and as sire of the dam of Bast's own sire, Uncle Mo.

If that description of the pedigree of Bast—which might also be conveyed as Arch appearing 3x2 in the pedigree—caused a double take, that reaction is also the one that Bast's breeders, BlackRidge Stables, had when Laffina—carrying Bast at the time—was brought to their attention as a potential private purchase, having just RNA'd for \$290,000 in the 2016 Keeneland November Breeding Stock Sale. Somewhat intrigued about the inbreeding on the in-utero foal, the BlackRidge principals' enthusiasm for Laffina was increased when some research turned up more than a few good runners with duplications

in the same position, among them Quiet American (3x2 to Dr. Fager, and via three-quarters sisters) and Atlantic Ocean, a multiple graded stakes winner and \$1,900,000 2-year-old at auction (3x2 to Seattle Slew). Since then, we've also seen European superstar Enable, who is 3x2 to her broodmare sire, Sadler's Wells, albeit with the duplication on her sire's side in a different position.

Questions regarding the pedigree of the foal she was carrying apart, Laffina had plenty of credentials to make her an attractive purchase. Uncle Mo, who was her first breeding, was the leading second season sire, and a world record-breaking one at that. Laffina herself didn't win, but she had twice been second in Ireland over a mile, missing by just a half-length on

one occasion. More importantly, Laffina was out of an extremely productive broodmare in the shape of the stakes-placed St. Jovite daughter St Lucinda, the dam of no less than 10 winners, five of them stakes horses. They included Mananan McLir, successful in the American Derby (G2T), and also grade 1 placed; the stakes-winning and graded-placed Big Sur; and Charming N Lovable, who took the Flawlessly Stakes at Hollywood Park and subsequently produced the 2018 Santa Margarita Stakes (G1) captress Fault to Arch's son Blame. Two more of St Lucinda's daughters are

also successful producers. The graded stakes-placed Sandra's Rose is the dam of a son of The Factor, He's The Reason, who took the Lieutenant Governor's Handicap at Hastings Racecourse this year, and the minor winner, Move Clickly, is the dam of graded scorer Fioretti and black-type winner Louisville First.

St Lucinda owned some interesting linebreeding in her own right. By a grandson of His Majesty, she was out of a mare by Majestic Prince, whose granddam, Gay Hostess, was a three-quarters sister to the dam of His Majesty. Her dam, Majestic Nature, was just a maiden winner, but she was a sister to Royal Suite. One of the best of her crop at 2, Royal Suite took the Astarita Stakes (G3), Domino Stakes, and Fashion Stakes, and occupied the runner-up spot in the Matron (G1) and Frizette (G1) stakes. Bred to Secreto (whose own granddam was a half sister to Royal Suite's sire, Majestic Prince), Royal Suite produced the groupwinning Secret Haunt. Royal Suite is also ancestress of several other good winners including her grandson Charge d'Affaires, who captured the Prix Morny Piaget (G1) in France as well as three graded events in the U.S. Bast's fourth dam, Nature, is a stakes-placed half sister to the Hopeful Stakes scorer, Traffic, subsequently champion sire in France, and is out of Capelet. She was also a good 2-year-old, winning the Frizette Stakes when it was contested at the now defunct Jamaica Park, and is half sister to Quill, champion 2-year-old filly of 1958.

Bast's female line has been in the U.S. since the 1870s. This particular branch comes down through Capelet's third dam, Bonus, dam of the great racehorse Twenty Grand. It's been a consistently successful female line and Capelet is ancestress of close to 100 stakes winners, 14 of those grade 1.

Laffina was purchased specifically to visit California Chrome in that horse's first year at stud, and this is also a mating that has some interesting linebreeding as the dam of Arch is by Danzig from the Judy-Rae/Betty Derr family and the granddam of California Chrome is by a son of Danzig from the same family. The result of the California Chrome—Laffina mating, a colt, is now a yearling and will be offered at this year's Kentucky September Yearling Sale. He is entered to the marathon event as Hip 881 in the consignment of Taylor Made Sales, agent.

Bast is the first stakes winner from the fifth Northern Hemisphere crop of Uncle Mo. As indicated earlier, the champion 2-year-old made an astonishing start to his stud career with 25 individual stakes winners from his first crop, 14 of them graded. Although he could not be expected to maintain that pace with his next few crops—which for an unproven horse almost always see a decline in quality and quantity of visiting mares—he's sired another 23 stakes winners (nearly 8% stakes winners to starters), 10 graded, in his second, third, and fourth crops. In addition to Bast, Uncle Mo has sired previous grade 1 winners Nyquist (a champion 2-year-old and Kentucky Derby presented by Yum! Brands (G1) winner who has his first yearlings this year), Dream Tree, Mo Town, Unbridled Mo, Gomo, and Outwork.

Other than the two crosses of Arch, the pedigree of Bast is quite an outcross one at five generations, although it does give two crosses of Roberto, via Arch, and one of Dixieland Band. Uncle Mo's dam, Playa Maya, is one of 12 starters by Arch out of a Dixieland Band mare, the cross having also produced three stakes winners including Preservationist. There is at least one notable link between the pedigrees of Arch and Dixieland Band. Arch is a grandson of Roberto, whose own dam, top-class racemare Bramalea, was by Nashua (by Nasrullah) out of Rarelea, where Dixieland Band's dam is by Delta Judge, whose own dam, Beautillion, is by Noor (by Nasrullah) out of Rarelea's sister, Delta Queen. BH


