KEENELAND SEPTEMBER SALE CARRIES ON AS PLANNED

The Keeneland September Yearling Sale will be held as scheduled Sept. 13-25.

Normally, an auction beginning on its regularly scheduled date would not be noteworthy. But it is in 2020, when so many other sales have been canceled or rescheduled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

There are 4,272 yearlings cataloged for the sale, which consists of 12 sessions, with a dark day Sept. 15. The Sept. 12-13 sessions begin at noon, while the sessions thereafter begin at 10 a.m.

"I think we're very fortunate that we are conducting our sale on the dates that we said we're going to conduct our sale," said Geoffrey Russell, Keeneland's director of sales operations. "So many other sales companies in the Northern Hemisphere have to rearrange things but we are very fortunate to have our September sale taking place in September."

"I think people are happy to be back with a little bit of normalcy, even if we're all wearing masks," said Shannon Arvin, Keeneland president-elect and interim head of sales. "We're resilient and I think we've had great cooperation from our industry, and I think people are just so happy to be here."

The sale is being conducted in an environment with a litany of protocols and changes, with

participants required to obtain a Virtual Badge in advance, after certain criteria were met. The Virtual Badge was designed in conjunction with Fasig-Tipton, which held its Selected Yearlings Showcase Sept. 9-10 so that once a participant was approved to attend, the Virtual Badge could be used for both sales.

All Keeneland employees, consignors and staff, as well as veterinarians and staff, farriers, van representatives, media, and any other essential staff who will be interfacing with the public daily must provide proof of a negative COVID-19 test within 10 days of their first entry to either the Keeneland or Fasig-Tipton sale grounds, according to the Keeneland website.

Buyers, owners, and agents are not required to be tested but will be required to complete a health questionnaire prior to the sale, with testing available to buyers if requested.

All patrons accessing the grounds (including buyers) will complete a daily temperature check, with additional safety measures of mask usage and social distancing in place.

Seating the pavilion will be limited to 40% of capacity, with buyers encouraged to use the seats only when bidding and not throughout the sale session. There will be only two, not the usual

three, people in the auctioneers' stand and they will be shielded by plexiglass from the individuals handling the horses in the sale ring. Other changes include limited dining and drink options within the pavilion and there will be no printed sale summaries. Results will be available online only.

Consignments have been spaced to limit congestion during the inspection process and there have been more inspections taking place on farms prior to the sale, Russell said.

Russell and Arvin said all the logistics needed for the sale to take place had been a moving target.

"It's been such a movable thing it's been an unbelievable experience. If (COVID-19) was something that was very defined, it would have been a lot easier

to do," Russell said. "But things changed every week. At one stage we were told we couldn't use the sales pavilion. And now all of a sudden we're told you can use 40% of the sales pavilion."

Keeneland also enhanced the virtual tools that could be accessed by buyers unable to attend the sale, including having online videos of cataloged horses and incorporating online bidding into the live bidding process.

The sales company, along with other industry groups including Fasig-Tipton, worked to help ensure that as many international buyers as possible would have the ability to attend the sale.

"There was a presidential travel ban on people coming from Europe, England, and Ireland so we've called on all of our friends to try to help us," Arvin said, noting that the offices of Sen. Mitch McConnell, Congressman Andy Barr, and United Nations ambassador Kelly Craft assisted. "There was an exemption available from that travel ban so we were able to get a waiver for quite a few of those people."

Russell said other industry organizations teamed in that effort, since there was also interest in making sure participants would be able to travel to the U.S. for the Breeders' Cup at Keeneland in November.

As it turns out, the travel ban is scheduled to expire at midnight Sept. 13.

Russell said there are three groups of Japanese buyers already on the grounds and that a group of Russian buyers is planning to attend. He said that South Koreans are not facing travel restrictions to the U.S.

Not expected to attend the sale are Sheikh Mohammed and Sheikh Hamdan, from the ruling family of the United Arab Emirates, but they will be well-represented at the auction, Russell said.

"They have their bases here in Kentucky, so they've got people here," he said.

At last year's September sale, Sheikh Mohammed's Godolphin purchased 10 yearlings for \$16 million and Sheikh Hamdan's Shadwell operation purchased 18 for \$11.07 million.

Keeneland's September sale, which saw 2,974 yearlings change hands for \$372,348,400 last year, is historically the fourth major yearling sale of the season. This year, it has been preceded only by Fasig-Tipton's Selected Yearlings Showcase after that sale company's July sale in Kentucky and two auctions in Saratoga Springs, N.Y., were canceled.

Sellers, Buyers Glad for Opportunities

With the delayed start of the yearling sales season, sellers and buyers are grateful that perhaps the market schedule is back on track, with their hopes buoyed by the strong returns at the Fasig-Tipton sale earlier in the week, with 348 horses sold for \$61.765 million.

"There were winners and losers as there always are in the game, but the fact we had a sale was fantastic," said Kerry Cauthen of Four Star Sales. "When you had a top-class horse, you got top-class money. It created a marketplace and allowed us to have commerce. People who understand what we were dealing with, I think, would see (Fasig-Tipton) as a confidence builder. It's a rocky ride when you're recovering and it's not just a

nice, smooth curve back a position. I thought the fact we had commerce and you were able to get liquidity out of horses in and of itself was a touchdown."

Dr. Barry Eisaman, who with his wife Shari, is shopping for yearlings to sell as 2-year-olds, predicted prices will be down but that buyers have pent up demand.

"It's going to be down but I don't think it's going to be down as much as it could have been," Eisaman said. "People are tired of sitting on their hands and sitting on their money. And they're ready to play."

Even though the couple bought yearlings in a bull market last year and sold in a disrupted juvenile market in 2020, they made a profit.

"We sold every horse we had and we made money," he said. "We didn't have the rate of return we were

used to in past years. A big unknown is what is the 2-year-old market is going to be like in the next cycle. Hopefully, it will be better than (this) year." BH

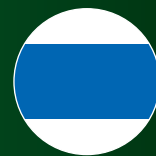

BREEDERS' CUP PLANS KEENELAND RETURN; NO FANS FOR 2020

One of Thoroughbred horse racing's most prestigious international events is coming back to the Bluegrass in 2022.

Keeneland, set to host the Breeders' Cup World Championships Nov. 6-7 in Lexington, will again be home to the championship event after an already scheduled 2021 running at Del Mar, it was announced Sept. 12.

The return to Lexington gives those who will miss out this year due to COVID-19 a chance to attend. In a development viewed as almost inevitable due to the ongoing pandemic, Breeders' Cup confirmed Saturday that the 2020 edition will be conducted without fans on the grounds. On-site attendance will be limited to essential personnel required to run the races, along with participants such as owners, horsemen, and jockeys, Breeders' Cup said.

Breeders' Cup also announced Saturday that the 2020 event will be run for \$31 million in purses and

awards, the same amount as in 2019. A \$4 million purse increase announced earlier this year has been postponed until 2021.

While 2020 purses and awards will decrease from what was originally planned before the pandemic, Breeders' Cup president and CEO Drew Fleming said maintaining the levels paid out in 2019 demonstrates his organization's commitment to the industry.

"That was a very easy decision on our end in a year when everybody is making very difficult ones," Fleming said Saturday during a conversation with BloodHorse. "The reason for maintaining our 2019 purse levels was simple. The nominators have always been there for Breeders' Cup since the beginning, and in times like this, it's important for Breeders' Cup to be there for the nominators."

With purses of \$6 million and \$4 million, the weekend's Longines Breeders' Cup Classic (G1) and Longines Breeders' Cup Turf (G1T) remain two of the richest races in the world.

Breeders' Cup follows in the footsteps of the Sept. 5 Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve

(G1), which was ultimately held without fans at Churchill Downs. Tracks across the country have conducted major races without fans in a similar manner due to COVID-19, with the June 20 Belmont Stakes Presented by NYRA Bets (G1) and upcoming Oct. 3 Preakness Stakes (G1) at the forefront, along with the entire summer meet July 16-Sept. 7 at Saratoga Race Course.

Host tracks saw a significant decline in all-sources handle on the Kentucky Derby and Belmont Stakes cards, but the Saratoga meeting offered a glimmer of hope. When the meet concluded Sept. 7, the New York Racing Association topped the \$700 million mark in all-sources handle for a second year in a row, finishing with a total of \$702,535,468. Even without fans on hand, the figure was a mere \$3 million below the record \$705.3 million handled in 2019.

"I think it's also important to note that general U.S. handle has done very well during the pandemic," Fleming said. "Despite a significantly decreased number of races, especially earlier in the year, handle has continued to be strong. We're obviously monitoring that very closely, but we've had great discussions with many trainers both domestic

and abroad who look forward to running their horses in the Breeders' Cup, and great field sizes and the best horses in the world lead to great betting. We have great fans, and we're anticipating great wagering."

While on-site attendance at sporting events in Kentucky has been limited since the state began to feel the impact of COVID-19 in March, the University of Kentucky football team will allow a limited number of fans to attend its home games this year, the first of which is slated for Oct. 3. The University of Louisville is also admitting fans to its games at 20% capacity in a season that began Saturday.

Those accessing the grounds at Keeneland in November will be subject to strict guidelines and protocols put in place as part of the organization's comprehensive COVID-19 health and safety plan, details of which will be announced closer to the event. The decision to run without fans was made after consulting with Kentucky Gov. Andy Beshear, Keeneland, local and state government and public health officials, and independent medical experts "to fully assess the conditions under which major sporting events may expect to operate safely in the coming months," Breeders' Cup stated in a release.

"The decision to hold this year's Breeders' Cup World Championships without fans in attendance was not made lightly," Fleming said. "However, after many months of careful deliberation, planning, and consultation, it has become abundantly clear that this is the right decision in order to proceed with our event while still protecting the collective health of our community. Despite many major racing events reducing purses significantly, we are proud to be able to maintain 2019 purse levels to support our nominators and horsemen during this challenging year."

Fleming also told BloodHorse that the Breeders' Cup has retained infectious disease specialist Dr. Richard Greenberg as a chief medical consultant.

Beshear, a Democrat, praised the organization's decision to run without fans via Twitter on Saturday, but not all feedback was positive. Kentucky State Representative Adam Koenig (Republican, Erlanger) called the decision "sad and frustrating."

"I've been to Ellis Park twice this year," Koenig tweeted. "I may have been to Kentucky Downs twice. Indiana Grand has patrons every day. There are others that have patrons. This can be done in a safe and reasonable manner."

Kentucky Senate Floor Majority Leader Damon Thayer Damon Thayer, a vocal critic of the way Beshear's office has handled the COVID-19 crisis, was even more succinct in his criticism. "This is a terrible decision," tweeted Sen. Thayer (Republican,

Georgetown), who worked as vice president of event management for Breeders' Cup from 1999-2007.

All 2020 ticket holders will receive a full refund and will also be granted first access to purchase the same or similar tickets for the 2022 Breeders' Cup

World Championships at Keeneland.

"While we are disappointed that we will not be joined by our fans on-site this year, our utmost priority is and always will be to conduct the Breeders' Cup World Championships in the safest way possible," said Fred Hertrich III, chairman of the Breeders' Cup board, which approves all host sites. "Lexington's local community of racing fans, businesses, and members of the Thoroughbred industry are the backbone of our sport, and we believe they deserve a second opportunity, in short order, to experience the event at its full potential."

The 2022 edition of the Breeders' Cup will mark the third time Keeneland has hosted the event since it first welcomed the World Championships in 2015. That year, Triple Crown winner American Pharoah electrified the world by becoming the first horse to win the Triple Crown and the Breeders' Cup Classic.

"While the World Championships will look different this year, Keeneland and Breeders' Cup remain committed to making the event the best it can be," said Bill Thomason, Keeneland president and CEO. "We are grateful to continue providing a platform for our athletes and horses to showcase their talent, and we are excited for the event to return in 2022, when fans can experience the full spectacle of Breeders' Cup in the Bluegrass as we originally intended."

Keeneland will run its fall meet Oct. 2-24, and has not announced whether it will allow fans to attend. After cancelling the spring meet due to COVID-19, the Lexington oval ran a brief summer meet in July without fans.


Breeders' Cup is working with its official broadcast partner, NBC Sports, to develop and introduce innovative and enhanced production elements that

will enhance the viewing experience for the influx of horse racing fans who will be watching the races from home. The organization is also implementing advanced technologies across its own digital platforms and channels to further engage with fans at home. The event will be broadcast live on NBC, NBCSN, NBCSports.com, and the NBC Sports app.

For those responsible for organizing the event known as horse racing's Super Bowl, the show must go on—as it has at various tracks across the country in one way or another, with ups and downs along the way.

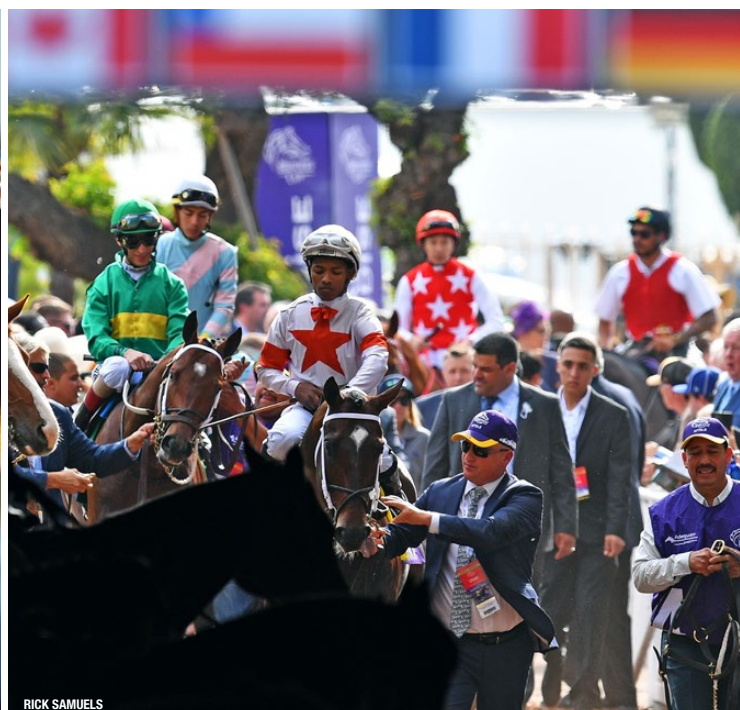
"Racing was uniquely positioned because unlike other sports that have a lot of human-to-human interaction, in racing we also have these special animals that require daily care regardless of what's going on in the world," Fleming told BloodHorse. "And from taking care of them to running them is not a major difference. That our sport has been able to continue on in the midst of the pandemic is also a great testament to the people who take care of the horses every day, who enable us to continue racing."

"Breeders' Cup has been in a position where we have had the benefit of looking at what other major sports have been doing, especially as we learn more about COVID-19. It's very much a fluid situation, and things can change quickly. We have a great team in place and a supportive board. We're anticipating the unexpected, and we'll be judged on how we adjust accordingly." **BH**

TAYLOR MADE OFFERS HALF BROTHER TO BY MY STANDARDS

With less than 24 hours to go before the Sept. 13 start of the Keeneland September Yearling Sale, buyers were out in force on the grounds of the Lexington auction house the morning of Sept. 12, taking advantage of the smaller crowds and cooler weather to make their short lists ahead of Book 1.

But out front of Barn 9, business was booming beneath the Taylor Made Sales Agency banner as a steady stream of agents and horsemen arrived for their scheduled shows to view one yearling after another.

"We started a new system where we are scheduling shows for the first couple hours in the morning," said Duncan Taylor, adding that the change had been put in place to help cut down on crowds and allow patrons to practice social distancing when possible. "So with that, it seems like we're not quite as busy but I think it's because we're starting everyone off in a different place so we don't have a rush of people in one zone."

"What is missing I think are a lot of the owners. Agents are here, but I think owners may not be coming for health reasons or otherwise. But as long as people are out looking, we're happy for that."

With one of the larger consignments in Book 1, Taylor Made has among its yearlings a promising colt in Hip 34. The son of Claiborne Farm stallion Runhappy had attracted the attention of several buyers including Runhappy's former trainer, Laura Wohlers.

Bred in Kentucky by Donald Ladd, Richard Reid, Martin Mueller, Joe Bowley, and Gary Randall, Hip 34 is out of the Muqtarib mare A Jealous Woman, who was a multiple stakes winner on the turf and also placed second in the Goldikova Stakes (G2T).

Among the mare's four registered foals is By My Standards, who most recently picked up his fourth graded win Sept. 4 at Churchill Downs when he took the Alysheba Stakes Presented by Sentient Jet (G2) on the Longines Kentucky Oaks (G1) undercard. By My Standards earned his prior stakes wins at 3 in the Twinspires.com Louisiana Derby (G2), New Orleans Classic (G2), and Oaklawn Handicap (G2). The 4-year-old has hit the board in 11 of his 12 career starts and banked over \$1.7 million in purses.

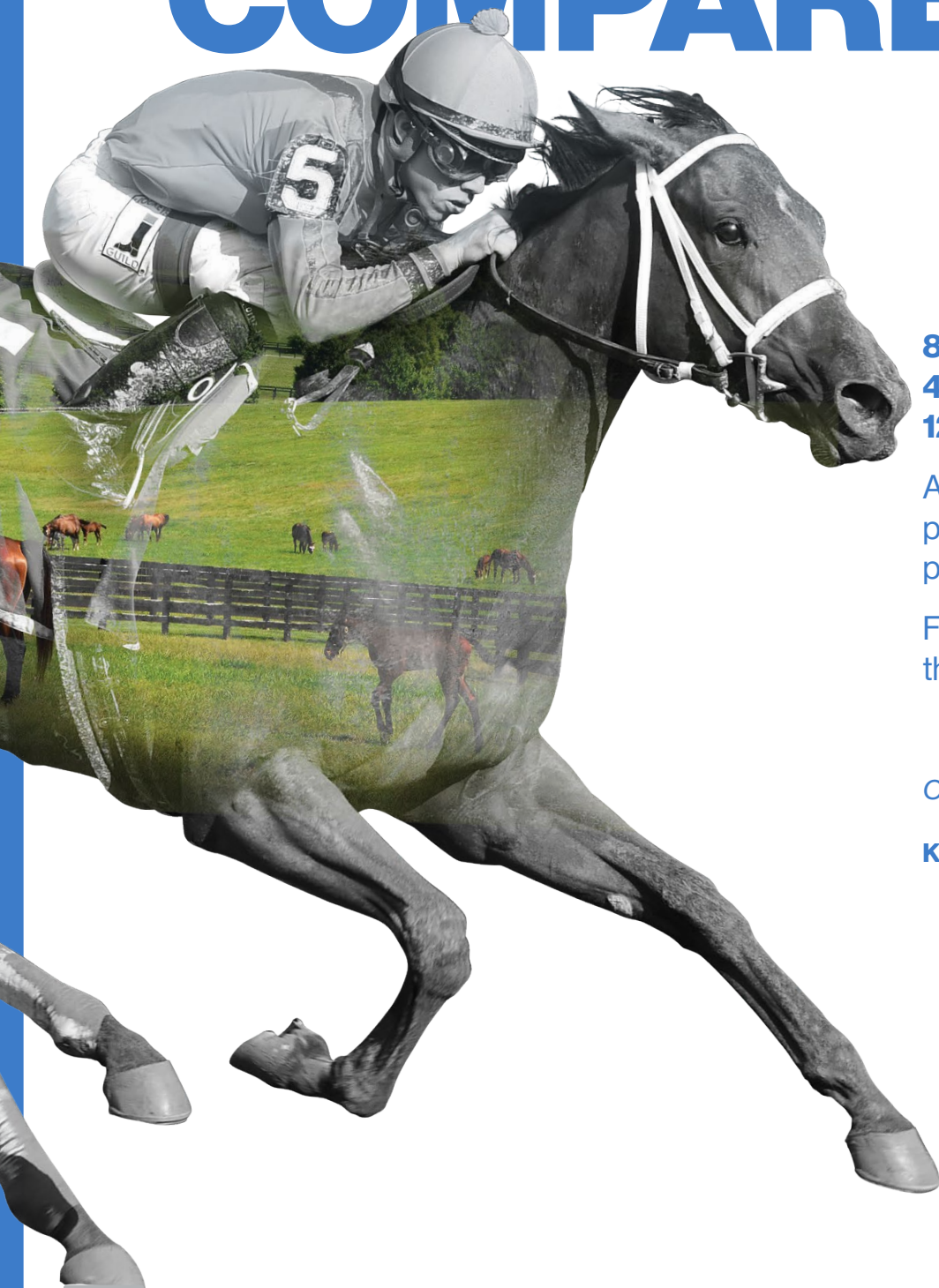

"I think that (the) half brother to By My Standards is a good-sized horse and he's shown himself well," said Taylor.

Now in his fourth year at stud, Runhappy got his first winner July 8 at Indiana Grand when his son Libertyrun drew away from the field to break his maiden on debut by 6 1/4 lengths. With several lucrative 2-year-old win incentives on offer on the East and West Coasts by Runhappy's breeder, Jim McIngvale, Taylor said it's important to remember that patience—in every facet of the Thoroughbred industry—is key.

"Runhappy didn't break his maiden until December and I think some people are getting impatient thinking that Runhappys maybe aren't going to run but I think we have to give them time. As many good-looking

Another popular pair of yearlings at the Taylor Made barn were Hips 23 and 192, which share a female family and are both offered on behalf of Siena Farm.

Hip 23 is a chestnut colt by Hill 'n' Dale Farms' Curlin out of the Bernardini mare Zayanna, who has already produced four winners from as many to race. Zayanna is the dam of Frizette Stakes (G1) winner Wicked Whisper and multiple grade 1-placed Point of Honor, who also captured the Black-Eyed Susan (G2) last year. Zayanna's daughter Velvet Mood won the My Dear Stakes and her gelding, Admiral Jimmy, ran third in the Tremont Stakes.

While she did not earn stakes black-type herself, several of Zayanna's half siblings proved themselves on the track. Among those are multiple graded stakes winner Mr. Freeze, Daytona Stakes (G3) winner

Zayanna's fourth foal, a filly by Union Rags now named Zuri, was purchased from the Taylor Made consignment



last year by Godolphin for \$1 million. She is currently in training at Saratoga Race Course.

Zayanna's half sister by Congrats, Heavenly View, is the dam of Hip 192, a colt by Darley's Street Sense. Heavenly View won twice on the track at 3, scoring at Gulfstream Park and Keeneland, and produced her first foal last year, a filly named St. Brigid by Will Take Charge, who has not yet started.

"That (Hip 192) is a really good-looking colt," said Duncan. "He is solid. We're really looking forward to seeing what that mare might do because her sister Zayanna is such a prolific producer. It's a great, great family." **BH**

STONEHAVEN TRIO BRINGS SIRE POWER TO KEENELAND OPENER

Stonehaven Steadings will offer a trio with plenty of sire power and productive female families during the Sept. 13 first session of the Keeneland September Yearling Sale, including a filly by last year's leading freshman sire and Triple Crown winner American Pharoah.

"We try to breed horses that give people a classic-type of horse down the line, that gives them the opportunity for a Saturday afternoon kind of deal," said Aidan O'Meara, Stonehaven's director of bloodstock. "I think all three of those fit the boxes in that department. They got the right sires, got the right type of two-turn physique, and should line up pretty good here for the future."

In addition to the American Pharoah filly, Stonehaven will also offer colts by Quality Road and Ghostzapper Sunday.

The filly, consigned as Hip 145, is the third foal out of the stakes-placed Big Brown mare Easy Living,

whose first foal, Life On the Road, was a debut winner last year at 2 at Ellis Park for trainer Steve Asmussen and is currently 1-for-11 with earnings of \$64,351. The filly's half sister by Quality Road, named Big City Momma, sold for \$700,000 at the same venue a year ago and is now in training with Shug McGaughey.

"She's a classic powerful, almost masculine, dark filly with a two-turn, beautiful stretch to her," O'Meara said of the American Pharoah daughter. "The fluidity of her movement, she's got a foot and a quarter of an overstep on her. She uses the motion through her shoulders the way she carries herself. She's acted (like) a class act since she got out here. You have them at the farm and they act beautifully, but you never know what they got mentally until you bring them out here and put a little mental pressure on them going straight into the sale atmosphere. You got to come out here and show like a queen right out of the gate or people are not going to shortlist if you're not acting the right way. She's been an absolute queen since she's been out here and has only gotten better and better since she got here."

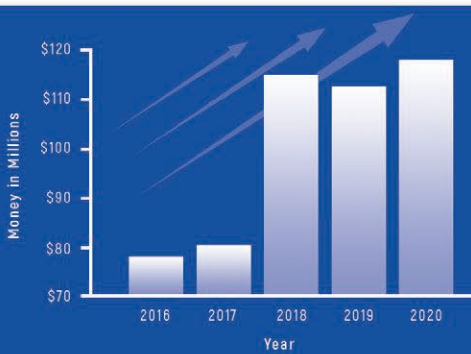

Hip 145's dam is one of 12 winners out of the Risen Star mare Jaramar Miss, who also produced stakes winners Jaramar Rain and Harbor Mist. Jaramar Rain is also the dam of three stakes-placed horses, including multiple graded-placed Imperial Council.

Stonehaven bred the yearling in Kentucky,

"We wouldn't normally breed to a horse in his fourth year but American Pharoah was the exception. His first crop of babies that hit the ground, obviously they sold well, but sometimes horses can sell well and they're a little bit over-hyped in the physique department, but he delivered," O'Meara said. "I've never seen a group of horses that were so well made and so good moving."

Stonehaven will send the Quality Road colt, co-bred by Bart Evans in Kentucky, through the ring early Sunday as Hip 10. The colt is out of the multiple grade 2 winner Wasted Tears, by Najran, and is a half brother to stakes-placed Coffee Crush.

"He's got what you'd describe as the classic Quality Road look to him, with a little bit more substance. He's a beautifully-built horse, from his front, to his shoulder, to the rippling muscle he has now," O'Meara said of the bay. "He's very similar to his sire through the topline, through his hip, and just another beautifully moving horse."

Hip 10's second and third dam are also stakes winners, and Wasted Tears is a half to two other stakes winners.

Going through the ring soon after will be the Ghostzapper colt as Hip 26. The dark bay or brown was bred in Kentucky by the Ghostzapper Syndicate and Tony Holmes. He is out of the Aptitude mare Abatis, a full sister to stakes winner Critical Moment and a half sister to group 3 winner Rerouted. The female family also features grade 1 winners Flute and Weep No More, as well as graded stakes winners Filimbi and Current.

"He's a classic, two-turn type as well," O'Meara said of Hip 26. "He's got the brain—not a super heavily hipped horse—but he's got that two-turn frame and that fluidity of movement to him as well."

O'Meara noted how tough the Book 1-level of the two-week-long Keeneland September Sale can be for yearlings who don't have the proven stallions on their page, adding that top-end buyers aren't likely to pull them out of the stall if a quality sire isn't listed.

"You've got to get excited about these horses when you're putting the mating together in the first place and if you're not excited about what you see in the resulting foals at the farm and then what they turn into as yearlings you can't expect people to come out here and get excited about them any more than you," he said. "You've got to have the right kind of sire power and the physique to back them up at the end of the day." **BH**

ATTITUDE IS EVERYTHING FOR FIRST CROP BY ARROGATE

The first crop by Arrogate falls into two groups where conformation is concerned, according to Juddmonte Farms' general manager Garrett O'Rourke: those that favor Arrogate as big, strapping two-turn types, and those that have physiques indicating more preciousness and speed that favors the stallion's broodmare sire Distorted Humor.

What almost all of them seem to possess, however, is Arrogate's attitude.

"His temperament, perhaps, is coming through the strongest of anything; that relentlessness that won him an awful lot of races," said O'Rourke during a break from inspecting Book 1 horses for the Keeneland September Yearling Sale. "The people we've talk to say these horses are strong-minded, courageous, tough horses that like to rough and tumble. He was like that himself."

Arrogate at Juddmonte Farms

Seeing the talent underscores the magnitude of the loss Juddmonte suffered earlier this year when Arrogate, a 7-year-old son of Unbridled's Song, was euthanized June 2 after incurring a neurological

injury to his spinal cord.

"He had a core lesion in his spinal cord that basically rendered him a quadriplegic," said O'Rourke. "We don't know exactly how it occurred. He didn't have a fall or major accident that was obvious to have caused it, other than he was a horse that was always rearing and bucking and playing about. Some kind of whiplash effect might have caused what was more than a million-to-one shot, more like a 20-million-to-one shot."

O'Rourke said the stallion started to show signs of trouble one morning after covering a mare. Two days later, he collapsed in his stall.

"He was standing in his stall and shook himself a few times early one morning, we have it on the security camera, and then just collapsed and never got up again. It wasn't until the postmortem that we discovered his spinal cord had a lesion that would not have repaired. It was heartbreaking," he said.

Now O'Rourke said he looks forward to seeing Arrogate's progeny prove themselves in the most important races worldwide, as Arrogate did.

Arrogate carried the top fee of \$75,000 when his sire class entered stud in 2018. Victories in four graded stakes supported that fee. He earned the 2016 champion 3-year-old title after scoring five consecutive wins that culminated in victories in the Travers Stakes (G1)—which he won by 13 1/2 lengths while breaking a 36-year-old track record for 1 1/4 miles—and the Breeders' Cup Classic (G1), in which he beat 2016 Horse of the Year California Chrome.

He kicked off his 4-year-old season by winning the inaugural \$12 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational (G1) in track-record time and followed with an astounding last-to-first win in the \$10 million Dubai World Cup Sponsored By Emirates Airline (G1). Arrogate retired with a 7-1-1 record from 11 starts.

Arrogate was out of the Distorted Humor stakes winner Bubbler, who also has produced stakes winner Osare (Medaglia d'Oro) and is a half sister to stakes winner Unbridled Femme (Unbridled). Bubbler's granddam is six-time grade 1 winner and champion Meadow Star.

After the Sept. 9-10 Fasig-Tipton Select Yearling Showcase, Arrogate, Three Chimneys Farm's Gun Runner, and Claiborne Farm's Mastery rose to the top of their sire class by average price. Gun Runner led with a \$331,429 average from seven sold, followed by Mastery with a \$257,143 average from seven sold, and Arrogate with a \$256,667 average from six sold.

Arrogate's top seller at the Fasig-Tipton sale was a \$400,000 colt (Hip 393) out of the Smart Strike mare Succeeding that Breeze Easy bought out of the Hill 'n' Dale Sales Agency consignment. None of Arrogate's progeny in the Fasig-Tipton sale sold for less than \$100,000. Two fell short of their reserves.

As of Saturday, he had 51 horses set to go through the ring at Keeneland.

"He has a few stars at Keeneland that have the look and appearance of big, two-turn classic horses, like him. They should sell accordingly," O'Rourke said.

"Everyone knows where the big prize money is in this game—the Breeders' Cup Classic, the Travers, the Dubai World Cup, and now the Saudi Cup. Everybody wants those mile-and-an-eighth, mile-and-a-quarter horses, and his offspring should be set up to be fully competitive in these races," O'Rourke continued. "We were prepared to breed these types of horses for the next 15 years and then the carpet gets pulled out from underneath. We're obviously sorry for (Juddmonte owner) Prince Khalid (Abdullah) and Juddmonte, but also sorry for the industry as a whole. We like to admire the superstars of the sport right on through their stallion careers and that has been taken away from us. Hopefully something in the crops that he has will continue his legacy." **BH**

CON TE PARTIRO BOUND FOR BREEDERS' CUP, KEENELAND SALE

Internationally successfully race mare Con Te Partiro—a stakes winner in the U.S., Britain, and Australia—is being pointed for the Breeders' Cup Nov. 7 at Keeneland before selling at Keeneland's November Breeding Stock Sale Nov. 9.

Racing for owner Newgate SF and trained by Gai Waterhouse and Adrian Bott in Australia, Con Te Partiro this year won two group 1 events: the 7 1/2-furlong Coolmore Classic and 1-mile Coolmore Legacy Stakes, both on turf. Last year at 5, Con Te Partiro won a group 3 in her Australian debut.

The well-traveled 6-year-old daughter of Scat Daddy has started at 14 tracks on three continents over five seasons of racing.

"It is remarkable to reflect on what Con Te Partiro has achieved in her racing career," Waterhouse said in a Keeneland release. "It is a rare feat in itself to win stakes races on three continents, but it is her performances at the elite level in Australia for which she will be remembered. Con Te Partiro won both of the time-honored group 1 races, the Coolmore Classic and the Coolmore Legacy, making her, arguably, the best-performed mare in Australia."

Con Te Partiro's return to Keeneland will come more than four years after she opened her career at the Lexington track with a dominating 5 1/2-length victory on dirt as a 2-year-old for trainer Wesley Ward and owner Hat Creek Racing in the spring of 2016. Transferred to turf, she won the Bolton Landing at Saratoga Race Course by 5 3/4 lengths and was second against males in the Juvenile Turf Sprint on the Breeders' Cup undercard that year at Santa Anita Park.

Her 3-year-old campaign included a trip to England, where she won the Sandringham Stakes at Royal Ascott, and she raced in grade 1 stakes at Del Mar and Keeneland. The next season, she was third in the Arlington Matron Stakes (G3) in Chicago.

Con Te Partiro is out of the grade 1-placed Street Cry mare Temple Street. She is a half-sister to stakes winner and multiple graded stakes-placed Donworth.

SF Bloodstock and Newgate Farm purchased the filly for \$575,000 from the Ashview Farm consignment in 2018 at The November Sale, Fasig-Tipton's marquee breeding sale in Lexington.

"Con Te Partiro truly is a one-of-a-kind mare," said Tom Ryan of SF Bloodstock in the Keeneland release. "Her accomplishments on the track—including two grade 1 wins in Australia, stakes victories at both the Royal Ascot and Saratoga race meets and successes on both dirt and turf—put her in an elite category of racehorses with the ability to perform at the highest level around the world.

"We purchased her in 2018 as a beautiful stakes-winning filly by Scat Daddy from the family of Into Mischief, and we are proud to say she has exceeded all expectations since."

She is also a graduate of Keeneland's 2015 September Yearling Sale, having been purchased by Cromwell Bloodstock for \$130,000 when consigned by Taylor Made for her breeder, K. C. Garrett Farm.

"Con Te Partiro has excelled at the highest level of international racing while she has exemplified just how small the global Thoroughbred industry is," Keeneland president-elect and interim head of sales Shannon Arvin said in the release. "We are thrilled to hold a Keeneland homecoming for Con Te Partiro. She sold as a yearling at the September Sale and she began her racing career here during the 2016 spring meet. We look forward to presenting her at the November Sale with all the fanfare she deserves." **BH**

MIGHTY HEART LEADS THROUGHOUT IN QUEEN'S PLATE ROMP

Mighty Heart lived up to his name with a dominating score in the 161st running of the Queen's Plate Sept. 12 at Woodbine, where the one-eyed colt trounced 13 rivals as a 13-1 longshot.

Originally slated for June 27, North America's oldest continually run race was moved to Saturday due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

For the connections of Mighty Heart, it was well worth the wait.

Bred and owned by Lawrence Cordes, the son of Dramedy flew under the radar leading up to the Plate, but the Ontario-bred bay, in his first stakes test, landed in the winner's circle courtesy of a sensational wire-to-wire score in the CA\$1,002,400 (US\$760,633) classic.

Mighty Heart, trained by Josie Carroll, was directed to the front from post 13 as jockey Daisuke Fukumoto guided his charge over to the rail while the field passed the wire for the first time. He was joined to the outside by Tecumseh's War, while Truebelieve sat third, with Plate Trial winner Clayton settling in fourth. Favored Curlin's Voyage was forced into an outside journey as the field headed into the first turn of the 1 1/4-mile

Tapeta test and through an opening quarter in :23.57.

One length on top after a half in :47.61, Mighty Heart was still yet to be tested, but just after the 1:12.70 three-quarters mark, Curlin's Voyage began her move from eighth. Clayton also was charging for home and made a bid to engage the pacesetter, but to no avail, as the leader easily repelled the challenge and rocketed on to a 7 1/2-length score.

"Unbelievable," said Fukumoto, who won in his first Queen's Plate start. "I can't explain. He's feeling good today, he bolted good. I saw that nobody (was going for the lead), so I just sent him and he just kept going.

After the wire, he still kept going. He didn't stop there."

Belichick rallied to grab second, while Clayton settled for third, a neck in front of Tecumseh's War. Curlin's Voyage, Canada's champion 2-year-old filly, was a head back in fifth.

It was a 1-2-5 finish with three starters for Carroll, who celebrated her third "Gallop for the Guineas" crown. The Canadian Hall of Fame inductee took the 2006 edition with Edenswold and the 2011 running with the filly Inglorious.

The final time was 2:01.98, the second-fastest edition of the Queen's Plate run since 1957. Izvestia, who went on to win the 1990 Triple Crown, won in 2:01 4/5ths.

"I was concerned for a minute or two with the quick fractions but he looked like he was settling and doing it easily," said Carroll. "We knew he'd go all day and he sure did. You know what, he's just a very exciting horse who's come a long way for Mr. Cordes, who's had a lot of confidence in him from the start."

Mighty Heart, who returned \$28.50 for a \$2 win ticket, now has two wins and a third from five starts. Out of the winning City Place mare Emma's Bullseye, he broke his maiden in his third start, a 4 1/4-length

score at 1 1/16 miles July 11 at Woodbine, and arrived at the Queen's Plate off a third-place performance at the same distance. He is by far the most accomplished runner for Emma's Bullseye, who produced three winners from three starters and was last reported bred to Amis Gizmo for 2020.

"He was sharp today," praised Fukumoto. "I thought it was fast but I took the lead so I can't do anything, you know, I let him go. He only has one eye, but he's got a big heart, a mighty heart."

The \$400,000 Prince of Wales Stakes, a 1 3/16-mile race Sept. 29 over Fort Erie's dirt oval, is the next race in the tri-surface OLG Canadian Triple Crown series, which winds up with the \$400,000 Breeders' Stakes at 1 1/2 miles on the E.P. Taylor Turf Course back at Woodbine Oct. 24.

Wando, in 2003, was the last horse to sweep the series and the seventh since its exception in 1959. **BH**

RIDEFORTHECAUSE UPSETS CAMBIER PARC IN CANADIAN

Sam-Son Farm's homebred Rideforthecause stepped up to graded action for the first time in the CA\$286,000 (\$US217,019) Canadian Stakes Presented by the Japan Racing Association (G2T) Sept. 12 at Woodbine and rolled to a four-length victory at 22-1 odds.

The 4-year-old Candy Ride filly ridden by David Moran was near the back of the pack through the early running of the filly and mare turf event conducted at about 1 1/8 miles, and rallied down the outside. She took over from 4-5 favorite Cambier Parc midway down the stretch and continued on to a final time of 1:45 on firm turf.

"This filly loves this distance," said trainer Gail Cox. "I think she's run really well this year. She had one race where she was sort of too close to the pace and didn't run the greatest, but she's a tough filly. She just hasn't had the opportunity to get the distance very often."

Rideforthecause entered the Canadian off an Aug. 1 local allowance/optional claiming victory covering 1 1/16 miles on the inner turf. She ran that distance in 1:41.34, missing the track record by :0.06.

Another Time set the Canadian pace up front with a length advantage as she ran quarter-mile fractions of :23.80, :46.55, and 1:09.49, at which point her

leading margin was cut to a head. Cambier Parc had sat off the pace under Rafael Hernandez and took over at the top of the stretch, but her lead was brief as Rideforthecause closed fast.

Moran settled Rideforthecause sixth of eight early and the pair dropped back to seventh at the half-mile point before picking off rivals. He guided the bay filly two to four wide late in the turn before setting his mount down for the drive. Rideforthecause ran a mile in 1:32.75 before completing the final eighth in :12.25.

"I had a great trip," said Moran. "She settled back there nice and relaxed. I got a nice inside move just past the three to the 2 1/2 (poles), and just got myself in a good position to take on Raffi (Hernandez). And when I felt her picking up and kicking by him, I said, 'Oh, we have a shot to win this!' and she kept going very gamely."

Cambier Parc stayed on for second and Court Return rallied from last for third. Elizabeth Way, Bold Script, Art of Almost, Another Time, and Amalfi Coast completed the order of finish.

Rideforthecause was bred in Ontario and is the second foal out of the Giant's Causeway mare Danceforthecause, also dam of grade 2-placed Say the Word. Danceforthecause has produced two more fillies following Rideforthecause—a yearling by Distorted Humor and an April foal by Street Sense. She was reported bred to Twirling Candy this year. Rideforthecause's third dam is Canadian Horse of the Year and U.S. champion Dance Smartly.

From 10 starts, Rideforthecause has a record of 4-0-1 and has earned US\$263,931. **BH**

ARKLOW CAPTURES KENTUCKY TURF CUP FOR SECOND TIME

Leading into the Sept. 12 Calumet Farm Kentucky Turf Cup (G3T), trainer Brad Cox expected the addition of blinkers in the 29th start of Arklow's career would result in improvement from the veteran campaigner.

This wasn't mere optimistic thinking. Wearing the headgear Saturday at Kentucky Downs, the 6-year-old was much closer to the pace and kept the same kick. The multi-millionaire pulled off a mild 5-1 surprise over Red Knight and favored Zulu Alpha in the \$910,000, 1 1/2-mile turf race over soft going.

The son of Arch recorded his fifth graded stakes triumph and his second in the Kentucky Turf Cup after winning it in 2018 for owners Donegal Racing, Joseph Bulger, and Peter Coneway. He also avenged a local defeat to Zulu Alpha, who beat him in the 2019 race.

Arklow was always within a few lengths of the leaders on Saturday. He moved up to fourth behind modest early splits of :50.27 and 1:14.67 set early by Changi and Postulation. Then as Changi began to retreat, and Eons took the lead after a mile in 1:39.47, Arklow advanced.

He wrested command soon after 1 1/4 miles and withstood stretch bids from Red Knight and Zulu Alpha down the lane. He won by a length and a quarter over Red Knight, with Zulu Alpha another length back in third. The winner was timed in 2:28.66 for 1 1/2 miles, returning \$13.60.

"I just nursed him around and he waited for my signal down the stretch. He was able to hold off those horses pretty easily," said jockey Florent Geroux.

"He was pretty sharp coming into this race," Cox said. "It's easy to say it now, but we had a lot of confidence that he would move forward with the blinkers. He likes it down here and obviously when it started raining it gave us even more confidence. He definitely likes a little juice in the ground, and he responded well."

Red Knight ran competitively in his first start since January. Zulu Alpha, on the other hand, was a bit slow into stride, and after looming at the top of the stretch, could not manage to pass the top two.

"The only thing I would say is that maybe the ground was getting away from him down the stretch," said jockey Tyler Gaffalione. "He was really digging in, trying to go get that horse, but it was just breaking away from him. Might be a little soft out there for him. It was a great performance. He tried hard the whole way. He's all class and hopefully we'll rebound in the Breeders' Cup."

The Longines Breeders' Cup Turf (G1T) Nov. 7 at Keeneland could also be in the plans for Arklow, as it has been the past two years. He ran fourth in the 2018 edition and eighth last year after winning the Joe Hirsch Turf Classic (G1T) at Belmont Park. Zulu Alpha was fourth in 2019.

Bred in Kentucky by John and Frank Penn, Arklow is one of two graded winners from the Empire Maker mare Unbridled Empire, the other being 2018 Palm Beach Stakes (G3T) and American Turf Stakes (G2T) winner Maraud.

Jerry Crawford, president of Donegal, purchased Arklow for \$160,000 at the 2015 Keeneland September Yearling Sale from the Penn Sales consignment. **BH**

KY DOWNS LADIES SPRINT NOT TOO SHORT FOR GOT STORMY

When rain started falling at Kentucky Downs, it made trainer Mark Casse nervous, to say the least.

"I wasn't worried a little bit," Casse said about a storm that left the turf course in soft condition. "I was worried a lot."

Yet not even Mother Nature could faze Got Stormy on a soggy Sept. 12 afternoon as the 5-year-old Get Stormy mare made a highly successful turf sprint debut when she surged to a 3 1/4-length victory under jockey Tyler Gaffalione in the 6 1/2-furlong \$498,000 Kentucky Downs Ladies Sprint Stakes (G3T).

The race was the shortest for Gary Barber's grade 1-winning mare since her Dec. 2, 2017 debut, when she was third going at 7 1/2 furlongs. Now Casse believes the runner-up in last year's TVG Breeders' Cup Mile (G1T) may have found a new niche that will most likely take her to the Nov. 7 Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint (G1T) at Keeneland.

"I don't think I'll run her in the Mile," Casse said. "At Keeneland in the fall the turf is usually soft and I don't think she'll get a mile over it. I asked Tyler after the race 'What do you think about the Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint?' and he said, 'I love it and she'll love it.' It's something Gary and I will have to discuss but I'd say

that's where we're heading, especially at Keeneland. The course plays a little longer than 5 1/2 furlongs there and I think she'll love it."

As much as the daughter of the Malabar Gold mare Super Phoebe prefers hard turf, Casse says Got Stormy's issue with soft ground is that she cannot run as far over it. That's why he says he would have scratched Got Stormy if Saturday's race was at a mile and why a sprint at the Breeders' Cup should fit her.

"She handles the soft turf," Casse said. "It just decreases how far she can run. Today she was amazing in a sprint. Tyler said she could have been on the lead."

The victory was the first in six 2020 starts for Got Stormy, and gave her nine wins in 24 races and pushed her earnings to over \$1.9 million. She is the lone stakes winner from Super Phoebe's seven foals to race.

A yearling out of Super Phoebe by Mohaymen, who was bought by Redly Bloodstock for \$145,000 from the Pope McLean consignment at the 2019 Fasig-Tipton Kentucky Fall Mixed Sale, is scheduled to sell as Hip 1195 from the Paramount Sales, Agent LXVIII, consignment at the upcoming Keeneland September Yearling Sale.

Longshots Surrender Now and Bohemian Bourbon set the pace in the Ladies Sprint, going a half-mile in :46.27. Gaffalione was fifth with the 9-5 favorite at that point, then kicked Got Stormy into top gear from the three path in the stretch to take a half-length lead at the eighth pole and draw clear while Winning Envelope rallied from last in the field of 12 to be second.

Got Stormy (\$5.80) covered the 6 1/2 furlongs in 1:15.41.

Lothenbach Stables' Winning Envelope, a 4-year-old More Than Ready filly trained by Chris Block, was second by a half-length over G. Chris Coleman and Brad E. King's Into Mystic, a 4-year-old Into Mischief filly trained by Brendan Walsh.

Intuicao, Jakarta and Kimari were scratched.

As a footnote to Saturday's win, aside from giving her a positive experience over soft turf, it also added to Get Stormy's lengthy travel log as Kentucky Downs became the 12th track she has visited.

"In the paddock, she was looking around as if she was saying, 'Where do you have me now?' We've taken her all over," Casse said. **BH**

REGAL GLORY CATCHES MITCHELL ROAD IN LADIES TURF

Neither the competition nor the weather could slow Regal Glory in the \$500,000 Kentucky Downs Ladies Turf Stakes (G3T) Sept. 12 at Kentucky Downs.

Facing six foes over a yielding course hit by a mid-afternoon downpour, the 4-year-old Animal Kingdom filly ran down a stubborn leader in Mitchell Road to notch a neck victory, her first win in three starts this year.

Confidently handled into midstretch by Jose Ortiz, the Paul Pompa homebred moved out of her pace-chasing position to catch the leader in the race's final stages to complete a mile in 1:34.34. She paid \$4.80 as the favorite.

Mitchell Road, a half sister to 2019 Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) winner Country House, set an uncontested pace with fractions of :23.42, :47.19, and 1:11.26. She finished a clear second, 1 1/2 lengths in front of third-place Tapit Today, Regal Glory's stablemate.

Lady Apple, Secret Message, Frond, and Princess Causeway rounded out the order of finish. English Affair was scratched.

Chad Brown trains Regal Glory, as he does Tapit Today.

"That was definitely a hard-fought stretch victory when it looked like our filly was poised to just take them easily," said Brown assistant Whit Beckman. "But you've got to give it to Mitchell Road. She ran a heck of a race.

"(Regal Glory) was definitely getting a little class relief coming down here, but it's always an X factor with the set-up and everything. She ran a tremendous race. I mean she looked like the winner every step of the way to me."

Regal Glory had no difficulty with the yielding turf. Earlier in her career she had captured three stakes on wet ground, including the Penn Oaks and Lake Placid Stakes (G2T). The latter victory came in a dead heat with Varenka.

"She handled the course really well. I knew she could handle the soft turf, since she's already won on it twice, so I was very confident going into the race," said Ortiz.

Regal Glory notched her sixth victory in 11 starts in taking the Ladies Turf and increased her earnings to \$773,884. The Kentucky-bred is out of the grade 2-winning More Than Ready mare Mary's Follies, making her a half sister to grade 3 winner Night Prowler and Cafe Pharoah, a grade 3 winner in Japan.

Animal Kingdom, relocated to stand in Japan for the 2020 breeding season, won on turf, synthetic, and dirt—scoring his most memorable victory in the 2011 Kentucky Derby. He stood at Darley in Kentucky from 2014-19. **BH**

BREEZE EASY DOUBLES AT KY DOWNS WITH IMPRIMIS, OUTADORE

Breeze Easy had two runners entered in stakes Sept. 12 at Kentucky Downs and swept both races, taking the \$588,000 Runhappy Turf Sprint (G3T) with Imprimis and the \$492,875 Kentucky Downs Juvenile Turf Sprint with Outadore.

Imprimis has now crossed the finish line first in both of his starts this year, though he was disqualified to third for interference in the Aug. 8 Troy Stakes (G3T) at Saratoga Race Course. There was no question about his victory Saturday. The 6-year-old Broken Vow gelding rallied from eighth and got up by a neck while three wide. He edged Front Run the Fed and Bombard, leaving those two to dead heat for second.

As part of the Breeders' Cup Challenge Series, Saturday's win awarded Imprimis an automatic berth in the Nov. 7 Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint (G1T) at Keeneland. Trainer Joseph Orseno Jr., who shook off feelings of the Troy, said that racet is the goal.

"None of us were happy about (the Troy disqualification). I'd say 90% of the people, because they're my friends or trying to make me feel better,

they all thought we got a bad deal. But it is what it is," Orseno said. "You can't take the win away from the horse. He ran his heart out off a 10-month layoff. Went up there, and won that. We're going to get to our goal, that's the Breeders' Cup. He loves Keeneland. So we're pretty excited."

Imprimis was sixth in the 2019 Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint at Santa Anita Park before returning in the Troy.

"I'd say three-quarters of (the time off) was by design. We did a throat surgery on him (a procedure known as a 'tie-back'). We weren't quite happy with it, so we went ahead and just touched it up again," Orseno said. "Instead of rushing him back, we talked about it with the racing manager and we said if he has two races before the Breeders' Cup, we'd be happy with that. We picked out the Troy like 10 months ago when he was on the table. We made the Troy and we liked the timing for this race."

Bombard set the pace in the Turf Sprint and ran a quarter-mile in :22.39, at which point Imprimis was fifth under Irad Ortiz Jr. Imprimis was shuffled back to eighth at the half-mile point, which Bombard ran in :45.95. Front Run the Fed also came from off the pace and was ahead of Imprimis, but that didn't stop the eventual winner from rallying strongly to complete the six furlongs on soft turf in 1:09.93. Behind Front Run the Fed and Bombard, Stubbins got up for fourth.

"He ran big. I rode him before on the soft turf at Pimlico, and I knew he handled it pretty good," Ortiz said of the winner. "So I wasn't afraid. I rode him with confidence. They moved outside of me, and I didn't want to see that, but they moved so I said let me just wait because it was a little early. When I tipped him out, he responded really well. He was coming."

Imprimis paid \$8.00 as the favorite. His record stands at 8-0-2 from 15 starts and he has earned \$759,948.

The gelding was bred in Florida by Craig Wheeler out of the Put It Back mare Shoppers Return and ran twice for his breeder before Breeze Easy's Mike Hall and Sam Ross purchased him.

"We bought the horse from Craig Wheeler and his wife Liz Wheeler," Hall said. "They're awesome people. They told me they were selling me a good horse. Some people you can believe and I have a lot of respect for them. They sold us a good horse. We've had a lot of success with him, the most fun horse I've ever owned. It's really great and now we're off to the Breeders' Cup."

Outadore Goes 2-for-2

Two races earlier Breeze Easy's Outadore stayed perfect in his second outing and won the Kentucky Downs Juvenile Turf Sprint by 1 3/4 lengths. The Outwork colt completed the 6 1/2 furlongs on soft turf in 1:17.31 and paid \$5.60 as the favorite.

Ortiz was also aboard for the victory; he won four races during the afternoon.

Trained by Wesley Ward, Outadore bested his stablemate and runner-up Fauci. Cowan rallied for third and County Final was fourth after setting fractions of :21.79 and :46.50.

"He's a nice horse, really nice horse," Ortiz said of his winning mount. "He broke good over there. He probably needed that first race when he won. He was ready today. He knew what he was doing. He broke and pulled me right there. He relaxed so nice, when I asked he just went ahead. It felt like he had a little more in the tank today."

Ward said he believes both Outadore and Fauci will go a mile on the grass with no problem. He will likely split them up for their next race—one to the Oct. 3 Pilgrim Stakes (G2T) at Belmont Park and one to the Oct. 4 Bourbon Stakes (G2T) at Keeneland. Both races are 1 1/16 miles, and the colts could be pointed to the Nov. 6 Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf (G1T).

Outadore was at 5 1/2 furlongs first time out July 26 on the Saratoga turf.

"He took a little while with some minor shin issues, as most 2-year-olds do. So we gave him the

time," Ward said. "Sam Ross, his owner with Mike Hall, is a wonderful guy, and he's jumping up and down and screaming in West Virginia. That's the way you want these owners to be."

Outadore, who has earnings of \$334,100, was bred in Kentucky by Deann Baer and Greg Baer out of the black-type-placed Tactical Cat mare Adore You. He is a half brother to stakes winners Mind Reader and Piedi Bianchi.

The gray or roan colt was originally purchased as a weanling for \$140,000 by Ted Champion from the Wynnstay Sales consignment to the Keeneland November Breeding Stock Sale. Breeze Easy then paid \$290,000 for him at the Keeneland September Yearling Sale when he was consigned by Paramount Sales.

"The horse is going wonderful and Wesley is doing a good job with the horse," Hall said. "(Racing manager) Mike Mollica and I picked this horse out at Keeneland sale last year and we're back shopping this year. We're really happy with this horse and looking forward to going to the Breeders' Cup." **BH**

HOMEBRED VEQUIST PUTS SWILCAN STABLES IN SPOTLIGHT

Swilcan Stables, Gary Barber, and Wachtel Stable's Vequist broke her maiden in spectacular fashion with a 9 1/2-length romp in the Sept. 6 Spinaway Stakes (G1) at Saratoga Race Course. The 2-year-old Nyquist filly shipped in from her Parx Racing base with trainer Butch Reid Jr. following a nose loss in her career debut July 29. Vequist is a homebred for Swilcan Stables and was foaled in Kentucky out of Swilcan's grade 2-placed Mineshaft mare Vero Amore. Her win, along with Spinaway third Lady Lilly, moved Nyquist to the top of the freshman stallion rankings.

Swilcan Stables is also the owner of Poseidon's Warrior, winner of the 2012 Alfred G. Vanderbilt Handicap (G1), who moved to stand at Equistar Training and Breeding in Pennsylvania this year. BloodHorse spoke to Swilcan's Tom McGrath about his recent success with Vequist and his Pennsylvania-based operation that focuses on breeding to race.

MarketWatch: What were thoughts on Vequist's performance in the Spinaway?

Tom McGrath: We were blown away. We knew she had speed, we knew she wanted to go long, but it was so impressive for a young filly. I'm fortunate to have the partners I have, Gary Barber and Adam Wachtel. They had a discussion with Butch and pointed her to that race. Had we had her on our own I doubt we would have taken that chance, but it's a lot of fun to be a part of it.

MW: Nyquist is doing well so far with his first crop. What are you seeing from the stallion?

TM: He's really having a good year. My mind's almost made up that we're going to go back there with Vero Amore. He's impressive and there's a lot more to come.

MW: And you still have Poseidon's Warrior?

TM: We do. We made a deal on him to purchase the rest of him and we brought him home. It was a little late

when we got him home last year so we're looking forward to this year, having the time to be more organized. We've had some success with homebreds from him as well.

MW: Where are your mares and foals kept?

TM: We have a couple with Butch's brother, Mark and Barbara Reid, at Walnut Green in Pennsylvania and we have one down in Maryland with Sabrina Moore at GreenMount. "Vero" is in Kentucky at Brookdale. She's actually up here now and will be heading back there. We're breeding Kentucky-breds with Vero Amore and some Pennsylvania-breds over at Mark and Barbara's place, and then we're doing a single mare down at Sabrina's place.

MW: Vequist's dam, is she back in foal currently?

TM: She is. She's back in foal to Accelerate.

MW: Being based in Pennsylvania and a stallion owner, what are your thoughts on the region's market and racing?

TM: We were excited to bring Poseidon's Warrior up here beginning this year, then politics got into it and they were talking about raiding the purse funds. Everything went kind of sideways. I'm hoping that's behind us and that we have a better year. There are a lot of people that count on that fund to help with racing. Pennsylvania was doing a fantastic job of growing the sport in our state. I haven't heard any talk of it lately and I'm hoping that we

won't. As the owner of a stallion I love our sport in the state. There are a lot of good people who work very hard in it, and it brings a lot back to the state of Pennsylvania. I'm hoping we're back to normal for the season.

MW: What did Poseidon's Warrior do for your racing operation?

TM: The grade 1 win enabled us to get more involved, and with breeding we've had some success with some of his foals—Navy Commander, Splicethemainbrace, Mr Thrifty. We had some fun. Being able to win a grade 1 race was amazing, and then after that Vero Amore ran second in the 2014 Black-Eyed Susan Stakes (G2). That was a race for the books even though we didn't win. It was an exciting race.

MW: What kind of qualities are you seeing Vero Amore pass on now as a broodmare?

TM: She was tenacious. "Vero" was a little on the smaller side and this filly, Vequist, is nice, big. She really has beautiful muscles, her structure's great. I think the combination of Nyquist and "Vero" gives you the size, the speed, and the tenacity. It was only Vequist's second race, so we'll see where she goes. I'm hoping for great things. I'm anxious to see what she does next time out.

MW: When and how did you get involved in racing?

TM: I had a neighbor, there were five of them that put in together to buy a horse and the horse they bought was Afleet Alex. I enjoyed watching that from the side and I told my friend, Joe Lerro, that if he ever did it again I'd love to be involved. Joe and Chuck Zacney introduced me to the sport.

MW: You've been working with trainer Butch Reid for a long time now. What's your working relationship like with him?

TM: I got introduced to Butch early on and I've always been impressed with Butch. He's a regular guy but he loves the horses and he cares for them. He's got a ton of experience and he's been in this sport forever. He's a winner. You always get an honest answer from him when you ask questions. I consider him a friend. I'll always be involved with Butch as long as I'm in the sport.

MW: For the Spinaway, were you able to be at Saratoga?

TM: You regret not going, right? But I was looking at it as Labor Day weekend, I had my family all around me. And from our place outside of Philadelphia, it would have been a better part of a six-hour ride up. There's no fans, there's no concessions. I was just thinking to myself to drive up there for six hours, watch the race, and then turn around and drive back, you're always a little sure what's going to happen. You hope you're going to do well, but that's an awful long ride.

We watched it on TV together which was a lot of fun. I lost my voice screaming at the TV.

MW: Has there been any effect on your operation or going to the races because of all the COVID-19 protocols?

TM: Everybody suffered through the beginning of this and there was no racing for a while so that hurt a lot. Big players and small players alike suffered for months through this so we're happy to be back. It's almost back to normal. You have folks in attendance at the Parx races now, but not as many as there were. I'm looking forward to things getting back to normal at some point. **BH**

O'BRIEN SALUTES MAGICAL AFTER EPIC GHAIYYATH BATTLE

Star mare Magical, so often the bridesmaid against the mighty Enable, had another big day in the spotlight Sept. 12 when defeating Ghaiyyath in the Irish Champion Stakes (G1) at Leopardstown—a race she won in fine style 12 months ago.

She likely improved on that effort as Ghaiyyath is rated the best flat horse in the world by official handicappers, but he had to settle for second place behind the ultra-consistent 5-year-old, who was ridden by Seamie Heffernan. Armory was third in a photo with Sottsass.

The Irish Champion Stakes was a "Win and You're In" qualifier for the Breeders' Cup Longines Turf at Keeneland Nov. 7.

Successful in the Coral-Eclipse Stakes (G1) when beating Enable (GB), Ghaiyyath was impressive in landing the Juddmonte International Stakes (G1) at York last time, so it was no surprise he went off the 8-13 favorite for Ireland's best all-age contest, which provided a captivating spectacle.

He adopted his customary front-running tactics under William Buick and seemed to be going well, although Magical and Heffernan kept close tabs.

Her Aidan O'Brien-trained stablemate Japan sat third for Ryan Moore, who surprised many when choosing to ride him instead of the daughter of Galileo.

His faith in Japan looked misplaced when the 4-year-old flattened in the straight just as Magical—a well-beaten second to Ghaiyyath at York—was picking up powerfully, returning at 9-2.

Beaten four times by Enable, she is 8-1 (from 20) with Betfair and Paddy Power to exact revenge on her old rival in the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe (G1) at Longchamp next month.

Magical is just the second horse to win two editions of the Irish Champion Stakes, with the same connections' Dylan Thomas the last horse to do the double in 2006 and 2007.

O'Brien, who trains her for Coolmore partners Derrick Smith, John Magnier, and Michael Tabor, was winning the €750,000 group 1 for a record-extending ninth time.

He said: "She's a great mare and all credit to the lads for keeping her in training. They made the call through the winter and other than that we wouldn't have her here. She's an incredible mare.

"She's tough, genuine, determined, has speed—she has everything. I'm over the moon and Seamie gave her a brilliant ride.

"We were delighted Ghaiyyath was coming because we were going to get another go at him. We just felt York didn't work 100% for us and today she eyeballed him all the way, so we're delighted.

"We were very happy to make the running today and if Ghaiyyath wanted to take a lead we'd be happy and if he made the running we were going to go with him.

"It was always going to be a solid even match all the way and whoever was behind could have come along and come and got us, but we just took the chance that we'd let her and him match up, go stride for stride and see."

Magical has finished 10th and fifth in the last two Arcs and O'Brien added: "We think she gets a mile and a quarter really strongly and you probably have to ride her to get a mile and a half. They are the things we've learned over the years and she's very classy over a mile and a half, but can dish it out with anyone over a mile and a quarter.

"You can't expect to win everyday, but when your turns come you're delighted. Ghaiyyath is a great horse and it was great he came."

CHAMPERS ELYSEES CLAIMS DEBUT GROUP 1 IN MATRON

Johnny Murtagh might have taken time to get motoring as a trainer but he crowned a superlative season with a breakthrough success at group 1 level Sept. 12 when Champers Elysees swooped to run out a decisive winner of the Coolmore America 'Justify' Matron Stakes (G1).

The race provided an automatic berth to the Maker's Mark Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Turf (G1T) through the Breeders' Cup Challenge Series, but Murtagh has his eye on the Nov. 7 Breeders' Cup Mile (G1T) at Keeneland.

Colin Keane's mount, beaten in the Birdcatcher Nursery last autumn off a rating of 84, continued her relentless progress by producing a blistering turn of foot to scoot past Fancy Blue as they both challenged wide in the straight.

Having begun the delayed campaign with a Curragh handicap triumph off 86, the Fitzwilliam Racing-owned filly is now unbeaten in four after seeing off Tattersalls Irish One Thousand Guineas (G1) heroine Peaceful by 1 1/4 lengths at odds of 9-2.

A five-time champion jockey, and the leading Matron rider with three victories, Murtagh rode 103 winners at the highest level during his stellar career in the saddle. However, he retired early in 2014 before the Irish Champions Weekend initiative was inaugurated.

After attending the first couple of editions as a guest, he reflected last week on how he soon grew bored of being there "just for the free lunches." He vowed to his wife Orla that he would strive to change that, and reaped the fruits of his labors here.

"I'm sick of everybody saying 'Oh, you had such a great career as a jockey.' That's in the past. It's the now I'm worried about and it's great to win this with her," Murtagh said of a filly who was sold twice to go abroad only for the deals to fall through.

"It's been a brilliant year but to win a group 1 on Champions Weekend, it means everything. That's what we get up in the morning for—we want to be here on this stage. Races like the Sun Chariot and the Breeders' Cup Mile will have to be considered for her now."

Asked if he could have imagined that Champers Elysees, who won just once in five starts as a juvenile, would be the one to deliver such a landmark triumph when the season got underway, he replied: "No, I wouldn't have believed it. But she was always a good filly and I did think she would make up into a stakes filly."

In defeat, Peaceful ran a gallant race from just off the pace, while Fancy Blue kept on to be third, having been tapped for toe at a crucial stage turning in. Murtagh's Know It All finished fourth, having led briefly in the straight.

As a 36th winner of the truncated campaign for a trainer who had managed a previous best of just

32, Champers Elysees' win offered pretty conclusive evidence that Murtagh's second career is on a distinct upward curve.

"I'm a very good trainer—and I just need better horses," he said with trademark conviction when asked to explain the stable's surge in fortune. "And when I get them, these are the results. It's very hard to source horses in Ireland but, when you do, I'm don't mind telling people we're able to do the business."

GALILEO CHROME TURNS TO GOLD IN ST. LEGER

Tom Marquand's uncanny knack of being in the right place at the right time paid off spectacularly Sept. 12 with Pertemps St. Leger (G1) success at Doncaster on Galileo Chrome, a horse he was not even riding a day beforehand.

Barely had Marquand passed the post than he was expressing sympathy for Irish jockey Shane Crosse, who was denied the chance to land a first British Classic after testing positive for COVID-19.

Marquand was free as his intended partner, English King, had earlier been switched to the Grand Prix de Paris (G1)—but

no one should be surprised at the latest fortunate turn of his events in a breakthrough season for the 22-year-old.

It began when he found himself in Australia while all racing was shut down in Britain and grabbed the opportunity to make a name for himself there, notably riding the first group 1 winner of his career.

When the action resumed back home, Marquand

was jocked off English King, who was then Derby favorite, only to take second at Epsom on stablemate Khalifa Sat instead.

Once again he took full advantage of the chance offered him on Galileo Chrome, an improving colt who had won all three starts in Ireland for Joseph O'Brien in 2020.

Always in touch in a race in which seven of the runners were virtually in line two furlongs out, he sent the 4-1 shot to the front over a furlong from home and drove him out to score by a neck.

That made O'Brien, successful as a jockey on Leading Light in 2013, the first man since Harry Wragg to ride and train a Leger winner.

Marquand did not attempt to conceal his excitement afterward and said: "It's probably the most cliched thing that can come out of my mouth but it really is dreams come true.

"Classics in Britain are some of the hardest races to come across, group 1s in Britain are equally hard. To have my first winner on U. K. soil in the St Leger for Joseph O'Brien, who growing up at my time was one of the best jockeys around and is now training and doing a similar job—it's mind-blowing to get an opportunity like this."

But he added: "I can't stress enough how bad I feel for Shane because we've all been in a situation where things haven't gone our way and we're both relatively young so I really can relate.

"He'll be sat at home in pieces no doubt and I guess the one thing in racing is that it always comes back 'round so no doubt he'll have his day. I look forward to seeing him do it."

Reflecting on his year, Marquand said: "Time and time again it's all fallen my way. It's incredible how racing works everything out. I lost English King in the Derby and gained Khalifa Sat and finished second.

"Then I got English King back for today and he ended up going to France for a more favorable race and I can't go there as I'd have to do the week's quarantine after. And Shane Crosse's misfortune has luckily for me ended up in my lap."

Marquand's partner Hollie Doyle has been grabbing the headlines of late, notably when becoming the first woman to ride a five-timer in Britain last month.

"We're both really fortunate to be in the position we're in," he said. "To have the run we've had over the last couple of years and we're both extremely proud of each other's achievements. Long may the household continue on this path!"

Berkshire Rocco gave Andrew Balding plenty to shout about as he led over two furlongs and battled with the winner all the way to the line.

"He wears his heart on his sleeve, he kept digging in but it wasn't quite enough," the trainer said. "He gave us all a big thrill. I must say I don't shout very often but I had a good shout today! It's really exciting because it's a race we all want to win."

Sky Bet Great Voltigeur Stakes (G2) winner Pyledriver finished third on this step up in trip and jockey Martin Dwyer said: "He ran a great race but he didn't stay, it was too far.

"After York I said he could come back to a mile and a quarter. I thought I'd win turning in but he was tired in the last furlong, it was just out of his comfort zone."

The drying ground was reckoned to be against Santiago, whose jockey Frankie Dettori said: "Santiago probably wants a bit of cut in the ground. He came there to win but he wasn't leveling off like I thought he would."

Australia, Elzaam Get Their Day

It had been a fair time coming but Australia provided a candidate tailor-made for the rigors of the St. Leger as the Coolmore stallion shed his group 1 maiden tag at Doncaster.

On the same day six years ago, the chestnut dual Derby winner was not in action in the world's oldest classic but across the water, where he suffered a painful defeat to The Grey Gatsby at long odds-on in what was to be his swansong in the Irish Champion Stakes (G1).

With regal middle-distance breeding as a son of Galileo out of wonder mare Ouija Board, along with further form including a Guineas third and victory in the Juddmonte International Stakes (G1), Australia headed to Coolmore Stud with the world at his feet.

Perhaps unsurprisingly given those bloodlines, his progeny have needed time and a trip, with Galileo Chrome being one of his second crop, which were conceived at €50,000.

Australia provided the runner-up in last year's Leger through Sir Ron Priestley, one of eight other group winners to date among his offspring. They include classic trial victors Bangkok and Broome as well as this year's Irish Oaks (G1) runner-up Cayenne Pepper.

Although his fee slipped to €27,500 for this year, Mooresbridge hero Leo De Fury and German group 1 third Patrick Sarsfield have been fine examples of long-term improvers among Australia's older sons.

The distaff side of Galileo Chrome also gave cause for optimism as he made the giant jump in class from a listed race at Navan on only his fifth start.

Bred by Mohamed Ali Meddeb, he is from a robust family developed by Prince Faisal Salman's Denford Stud near Berkshire. His dam Curious Mind won on her debut for Sir Mark Prescott in the Denford silks and was sold privately for €75,000 at Arqana in 2015.

More significantly the mare is a half-sister to Michelangelo, who was third to Encke and Camelot in the 2012 Leger, as well as Chester Cup winner No Heretic and Private Secretary, who won the 11-furlong Cocked Hat Stakes at Goodwood.

Curious Mind's dam Intrigued is a sibling of both the French Guineas winner Aussie Rules and Approach, the dam of Denford's top-class grey Coronet, who was on the scoresheet at the highest level twice last year.

Curious Mind has also produced an as-yet-unnamed full sister to Galileo Chrome, and Ali Meddeb, a major owner in Tunisia, is also the breeder of a Dream Ahead colt produced in March this year.

Saturday saw another stallion open their group 1 account as the fast-improving Champers Elysees provided a similar landmark win for Johnny Murtagh in the Coolmore America 'Justify' Matron Stakes.

Her sire Elzaam was beaten a whisker in the Coventry Stakes (G1) and has been at Joe Foley's Ballyhane Stud in Ireland since retirement, his fee always hovering around its present €4,000.

Champers Elysees had become only his second group winner when landing the Fairy Bridge Stakes earlier this month, proving Murtagh has an eye for a bargain too as he picked up the Aughanmore Stud pinhook for €28,000 as a yearling at Part 2 of the Tattersalls Ireland September Yearling Sale.

FIERCE IMPACT CLAIMS GROUP 1 MILE TREBLE IN MAKYBE DIVA

Fierce Impact became the first horse, in successive seasons, to claim Melbourne's spring group 1 mile treble and continued jockey Mark Zahra's stellar start to the 2020-21 season when he won the Sept. 12 incident-packed PFD Food Services Makybe Diva Stakes (G1) at Flemington.

The Matthew Smith-trained Japanese-bred son of Deep Impact had completed the Lamaro's Hotel Sth Melbourne Toorak Handicap (G1) and Kennedy Cantala Stakes (G1) double last spring—a feat achieved only five times previously, and of that quintet only All Shot added a then-group 2 Craiglee Stakes, two years later, to his résumé.

It was a fortuitous 17th group 1 success for winning Zahra whose luck was in and perhaps deservedly so as it was Fierce Impact, then ridden by Craig Williams, who denied Zahra aboard Fifty Stars by a short half head in the 2019 Cantala Stakes.

Zahra was riding Fierce Impact for the first time with Williams committed to Lexus Melbourne Cup (G1) winner Vow And Declare and the in-form jockey was similarly fortunate to pick up the mount on Bobbie Lewis Quality (G2) victor Zoutori with his "usual" riders Jamie Kah and Damian Lane both suspended.

"He's good in a fight. He beat me in a fight here before so it was good to switch and be on his back and on the same side," Zahra said of Fierce Impact in reference to the Cantala and to Saturday's duel with the much-spruiked Russian Camelot, who was beaten a head at his spring resumption.

Zahra was able to provide Fierce Impact with the perfect run from barrier five while Damien Oliver was caught deep throughout, from gate 14, on Russian Camelot in a race run at a pedestrian tempo after expected leader Gailo Chop missed the start and Gating, who was expected to go forward, was

hampered when the winner jumped awkwardly and shifted in abruptly.

It was further disorganized when the 2019 winner Gating broke down shortly after the start and Miami Bound, Vow And Declare, and Kings Will Dream were severely hampered. The Peter Moody-trained Gating sustained a fractured shoulder and was euthanized.

Zahra, who has ridden at least one winner at the past five Saturday meetings in Melbourne and snared five stakes wins in that run, conceded the race panned out well for him.

"My horse actually jumped in and took both the leaders out of play and I thought, 'oh jeez.' I was closer than he normally is but we were going at a hack canter. I got out and I thought I was going to win easier but obviously Russian Camelot's a very good horse and it took a while to fight him off," he said.

"The good draw just gave me a soft run and he did the rest. Flemington suits and a bit of rain helped as well."

Trainer Smith was delighted: "He was super. For a small stable like ours to have a horse like that, it's fantastic," he said. "He's the type of horse that always just does enough. Russian Camelot got the jump on us a bit but given that he's a horse that only does as much as he has to, it was better that he had something to chase.

"Mark rode him perfectly, judged it perfectly, and we couldn't be happier. These races are so hard to win. You can make all the plans, have the horse ready, draw a good barrier but it all still needs to work out. Russian Camelot is a serious horse, too. To fend him off was something."

Fierce Impact, stakes-placed from David Simcock's yard in England, was consigned to the 2017 Tattersalls Autumn Horses In Training Sale where Smith purchased him for 120,000 guineas (US\$167,366). He has now earned AU\$3,186,330 (\$1,857,128) in his 27 starts.

It was an eventful race for trainer Danny O'Brien. Aside from Russian Camelot undergoing a veterinary examination after being fractious in the barriers and then being condemned to race four-wide without cover, stablemates Vow And Declare and Miami Bound struck severe interference.

Melbourne Cup winner Vow And Declare recovered to finish a more than encouraging ninth, beaten less than five lengths, while Miami Bound was eased out of the race. A post-race veterinary examination failed to reveal any abnormalities with the 2019 Kennedy Oaks (G1) winner.

All the talk, though, as it's been for some time, was of TAB South Australian Derby (G1) hero Russian Camelot.

O'Brien said: "He was obviously wide and without cover, but it was probably the only option from that gate and as it was he avoided all that interference when the horse broke down in the back half of the field.

"He was beaten by a top-class miler, who's a three-time group 1 winner at a mile now and he's been beaten a neck, so for a first-up performance for the spring, I don't think we could ask for much more.

"Without winning, he really couldn't have gone any better. There wasn't much speed and I don't think Damien (Oliver) could have ridden him differently, he did the right thing to worry about the horse and how he was travelling rather than trying to get some cover.

"He was beaten by a good horse in Fierce Impact and I suppose we were the most vulnerable at the mile first-up. Fierce Impact probably put a length on him and he really fought back."

Both Fierce Impact and Russian Camelot are now likely Cox Plate (G1)-bound although it is sobering to consider that Northerly in 2002 is the only Cox Plate winner, in the past 30 years, to progress via the Makybe Diva (Craiglee) Stakes.

SOVEREIGN TO FACE INTRIGUING FIELD IN IRISH ST. LEGER

The Sept. 13 Comer Group International Irish St. Leger (G1) is not a big field, but what it lacks in quantity it makes up for in quality.

The presence of last year's winner, last year's Dubai Duty Free Irish Derby (G1) winner, and this year's Sky Bet Ebor Handicap winner makes it a fascinating affair, and that's without the rapidly improving Comer Group International Curragh Cup (G2) winner Twilight Payment or the unexposed Micro Manage, who could be anything.

Half of the eight runners are rated 114 or higher, with the highest-rated Sovereign, who bids to give Aidan O'Brien his fourth victory in six years. He was a runaway winner of last year's Irish Derby and you would imagine this has been the plan all season.

The trip ought to be ideal and he was not disgraced in the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth QIPCO Stakes (G1) when chasing home the mighty Enable. It will be interesting to see whether Ryan Moore lets him roll in front, just as Pdraig Beggy did in last year's Irish Derby.

"Sovereign had a great run in the King George and is back up in trip. He ran over this trip before the King George, but he was only ready to start back then, and he got a little bit tired. We're very happy with him," O'Brien said.

Fujaira Prince is 6, but the best may still be to come. He has only visited a racecourse eight times, winning

five of those and being placed in the other three. He justified favoritism in the Ebor with a degree of authority and the manner in which he won a handicap at Royal Ascot suggested he was a group 1 winner in waiting. This is his big chance.

"He usually does not take his races very well but he's been flying at home and I think his win in the Ebor has brought him on," trainer Roger Varian said. "It's a big step from a handicap to a group 1 but the

trip and track should suit him and we're hopeful he can run a nice race."

Search For A Song was brilliant in this race last year, but she has yet to show the same sort of form this season. Perhaps running over shorter trips has not suited and this is the first time she has tried the mile and three-quarters since the race 12 months ago.

"She's in great form, is very well, and she's ready to run for her life," said trainer Dermot Weld. "Her (third-place) run in the Tattersalls Gold Cup (G1) was excellent—she showed a lot of pace and a lot of

speed to be third that day. I'm very happy with her."

Twilight Payment has made giant strides since joining Joseph O'Brien and can never be underestimated, but perhaps class will prevail and Sovereign will show his true colors. That Irish Derby demolition job remains fresh in the memory.

"He's been very progressive all year and won very well the last twice," said the younger O'Brien. "We're hoping for a big run in what will be his biggest test to date. He will need a career-best to win."

MAKE A CHALLENGE TEAM SEEKS GROUP WIN IN FLYING FIVE

It is all very well bullying inferior opponents, but the Sept. 13 Derrinstown Stud Flying Five Stakes (G1) at the Curragh will prove what Make A Challenge is made of now that he takes on sprinters of the highest caliber.

There isn't a sprinter in Ireland who can live with Make A Challenge when conditions are in his favor.

While he's not a mudlark, he handles soft ground better than most, and the fact that no substantial rain has fallen in the build-up to this race is definitely a negative for his chance.

It's hard to argue against the view of Make A Challenge as a big fish in a small pond and this race will give a better evaluation about where he sits in the sprinting stakes given the strong challenge from Britain.

Glass Slippers spearheads the raiding party of eight sprinters, all of whom are rated 103 or higher.

It was around this time last year that Glass Slippers hit top form, winning three in a row, culminating in victory in the Longines Prix de l'Abbaye de Longchamp (G1). A reproduction of that performance would make her difficult to beat.

"She bypassed the Sprint Cup (G1) and the Nunthorpe (G1) to wait for this and she's in great form," said trainer Kevin Ryan. "She ran a really good second behind Battaash in the King George Stakes (G2) at Goodwood, she always runs her race and should do so again. It's great that Tom Eaves can now go over for the mount and come back and ride in Britain."

The Make A Challenge camp will be all too familiar with what A'Ali is capable of after he accounted for Ireland's highest-rated sprinter over the course and distance in July.

Que Amoro also has solid claims, having had A'Ali in her rear-view mirror when chasing home Battaash in the Nunthorpe last time.

Expect the pace to be frantic and Joe Doyle to play his cards late aboard Make A Challenge. Whether that's good enough to overhaul the British challengers, only time will tell.

The winner of the Flying Five, part of the international Breeders' Cup Challenge series, will receive an automatic berth in the Nov. 7 Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint (G1T) at Keeneland.

Hogan and Doyle Aiming for Milestone

Not only are Denis Hogan and Joe Doyle bidding for a breakthrough group 1 when they team up with prolific Irish sprinter Make A Challenge in the Flying Five, but victory would represent a first group win of any kind for the trainer and rider.

Make A Challenge has come a long way since winning off an opening mark of 68 last summer. There have been five wins in listed company and Hogan is hopeful his crack sprinter can make his presence felt at the highest level here.

The trainer said: "We've been second in group 1s, 2s, and 3s, we just need the ball to bounce in our favor. Hopefully it will. If he runs a big race and can do us proud, we'd be very happy."

On his big-race jockey, Hogan added: "It's also great for Joe and I'm delighted to be a part of his success as well because he's a big team player and he deserves it. He's a huge asset to me and it would be nice to see him get a group 1.

"When he came back from England, he wasn't keen on getting his licence, and I couldn't understand why because he rides work so well. Since the time he got it back last June, he hasn't looked back, and he's been riding winners every week since. He's a huge addition to me."

Asked what a maiden group 1 victory would mean, not long after losing Sceptical through injury, Hogan said: "To win a group 1 on Irish Champions Weekend would be a milestone moment, a dream come true. To be going there with a live chance, it's something I try not to think about too much really."

He added: "Make A Challenge has had a good preparation and we're happy. We've been winning very well of late but you have to remember we've been winning well in listed company, so we have to be realistic.

Master of The Seas Puts Record on Line

The Goffs Vincent O'Brien National Stakes (G1) is the one in which Pinatubo produced a spellbinding performance to pull nine lengths clear of his rivals 12 months ago, and the colt's connections are back for more with the unbeaten Master of The Seas.

Also successful in 2018 with Quorto, Charlie Appleby and William Buick rely on the son of Dubawi to maintain Godolphin's strong recent record.

Master of The Seas progressed from his maiden victory to run out a most impressive winner of the Bet365 Superlative Stakes (G2) at Newmarket last time.

"He's been very professional so far and won the Superlative Stakes in good style," trainer Charlie Appleby said. "It was always the plan to give him a break before heading to the National Stakes and we've been pleased with his preparation. Physically he's done well and this is hopefully a nice progression to the next level. He's a very different horse to Pinatubo in terms of physique and obviously what they've achieved going into the race. Pinatubo went into this with four runs under his belt, while Master Of The Seas has only had the two starts and is a lighter-framed horse by Dubawi."

There is plenty of strength in depth among the home team, however, notably in the shape of Keeneland Phoenix Stakes (G1) winner Lucky Vega.

Jessica Harrington's colt showed himself to be above average when winning on his debut at Naas and, returning from a break, he ran a creditable race behind Laws of Indices in the GAIN Railway Stakes (G2).

He stripped much fitter for that outing when running out a comprehensive winner of the Phoenix Stakes, turning the form around with Laws of Indices, and everything about that performance suggested he'd be just as good stepping up to seven furlongs.

"He's done what he's done and seems to be in great form," Harrington said. "We're stepping up to seven furlongs but he seemed to run through the line very strongly over six last time."

Ken Condon, trainer of Laws of Indices, is looking forward to the seven-furlong affair with his runner.

"I'm very happy with him. He's continued to do well and we think he'll appreciate the step up in distance. He's in good shape and continues to improve," he said.

Aidan O'Brien has won this with some classy colts and the master of Ballydoyle's challenge is headed by Battleground, winner of the Chesham at Royal Ascot and the Veuve Clicquot Vintage Stakes (G2) at Goodwood last time.

"Battleground has done all we've asked of him and has done everything right since Goodwood," O'Brien said.

Pretty Gorgeous Eyes Moyglare Score

Of all the group 1 races on this exceptional weekend of racing, the Moyglare Stud Stakes (G1) may be the most straightforward.

Joseph O'Brien's Pretty Gorgeous is well named and could easily be three from three, only to have been beaten in a tactical affair in the Silver Flash Stakes at Leopardstown.

On that occasion, Donnacha O'Brien's Shale (IRE) got first run on Pretty Gorgeous, but the latter reversed the form when running out a comprehensive winner of the A.R.M Holding Debutante Stakes (G2) over the course and distance last month.

A reproduction of that effort would leave Pretty Gorgeous extremely difficult to beat and she rates a worthy favorite.

One of the stories of the season has been Ken Condon's glorious run with his 2-year-olds, and Teresa Mendoza and Thunder Beauty represent the trainer here.

SERPENTINE RETURNS IN GRAND PRIX DE PARIS

It is not all that unusual for Investec Derby (G1) form to be tested in the Grand Prix de Paris (G1) at ParisLongchamp. The extent to which it is happening this year is certainly atypical, while the 10-week gap between the two races is totally novel. This year's Grand Prix de Paris on Sept. 13 is in the slot normally reserved for the Prix Niel (G2).

Four of the 10 runners lined up for the July 4 Derby, including winner Serpentine. He is the only runner who is out for the first time since.

"He's just ready to start and is going to improve plenty from the run and that's the way we want him," said trainer Aidan O'Brien, who also sends out Nobel Prize and Mogul. "Whatever he does here he will improve plenty for it as he had a good long break after Epsom."

The chances of the three Ballydoyle runners working in concert are slimmer than usual, as quarantine rules and Irish Champions Weekend mean that local jockeys are on all three Aidan O'Brien runners.

As is often pointed out in these previews, Christophe Soumillon is a more enterprising rider than his reputation suggests. His being on Serpentine is almost certainly no coincidence.

Serpentine's Derby performance, more than that of just about any winner in recent memory, is one in sore need of testing. It has always been generally accepted that Serpentine was flattered by the margin of his 5 1/2-length win, although fewer now contest him being the best horse in the race.

That is partly on account of the division becoming bingo-like in the wake of the Derby. English King, floated as a moral winner at Epsom, has since been beaten in the John Pierce Racing Gordon Stakes (G3) by Mogul, who has since trailed in third in the Sky Bet Great Voltigeur Stakes (G2).

The track at Goodwood is a viable excuse for English King, but the notion of him being a star 3-year-old is

on life support. At least he is almost certainly in the right race this weekend having been taken out of the Pertemps St. Leger Stakes (G1). His pedigree suggests stamina, but his racing style would not inspire much confidence over further than 1 1/2 miles. A French-style race might be just the thing for him, as he has a notable change of pace.

"We always preferred to come here, but declared him for the St Leger because of (COVID-19) and any moving goalposts," said trainer Ed Walker. "He's in cracking form, as good as I've had him. I just wonder whether breaking a 30-year track record at Lingfield and a Derby may have left him a bit flat at Goodwood. I know he didn't come down the hill well, but he still didn't run a bad race, although he wasn't himself. I think the six weeks since have done him well and I think we'll see his true colors, and time will tell if that's good enough. Fast ground, a flat galloping track, and a mile and a half will see him run to a very high level; we'll see how good he is."

The added competitors from the continent are headed by Deutsches Derby (G1, German Derby) winner In Swoop and Prix Hocquart victor Port Guillaume. Their level of form is within hailing distance of what the likes of English King and Mogul have achieved. Rather than having excuses, both are sufficiently lightly raced to think that they can improve a little more.

Stradivarius Heads Prix Foy

Stradivarius, whose connections have grown bored of outsprinting stayers, has been priced up for the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe (G1) as though he will be fully effective back at 1 1/2 miles. It is not an unreasonable conclusion, but it would be unwise to assume it will be the case. Sunday's Qatar Prix Foy (G2) should offer a genuine test as to whether he has what it takes down in trip.

"He's in good form and has been sharp enough in his recent work to suggest this step back to a mile and a half shouldn't bother him," trainer John Gosden said. "It will be hot over there and the surface will quick enough, but he's shown in the past he handles any ground. It'll probably be a tactical race unlike the group 1 races over there where they go flat out, but I'll leave that side of it to the jockey. (Stradivarius) is pretty versatile so can either make the running or drop in."

The market suggests last year's Derby winner Anthony Van Dyck poses the main threat, but his

profile is so in and out that it is debatable whether he is really a benchmark for anything these days.

How Stradivarius fares relative to him is less interesting than his match-up with a small group of France's second-tier middle-distance performers.

Skyward looks a bit of a no-hoper, but the other three in the field were the first three home in the Grand Prix de Saint-Cloud (G1). Way To Paris won and there is every reason to think he is the best of them, given he started the sprint for home in the worst position.

Before that, Way To Paris had been beaten just a head by Sottsass in the Prix Ganay (G1). Racing Post Ratings and the French handicapper agree that Way To Paris is better than ever at the age of 7 and, even though he is 50-1 for the Arc, beating him handsomely would confirm that Stradivarius can bring all his staying class back here on the first Sunday in October.

"He loves the track and, although he might not be at 100%, I'm quite confident," trainer Andrea Marcialis said. "It wouldn't surprise me if Frankie tried to make it on Stradivarius, and he's obviously a classy horse."
