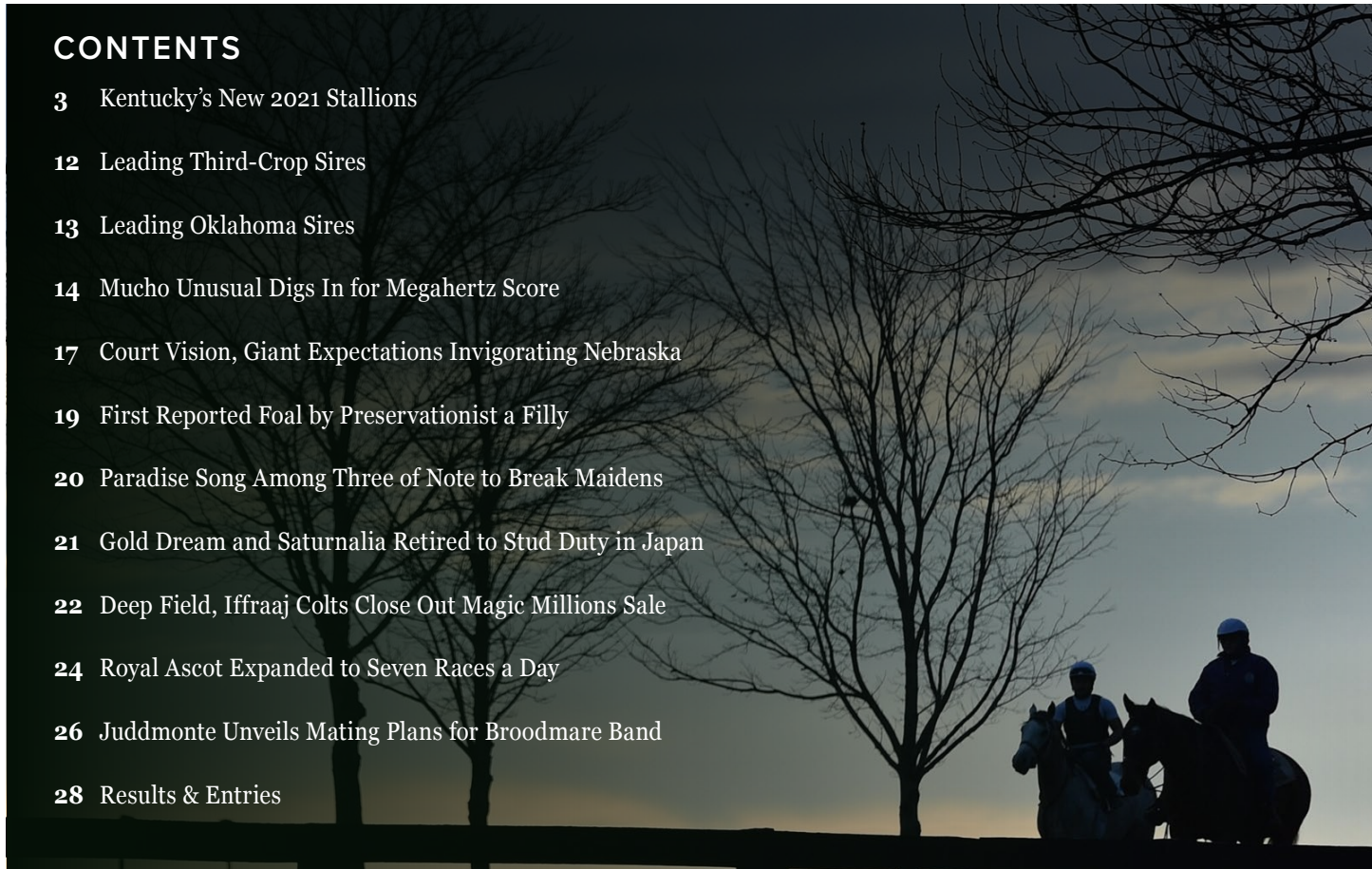

KENTUCKY'S NEW 2021 STALLIONS

Kentucky Derby, Breeders' Cup winner Authentic stands tall

AUTHENTIC \$75,000
2017, Into Mischief—Flawless, by Mr. Greeley
Spendthrift Farm

The team at B. Wayne Hughes' Spendthrift Farm got a welcomed phone call in March 2020 from SF Racing's Tom Ryan that the ownership group of then-undefeated San Felipe Stakes (G2) winner Authentic was taking bids for the colt's breeding rights.

"He was a horse we were really excited about," said Ned Toffey, general manager at Spendthrift. "What we saw early in his career was an Into Mischief that could run the classic distance. We didn't know for sure, but it proved to be the case."

Under the new ownership group, Authentic would finish second in the Runhappy Santa Anita Derby (G1) to Honor A. P. and then redeem himself by winning his first grade 1 in the TVG.com Haskell Stakes by a nose. This tight margin raised doubts about his chances of succeeding at 10 furlongs heading into the Sept. 5 Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1). Trainer Bob Baffert assured jockey John Velazquez that he had plenty of horse and told him to ride with confidence. Velazquez did just that by quickly taking a lead they would never relinquish. Authentic rolled through brisk early fractions of :22.92, :46.41, and 1:10.23 to win by 1 1/4 lengths and stop the timer in 2:00.61.

Authentic went on to the Preakness Stakes (G1) where a phenomenal performance by the filly Swiss Skydiver left him a neck short at the wire.

In the topsy-turvy racing schedule of 2020, the Preakness wrapped up the Triple Crown a month ahead of the Breeders' Cup World Championships, where Authentic would face older horses for the first time in the Longines Breeders' Cup Classic (G1), including multiple grade 1 winners Improbable and Maximum Security. Using the Kentucky Derby playbook, Velazquez and Authentic stormed through the Classic and won by a more commanding 2 1/4 lengths. At no point of call was any challenger closer than a length to Authentic.

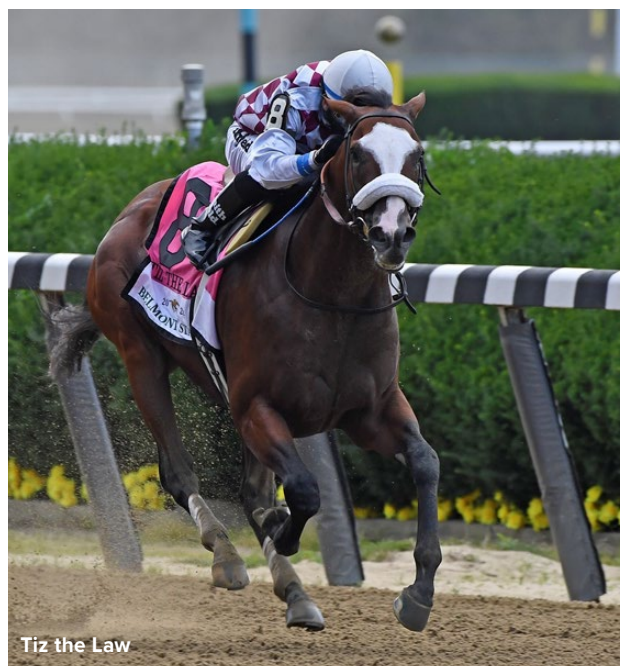
"One of the things breeders talk about is a stallion having speed and the ability to carry it over the classic distance. We are just really excited about his chances to make a sire," Toffey said. "We also have a number of sons of Into Mischief, who has been the horse of a lifetime for us. So to add what you'd have to call his best son to our stallion roster, we just couldn't be prouder."

Authentic is the first black-type winner out of the winning Mr. Greeley mare Flawless, who has produced three winners from three to race. The mare is out of the Wild Again daughter Oyster Baby, who is a half sister to grade 3-placed winner Real Fancy Runner (by Johannesburg) and stakes-placed winners Stately Warrior and Saints Go Marching. The family has also produced stakes winner and multiple stakes producer Holiday Runner, who is the dam of multiple grade 1 winner Seventh Street, grade 1 winner Reynaldothewizard, and grade 2 stakes-placed American Story, the dam of multiple grade 1 winner American Gal and graded-placed stakes winner Americanize.

TIZ THE LAW \$40,000
2017, Constitution—Tizfiz, by Tiznow
Ashford Stud

Tiz the Law began 2020 as one of the most highly regarded sophomores of his generation, having captured the Champagne Stakes (G1) by four lengths in his second lifetime start. He would more than live up to the expectations.

Bred in New York by Twin Creeks Farm, the son of eventual leading second-crop sire Constitution quickly took a prominent position on the Triple Crown trail by winning the Holy Bull Stakes (G3) by three lengths and the Curlin Florida Derby (G1) by 4 1/4 lengths. He would earn Equibase Speed Figures of 117 and 112, respectively, for those performances. The coronavirus pandemic likely cost the Sacka-

toga Stable star his best shot at winning the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) by forcing the American classic to be rescheduled to Sept. 5 while he was peaking in the spring. Tiz the Law did capture a classic, however, taking the Belmont Stakes Presented by NYRA Bets (G1) by 3 3/4 lengths. He won his third grade 1 and proved himself at 1 1/4 miles by capturing the Runhappy Travers Stakes by a dominant 5 1/2 lengths before finishing second in the Kentucky Derby.

Trainer Barclay Tagg was readying Tiz the Law for a campaign at 4 but those plans were derailed by severe bone bruising that forced the colt's retirement Dec. 30. Tiz the Law leaves racing with a 6-1-1 record from nine starts and earnings of \$2,735,300.

Tiz the Law is out of the late mare Tizfiz, a grade 2-winning daughter of Tiznow, who won or placed 11 times out of 20 starts. Talent runs deep in her family, which includes 16 black-type performers under the mare's first three dams.

IMPROBABLE.....\$40,000

2016, City Zip—Rare Event, by A.P. Indy
WinStar Farm

Improbable, a 5-year-old son of City Zip, brought a strong hand into this year's Longines Breeders' Cup Classic (G1). A grade 1 winner at 2 and a grade 1-placed black-type winner at 3, Improbable was a force in the 2020 handicap division with three consecutive grade 1 wins at Santa Anita Park and Saratoga Race Course. He won the Hollywood Gold Cup Stakes (G1) by 3 1/4 lengths, the Whitney Stakes (G1) by two lengths, and the Awesome Again Stakes (G1) by 4 1/2 lengths. In the Breeders' Cup Classic, Improbable made a valiant run at front-runner Authentic in mid-stretch after having run 67 feet farther (about eight lengths) but fell short by 2 1/4 lengths to finish second.

"Go back and look at this horse's race record and workout pattern. He breezed or raced nearly every week for more than two years," said Elliott Walden, CEO, president, and racing manager for WinStar Farm. "It was phenomenal. He breezed more than 50 times fast and is so extremely sound. Part of that is his motion; he's poetry in motion. Improbable is such a perfect-looking horse; he is the epitome of balance and size."

Improbable retired a multi-millionaire with a 7-4-0 record out of 15 starts and earnings of \$2,729,520. Improbable is out of the winning A.P. Indy mare Rare Event, whose dam Our Rite of Spring is a half sister to successful sire Hard Spun. The family also produced Preakness Stakes (G1) winner, champion 3-year-old male, and sire Little Current and grade 1 winner Prayers'n Promises.

Game Winner produced the perfect season at 2, showing his class early with a 5 3/4-length win in his debut at Del

Mar and then jumping straight to grade 1 competition. He reeled off three consecutive victories at the highest level: the Del Mar Futurity (G1), American Pharoah Stakes (G1), and a gritty performance in the Sentient Jet Breeders' Cup Juvenile (G1) that sealed Eclipse Award championship honors for the son of Candy Ride.

At 3, Game Winner was runner-up in the Rebel Stakes (G2) and Santa Anita Derby (G1). He ran a respectable fifth in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) before landing another graded victory in the Los Alamitos Derby (G3).

Bred in Kentucky by Jane Lyon's Summer Wind Equine, Game Winner is out of the A.P. Indy mare Indyan Giving, who also produced graded stakes winner Flagstaff. His second dam is champion Fleet Indian, who won five graded stakes and earned more than \$1.7 million.

"Champion 2-year-olds make great sires," said Bill Farish with Lane's End. "Street Sense, Uncle Mo, American Pharoah, and now Nyquist looks very promising. All were the very best of their generation and now are among the elite stallions in America. Game Winner dominated in his championship year and was a graded stakes winner at 3. He is a champion from the immediate family of a champion, so we are honored that Gary and Mary West have entrusted Lane's End with his stallion career."

MCKINZIE.....\$30,000

2015, Street Sense—Runway Model, by Petionville
Gainesway

Over four years from 2017-20 McKinzie proved he was among the most talented racehorses competing in North America. The son of Street Sense was an undefeated grade 1 winner at 2 and won multiple grade 1s at 3 and 4. He also added the Triple Bend Stakes (G2) to his graded stakes tally at 5.

“McKinzie was absolutely brilliant,” said Brian Graves, the general manager of Gainesway. “His speed, precocity, and good looks make him an absolute standout.”

For his career McKinzie finished first or second in 13 graded stakes. His best wins came in the Los Alamitos CashCall Futurity (G1), Pennsylvania Derby (G1), Malibu Stakes (G1), and the Whitney Stakes (G1). He was second in four other grade 1 stakes, including the Longines Breeders’ Cup Classic (G1), Santa Anita Handicap Presented by San Manuel Indian Bingo and Casino (G1), Runhappy Metropolitan Handicap (G1), and Awesome Again Stakes (G1). He ran 11 triple-digit Beyer Speed Figures and amassed \$3,473,360 while compiling eight wins and six seconds from 18 starts.

Summer Wind Farm bred McKinzie out of the multiple graded stakes winner Runway Model, who has produced six winners from nine foals to race, including stakes-placed winner Rompin Reid and stakes-producing winner Couture Cat. Runway Model is a half sister to multiple graded-placed stakes winner Mambo Train, graded-placed winner Elena Strikes, and stakes-placed, graded stakes producer Texas Kitty.

WAR OF WILL.....\$25,000
2016, War Front—Visions of Clarity, by Sadler’s Wells
Claiborne Farm

Prominent international sire War Front did all his running on dirt, but as a sire, his progeny have been showing their best on the grass. Then War of Will came along to remind breeders about his sire’s versatility.

The now-5-year-old colt proved himself in graded company at 2 with a runner-up effort in the Summer Stakes (G1T) at Woodbine. Owner Gary Barber and trainer Mark Casse decided to try War of Will on dirt and were rewarded with consecutive wins in the Lecomte Stakes (G3) and Risen Star Stakes Presented by Lamarque Ford (G2). War of Will was a live contender heading into the Triple Crown, where he was unplaced in a rough-and-tumble Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) that resulted in the race’s first disqualification (by interference) but went on to win the



Preakness Stakes (G1). Back on the grass at 4, he captured the Maker’s Mark Mile Stakes (G1T) and placed in the Rich Woodbine Mile Stakes (G1T). War of Will retired with career earnings of \$1,881,803 and four graded stakes wins.

Flaxman Holdings bred War of Will in Kentucky out of the Sadler’s Wells stakes winner Visions of Clarity, who is also the dam of group 1 winner and Irish highweight Pathfork and of multiple stakes winner Tacticus. Other grade/group 1 winners and sires to emerge from this family include Breeders’ Cup Mile (G1T) winner Spinning World (a half brother to Visions of Clarity), Turf Classic Invitational Stakes (G1T) winner Denon, Metropolitan Handicap (G1) winner Aldebaran, and Atto Mile Stakes (G1T) winner Good Journey.

MAXIMUM SECURITY.....\$20,000
2016, New Year’s Day—Lil Indy, by Anasheed
Ashford Stud

For all the controversy surrounding Maximum Security during his racing career, one fact stands undisputed—he’s a brilliant, gifted athlete. Gary and Mary West’s homebred

won by an eye-popping 9 3/4 lengths in his only start at 2. As a sophomore, he tuned up for the Xpressbet Florida Derby (G1) by winning a starter optional claimer by 18 1/4 lengths and then won the Florida Derby gate to wire by 3 1/2 lengths. The son of New Year's Day would cross the wire first in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1), but a disqualification for interference cost him the rose blanket.

Maximum Security found redemption after the Derby with consecutive wins in the TVG.com Haskell Invitational Stakes (G1), Bold Ruler Handicap (G3), and the Cigar Mile Handicap (G1). At 4 the colt was shipped to Saudi Arabia to contest the inaugural \$20 million Saudi Cup, which he won. A federal investigation into possible medication violations by trainer Jason Servis has put an official outcome of the Saudi Cup on hold, but Maximum Security went right back to his winning ways with trainer Bob Baffert. The colt strung together victories in the San Diego Handicap (G2) and TVG Pacific Classic Stakes (G1) and was runner-up in the Awesome Again Stakes (G1) before finishing unplaced in the Longines Breeders' Cup Classic (G1). He retires with a 10-2-0 record out of 14 starts and will own earnings of \$12,431,900, if the Saudi Cup results are upheld.

Maximum Security's dam Lil Indy, a winner by Anasheed, is a half sister to multiple grade 1 winner and successful sire Flat Out (by Flatter).

VEKOMA \$20,000
 2016, Candy Ride—Mona de Momma, by Speightstown
Spendthrift Farm

When everything works—the breeding, the raising, the training—it produces a racehorse like Vekoma. The 5-year-old son of Candy Ride won graded stakes at 2, 3, and 4 and wound up his career this year with consecutive victories in the Runhappy Carter Handicap (G1) and Runhappy Metropolitan Handicap (G1). The colt was the morning-line favorite for the Breeders' Cup Sprint (G1) but was scratched due to a fever. He retired with six wins out of his eight lifetime starts and his only finish off the board came in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1). He earned \$1,245,525.

“Vekoma is a terrific blend of his sire Candy Ride and his Speightstown dam Mona de Momma, showing brilliance from six furlongs to a mile and an eighth and from ages 2 to 4,” said Ned Toffey, general manager of Spendthrift Farm. “There’s sire power throughout the pedigree, with Vekoma’s second dam being a sister to Mr. Greeley. You just will not find a better bred son of Candy Ride.”

Mona de Momma, whom Alpha Delta Stables bought for \$1.55 million at Fasig-Tipton’s 2011 November sale, is a grade 1 winner who is a half sister to three black-type performers, which include multiple graded-placed winner Jigadee and stakes-placed Treasure Hunt.

TOM’S D’ETAT\$17,500

2013, Smart Strike—Julia Tuttle, by Giant’s Causeway
WinStar Farm

From one of the last four crops by two-time leading North American sire Smart Strike, Tom’s d’Etat lived up to his black-type-rich pedigree by winning three graded stakes that included the 2019 Clark Stakes Presented by Norton Healthcare (G1). He won or placed in six graded stakes while racing from 3 to 7 for G M B Racing. Tom’s d’Etat is out of the graded-placed Giant’s Causeway stakes winner Julia Tuttle, whose dam Candy Cane is a full sister to prominent sire Candy Ride. Tom’s d’Etat compiled an 11-2-2 record out of 20 starts and earned \$1,762,272.

VOLATILE\$17,500

2016, Violence—Melody Lady, by Unbridled’s Song
Three Chimneys Farm

Volatile had a relatively short but brilliant career with five wins from six starts that rose in a steady crescendo to a 1 1/4-length victory in the Alfred G. Vanderbilt Handicap (G1) over a salty field that included grade 1 winners Whitmore, Mind Control, and Firenze Fire. Volatile is by 2018 leading second-crop sire Violence and out of the Unbridled’s Song stakes winner Melody Lady, who is also the dam of graded-placed stakes winner Buy Sell Hold (by Violence). Melody Lady is a daughter of multiple grade 1 winner and multiple stakes producer Lady Tak.

HONOR A. P.\$15,000

2017, Honor Code—Hollywood Story, by Wild Rush
Lane’s End

Honor A. P. stood out early and became the highest-priced yearling from his sire Honor Code’s first crop when CRK Stable went to \$850,000 at the 2018 The Saratoga Sale, Fasig-Tipton’s select yearling auction. The colt proved his worth with a runner-up finish in the San Felipe Stakes (G2) and a win in the Runhappy Santa Anita Derby (G1). He would finish a respectable fourth in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) but an injury sustained in the classic derailed his career. Honor A. P. is out of multiple grade 1 winner Hollywood Story, making him a half brother to stakes winner Miss Hollywood, multiple graded-placed winner Hollywood Star, and multiple stakes-placed winner Hoorayforhollywood.

COMPLEXITY\$12,500

2016, Maclean’s Music—Goldfield, by Yes It’s True
Airdrie Stud

Complexity proved to be a “good one” early. He retired with five wins from 10 starts and earned \$616,350. Stonestreet Thoroughbred Holdings bred Complexity out of Yes It’s True daughter Goldfield, the dam of grade 3 winner Valadorna (by Curlin), who was second in the 14 Hands Winery Breeders’ Cup Juvenile Fillies (G1).

GLOBAL CAMPAIGN \$12,500

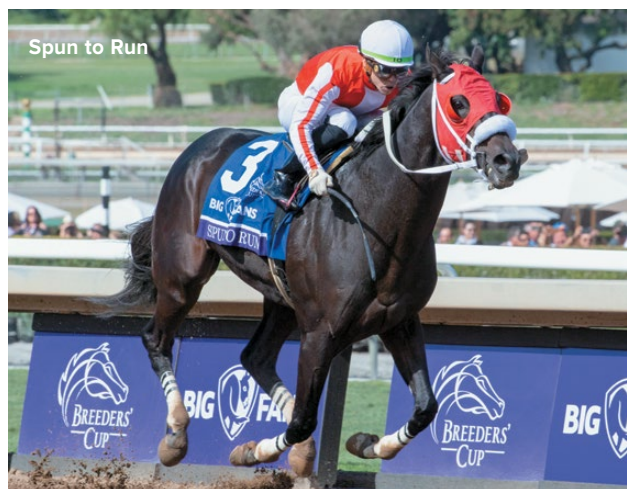
2016, Curlin—Globe Trot, by A.P. Indy
WinStar Farm

Global Campaign is the most recent grade 1-winning, millionaire son of Curlin. Bred by WinStar Farm, which raced the colt with Sagamore Farm, the colt became a graded stakes winner in his fourth start when he won the Peter Pan Stakes (G3). At 4 he broke through at the highest level by winning the Woodward Handicap (G1) and followed that performance with a solid third in the Longines Breeders' Cup Classic (G1). Global Campaign retired with six wins and two thirds out of 10 starts and earned \$1,321,080. The colt is out of A.P. Indy winner Globe Trot, making him a half brother to multiple grade 1 winner Bolt d'Oro (by Medaglia d'Oro) and multiple graded-placed stakes winner Sonic Mule (by Distorted Humor).

SPUN TO RUN \$12,500

2016, Hard Spun—Yawkey Way, by Grand Slam
Gainesway

Spun to Run saved all his best running for his sophomore campaign when he finished off the board only once and grabbed the brass ring in the Big Ass Fans Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile (G1) at Santa Anita Park. The colt proved he belonged in grade 1 company earlier with a third in the TVG.com Haskell Invitational Stakes (G1). He ended 2019 with a second in the Cigar Mile Handicap (G1). The now 5-year-old son of Hard Spun is out of the Grand Slam stakes winner Yawkey Way, whose dam is Kylie Good is a half sister to multiple Canadian classic-placed stakes winner Brushing Bully and stakes winner Navajo Pearl.



INSTILLED REGARD \$12,500

2015, Arch—Enhancing, by Forestry
Taylor Made Stallions

Instilled Regard, a 6-year-old son of Arch, raced for Larry Best's OXO Equine after he acquired the colt for \$1.05 mil-

lion at the 2017 Ocala Breeders' Sales March 2-Year-Olds in Training Sale out of Tom McCrocklin's consignment.

His pedigree alone shouted potential. Instilled Regard is out of Forestry winner Enhancing, who is out of champion 3-year-old filly and multiple grade 1 winner Heavenly Prize, which makes Enhancing a half sister to multiple grade 1 winner Good Reward (Storm Cat), grade 2 winner and successful sire Pure Prize (Storm Cat), and black-type winner Cosmic (El Prado).

At 2, Instilled Regard won in his third start and stamped himself as grade 1 quality by following up with a runner-up effort in the Los Alamitos Cash Call Futurity (G1). At 3, he won the Lecomte Stakes (G3) and showed his versatility with a third in the Hollywood Derby (G1T) and a win on the grass in graded company at 4 in the Ft. Lauderdale Stakes (G2T). At 5, Instilled Regard landed that elusive grade 1 win in the Manhattan Stakes (G1T). He was retired with a 5-3-4 record from 18 starts and earned \$983,240.

Instilled Regard has similar breeding to Darley's leading freshman sire Nyquist, who is out of the Forestry mare Seeking Gabrielle. Arch is the broodmare sire of Nyquist's sire, Uncle Mo.

ECHO TOWN \$10,000

2017, Speightstown—Letgomyecho, Menifee
Ashford Stud

Echo Town flirted with success in the allowance ranks through the first quarter of 2020 before finding his best form at the beginning of the summer when he finished second in the Woody Stephens Stakes Presented by Claiborne Farm (G1). He proved that grade 1 performance was no fluke by next winning the H. Allen Jerkens Stakes Presented by Runhappy (G1) by 3 1/2 lengths at Saratoga Race Course. Echo Town would not win another graded stakes but finished third in the Stoll Keenon Ogden Phoenix Stakes (G2), where he outran Whitmore, who would later win the Breeders' Cup Sprint (G1). The colt is out of grade 2 winner Letgomyecho (by Menifee), making him a half brother to graded stakes winner J Boys Echo, graded-placed winner Unbridled Outlaw, and stakes-placed Dragic.

GIFT BOX \$10,000

2013, Twirling Candy—Special Me, by Unbridled's Song
Lane's End

Gift Box ranked among the leading older horses in America in 2019 with a string of graded stakes performances that included a victory in the Santa Anita Handicap Presented by San Manuel Indian Bingo and Casino (G1). He retired as the highest-earning son of his second-ranked, sixth-crop sire Twirling Candy and joins his sire and grandsire, Candy Ride, at Lane's End. Bred by Craig and Carrie Brogden of Machmer Hall, Gift Box is out of the Unbridled's Song mare Special Me, which makes him a half brother to grade 2 winners Stonetastic (by Mizzen Mast) and Special Forces (by

Candy Ride). His pedigree is free of Storm Cat and A.P. Indy, which will be appealing to breeders because both have proven success with Candy Ride and Twirling Candy, producing the likes of grade 1 winner Collusion Illusion.

HIGHER POWER \$10,000

2015, Medaglia d'Oro—Alternate, by Seattle Slew
Darby Dan Farm

A move to the West Coast transformed Higher Power from a good racehorse to a great one. He won at 2 and was a stakes-placed winner at 3, but after his purchase by Hronis Racing at 4 he blossomed into a multiple graded stakes performer. His last six races of 2019 produced a 5 1/4-length win in the \$1 Million TVG Pacific Classic Stakes (G1), a runner-up effort in the Wickerr Stakes, and a pair of thirds in the Awesome Again Stakes (G1) and Longines Breeders' Cup Classic (G1). Higher Power was bred in Kentucky by Josephine Abercrombie's Pin Oak Stud, which initially raced the homebred. He is out of the multiple stakes-winning Seattle Slew mare Alternate, who has produced nine winners from nine foals to race, including multiple graded stakes-winning Alternation and graded-placed stakes winner Interrupted.

PROMISES FULFILLED \$10,000

2015, Shackleford—Marquee Delivery, by Marquetry
WinStar Farm

Brilliance and the durability to handle fractions of :44 and change in six different graded stakes are the hallmarks of Promises Fulfilled's racing career. The son of classic winner and three-time grade 1 winner Shackleford, won five graded stakes at distances from six furlongs to 1 1/16 miles—winning the H. Allen Jerkens Stakes Presented by Runhappy (G1), Xpressbet Fountain of Youth Stakes (G2), John A. Nerud Stakes (G2), Stoll Keenon Ogden Phoenix Stakes (G2), and Amsterdam Stakes (G3). He competed exclusively in graded stakes company following his first two victories at 2. Promises Fulfilled is out of the multiple graded stakes-placed Marquetry mare Marquee Delivery and is a half brother to multiple stakes winner and graded stakes-placed Marquee Miss (by Cowboy Cal), graded-placed winner Tiesto (by Tiznow), and multiple stakes-placed Marquee Cal Gal (Cowboy Cal).

2016, Lookin At Lucky—Quake Lake, by War Chant

American classic winner Country House will be doing his part to grow the Smart Strike branch of the Mr. Prospector sire line. The 2019 Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) winner is by Lookin At Lucky, the champion 2-year-old male of 2009 and champion 3-year-old male of 2010 and the sire of 60 black-type winners worldwide. Country House compiled a 2-2-1 record out of seven starts and earned \$2,120,175. He is out of the winning War Chant mare Quake Lake, a half sister to graded stakes winner and multiple grade 1-placed Breaking Lucky, who is also by Lookin At Lucky. Quake Lake and Breaking Lucky are out of grade 1-placed Sky Classic mare Shooting Party. Country House is a half brother to grade 3 winner Mitchell Road.

INSTAGRAND \$7,500

2016, Into Mischief—Assets of War, by Lawyer Ron
Taylor Made Stallions

Flashy and quick, Instagrand grabbed attention at Fasig-Tipton's 2018 Gulfstream sale where Larry Best bought the son of Into Mischief for \$1.2 million. He was as precocious as expected, winning his maiden debut by 10 lengths. In his second start he won the Best Pal Stakes (G2) at Del Mar by 10 1/4 lengths. At 3, he finished third in both the Gotham Stakes (G3) and Santa Anita Derby (G1), earning Equibase Speed Ratings higher than 100 in each. Instagrand is out of the winning Lawyer Ron mare Assets of War, whose dam is graded stakes winner and stakes producer Added Asset. The family also produced Black-Eyed Susan Stakes (G2) winner Added Gold and grade 1 winner Book Review.

THOUSAND WORDS \$7,500

2017, Pioneerof the Nile—Pomeroy's Pistol, by Pomeroy
Spendthrift Farm

Thousand Words made a big splash as a yearling when the Albaugh Family and Spendthrift Farm bought him at the 2018 Keeneland September Yearling Sale for \$1 million, making him the first Pioneerof the Nile yearling to sell for seven figures.

The colt went on to prove himself multiple times in graded stakes among some of the most talented runners of his generation. Thousand Words won the Los Alamitos Futurity (G2) in his second lifetime start and went on at 3 to win the Robert B. Lewis Stakes (G3), finish as runner-up in the Los Alamitos Derby (G3), and defeat grade 1 winner Honor A. P. in the Shared Belief Stakes. The colt would be saddled for the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) but was scratched after flipping in the paddock.

This year Thousand Words becomes the 12th sire-son of Pioneer of the Nile standing in North America and the fifth in Kentucky. Thousand Words will be part of Spendthrift's "Share The Upside" program, which allows breeders to earn a lifetime breeding right.

The Share The Upside fee for Thousand Words will be \$10,000 for one year. For breeders not interested in the Share The Upside program, Thousand Words will be offered for \$7,500 on a standard stands and nurses contract.

Bred in Florida by Hardacre Farm, Thousand Words is out of the multiple grade 2-winning and grade 1-placed Pomeroy mare Pomeroy's Pistol, who is a half sister to two black-type performers—Wildcat Creek (by Wildcat Heir) and D'cats Meow (by D'wildcat). The family also produced grade 1 winner and prominent sire Harlan, the grandsire of Spendthrift Farm's leading sire Into Mischief.

CARACARO \$6,500

2017, Uncle Mo—Peace Time, by War Front
Crestwood Farm

Caracaro showed he inherited the best from his family by effectively competing against the most talented runners of his crop. He broke his maiden second time out by six lengths at Gulfstream Park, going a mile in 1:35.16, which was the fastest time at a mile for a 3-year-olds during the meet. Following a six-month respite, the son of Uncle Mo finished a determined second by a neck to Country Grammar in the Peter Pan Stakes (G3) and was runner-up in the Runhappy Travers Stakes (G1) behind four-time grade 1 winner Tiz the Law. The War Front mare Peace Time is

Calumet Farm homebred Bravazo was a fixture among some of the highest-profile races of 2018. He kick-started his sophomore campaign by winning the Risen Star Stakes Presented by Lamarque Ford (G2). He finished a respectable sixth after a rough trip in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) and was second by half a length in the Preakness Stakes (G1) to eventual Triple Crown winner Justify. He was later second in the betfair.com Haskell Invitational Stakes (G1) and Clark Handicap Presented by Norton Healthcare (G1) and third in the Runhappy Travers Stakes Presented by NYRA Bets (G1) and Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile (G1). Bravazo is out of the Cee's Tizzy winner Tiz o' Gold, who is out of Pep o' Gold (by Slew o' Gold), a winning half sister to stakes-placed Pewterville, whose dam Ginged Up is a full sister to multiple black-type winner Broadway Pointe.

YORKTON \$5,000

2014, Speightstown—Sunday Affair, by A.P. Indy
Crestwood Farm

Multiple graded stakes winner Yorkton displayed precocity, front-running speed, and durability during his five-year racing career from 2 to 6. He broke his maiden at 2 and won stakes races at 3, 4, and 5 that ranged from 6 1/2 furlongs to a mile. Yorkton won consecutive runnings of the Bold Venture Stakes (G3) at Woodbine in 2018-19, with his second victory producing a career top Beyer Speed Figure of 103. He retired with a 7-4-3 record from 30 starts and earned \$546,332. Out of the A.P. Indy daughter Sunday Affair, Yorkton is a half brother to multiple stakes-placed winner Nipigon (Niigon). The mare's second dam is multiple grade 1 winner Maplejinsky, the dam of multiple grade 1 winner and champion Sky Beauty. The family also produced grade 1 winners and sires Violence and Tale of Ekati. **BH**

Mucho Unusual wins the Megahertz Stakes at Santa Anita Park

Despite being fanned wide as she entered the stretch, Mucho Unusual dug in with encouragement from jockey Joel Rosario to make up for traveling extra ground and fended off a strong bid from late-running Sedamar to win the \$98,000 Megahertz Stakes (G3T) Jan. 18 at Santa Anita Park.

The one-mile turf event for older fillies and mares was the second consecutive win for George Krikorian's California homebred, who cut back from winning at 1 1/8 miles in the Robert J. Frankel Stakes (G3T) Dec. 27.

"She's super honest, we're excited to have her in the stable, (it's been) just a great ride," said winning trainer Tim Yakteen. "It was sort of the way the schedule came up. We were thinking about keeping her at a mile and one eighth, mile and a quarter; unfortunately, there really wasn't anything coming up until the end of March, so we thought we would take advantage of a lighter field. It didn't look like it was heavily subscribed, she was training absolutely fantastic, so we thought we'd take advantage of it."

The 5-year-old Mucho Macho Man mare also won the 1 1/4-mile Rodeo Drive Stakes (G1T) back in September at Santa Anita. Yakteen said he will probably look at the Santa Ana Stakes (G3T) March 27 over the same course and distance for her next start.

Chilean import Brooke showed the way under regular jockey Jeremy Laprida in the four-horse

Megahertz as Mucho Unusual stalked in second on the outside. Colonial Creed chased in third and Sedamar took her time in fourth. Opening quarter-mile fractions went in :23.78, :48, and 1:12.55.

As the field rounded the turn for home, Brooke shifted far out from the rail and took Mucho Unusual with her. Umberto Rispoli was gearing up Sedamar for a run and had to alter her path five wide. Brooke shifted back in near the three-sixteenths pole and bumped Colonial Creed, who was checked by Flavien Prat.

Mucho Unusual took over at the top of the stretch but was challenged by Sedamar. Under right-handed urging, she prevailed to win by three-quarters of a length and paid \$2.80 for a \$2 win ticket as the favorite. The final time on the firm turf was 1:35.89.

"I just got a good break. I went to the first turn and it looked like the one horse (Brooke) really wanted

to go to the lead, so I just waited behind that one a little bit," Rosario said. "This horse is really good. She was able to come out really far and just hang on. It was amazing. Thank you to the team and to George (Krikorian) for the opportunity."

Sedamar crossed the wire another half-length in front of Brooke and Colonial Creed was last across the line after being checked. Following an inquiry, stewards placed Colonial Creed third and disqualified Brooke and placed her last for shifting in and causing Colonial Creed to check past the three-sixteenths pole. Ippodamia's Girl and Lucky Peridot were scratched.

Mucho Unusual is out of the Unusual Heat mare Not Unusual and is a half sister to grade 3 winner, grade 1-placed Big Score. Since Mucho Unusual, Not Unusual has produced the 3-year-old Mr. Big gelding Big Talker who was second in a Jan. 8 maiden special weight at Santa Anita, a 2-year-old Mr. Big filly, and a Kitten's Joy colt last year after which she was reported bred to Uncle Mo.

From 19 career starts, Mucho Unusual has collected a 7-3-4 record and earned \$822,715. **BH**

COURT VISION, GIANT EXPECTATIONS INVIGORATING NEBRASKA

Lifelong Nebraska horsewoman Judy Pryor couldn't be more excited about her latest stallion acquisitions because she believes their arrival are harbingers of better days ahead for the state's struggling Thoroughbred racing industry.

She's added to her stallion barn for 2021 five-time grade 1 winner Court Vision, the sire of 2-year-old champion Storm the Court, and multiple grade 2 winner Giant Expectations, who is entering stud this year.

"Court Vision has changed the attitude in our state," said the owner of Pryor Ranch, which covers 400 acres just outside Omaha. "Owning this horse is like having a rock star in the barn."

In November, Nebraska voters approved legalizing casino gaming at six licensed horse tracks, finding success after four previously failed attempts. The latest ballot initiative coincided with Pryor's own mission to acquire a Thoroughbred stallion with a substantial pedigree and a glowing race record.

She's already had substantial success with a 15-year-old son of Lemon Drop Kid named Gold Schleiger, who she acquired for free when injury derailed the horse's racing career before he became a winner. Pryor owns a number of Thoroughbred mares she acquired over the years by walking the shedrows of racetracks looking for big, scopey mares that were too slow, so trainers were happy to give them away.

"I bred these mares to my Quarter Horse studs, which is how we got a lot of our hunt seat world champions and jumpers," Pryor said, who stood renowned Quarter Horse stallion Deck of Stars, who sired multi-breed World and Reserve World champions, a Supreme Champion, AQHA champions, an AQHA Reserve High Point, Superior Halter horses, and Superior Performance horses in multiple events.

Now with a Thoroughbred stallion, she decided to dabble in breeding Thoroughbred racehorses. Pryor is no stranger to the racing world. Her cousin Derron Heldt is vice president of racing at Prairie Meadows, and Heldt's parents were trainers that raced at Prairie Meadows, Oaklawn Park, and Omaha's former Ak-Sar-

Ben Racetrack, which closed in 1995. Pryor also used to take in layups and freshen horses stabled at Ak-Sar-Ben.

Her experiment with Gold Schleiger resulted in three non-black-type stakes winners in his first substantial crop: dual stakes winner P R Girl Crush, P R Gold Markets, and P R Kipling's Gold. To date, the stallion has sired 12 winners from 26 starters, which include seven non-black-type stakes performers. Raced exclusively at purse-challenged Nebraska tracks, Gold Schleiger's runners average nearly \$9,100 per starter. He stands for \$500.

"I got hooked on (Thoroughbred racing) but then people would say, she just takes those so-so horses and they aren't much," Pryor said. "I went to Keeneland with my mind set on buying a famous horse."

Pryor spent two weeks in Lexington last November, visiting farms and sitting through every session of the Keeneland November Breeding Stock Sale. She would get leads on stallions for sale and then the deals fell through, one after the other.

"I did not come home with a horse. It was too heartbreaking," she recalled.

Back in Omaha, Pryor began working the phones, calling farms directly and working through bloodstock agents. She got connected with Justin Border, co-founder of Exline-Border Racing, who was looking for a home for Giant Expectations.

"I was impressed that Justin had gotten into the business in 2012 and already had two Breeders' Cup winners and two champions," Pryor said, referring to 2016 champion 2-year-old filly Champagne Room and 2019 champion 2-year-old colt Storm the Court. Exline-Border co-owned the champions with several partners. "I started researching his Breeders' Cup winners and found they were both by sires I like, so I knew we liked the same types of horses."

Pryor found Court Vision particularly attractive because he was a multiple grade 1 winner that had sired a grade 1 winner and champion. The stallion also is by Gulch, who she knew as a "war horse that was sturdy and never gave up," and Court Vision's dam Weekend Storm is a full sister to Preakness Stakes (G1) winner Summer Squall. The family produced leading sire A.P. Indy, too.

David Tillson with Acadiana Equine@Cooper Crowne in Louisiana, where Court Vision had stood since 2016, said he got a call out of the blue from Pryor. They talked, both took a night to mull Pryor's proposal to buy the stallion, and the next day made a deal.

"David told me, 'I really can't sell the stallion for less than X.' I said, 'Sold. I'll take him,'" Pryor recalled.

"It's truly been an honor to be associated with such a great horse," Tillson said. "Everything about him spoke to excellence. It was also great to be able to sell him to someone who will give him a lifetime

home. The horse deserves the best of care and Judy will give it to him."

Pryor said she did have some concern about buying a 16-year-old stallion, but she also noted she bought Deck of Stars when he was 14.

"My vet is very comfortable we can breed 40-70 mares. I don't think Nebraska will support 40-70 but we have had calls from out of state," Pryor said, who added that she sees Court Vision proving to be a valuable cross with her Quarter Horse mares, too.

"I was a barrel racer, and I think this horse will sire some very famous barrel racers. He doesn't get into the ground, he stays on top of it and is light of foot," she said. "Giant Expectations also has a lot of potential for both breeds. He is big and the interns I have at the ranch, they love him for hunter/jumpers."

"Everyone in the state has worked so hard to get us back to the good ole Ak-Sar-Ben days," Pryor said. "It seems now that it all fits, these steppingstones to a future Ak-Sar-Ben, and by having these nice stallions, well, we might be on the way." **BH**

Airdrie Stud stallion Preservationist was represented by his first reported foal with the arrival of a filly produced from the Giant's Causeway mare Win Crafty Jan. 8 in Ocala, Fla.

A daughter of the graded stakes winner Win Crafty Lady, Win Crafty is a half sister to grade 1 winner Harmony Lodge, Arkansas Derby (G2) winner Graeme Hall, and the stakes-winning and graded stakes-producing mare Win's Fair Lady. She is also a full sister to Win McCool, a graded stakes producer and granddam of grade 1-winning millionaire Magnum Moon.

Breeder Dominique Damico of Fly By Breeding described her Preservationist filly as "a beautiful filly with great bone,

a super shoulder, and great presence," and indicated that she will be retained to race.

Preservationist, a grade 1-winning millionaire son of Arch, was trained by Jimmy Jerkens for Centennial Farms before he began stud duties in 2020. Bred in Kentucky by Emory Hamilton out of the Dixieland Band mare Flying Dixie, he was a \$485,000 purchase by Centennial from the Gainesway consignment to

the 2014 Keeneland September Yearling Sale. He went on to vanquish top-class rivals including Catholic Boy, Yoshida, and Tom's d'Etat in 2019 when he won the Woodward Stakes Presented by NYRA Bets (G1) at Saratoga Race Course and the Suburban Stakes (G2) at Belmont Park. He became one of 18 graded stakes winners under his first three dams.

PARADISE SONG AMONG THREE OF NOTE TO BREAK MAIDENS

This column highlights the performances of maidens who have made no more than five starts and who either sold for more than \$500,000 at public auction, have siblings that are grade/group winners, or have dams that are grade/group winners. Blood-Horse research shows maiden winners in particular who meet these criteria are more likely to go on to be graded stakes winners.

Paradise Song breaks her maiden at Laurel Park in her second start

Laurel

Sonata Stable's Paradise Song earned her first win Jan. 15, taking a six-furlong maiden test for 3-year-old fillies at Laurel Park. The Frosted filly, who is a half sister to 2019 Big Ass Fans Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile (G1) winner Spun to Run, defeated a field of six others by 3 1/4 lengths in her second start.

Ridden by Julian Pimentel for trainer Michael Trombetta, Paradise Song was second as the first quarter-mile went in :22.92, but then ranged up along the outside of the leader and took the lead to post a half-mile time of :46.64. She then galloped out to finish the six furlongs in 1:10.84 on a fast track.

In her Nov. 29 debut, Paradise Song finished seventh and last in a maiden test at Aqueduct Racetrack.

Bred by Sabana Farm in Kentucky, Paradise Song is out of the Grand Slam mare Yawkey Way, who won a minor stakes at Saratoga Race Course, and aside from producing Spun to Run, she is also the dam of stakes winner Tap It All.

Golden Gate

Trainer Michael Lenzini sent out Cristiano's Dream to a debut win Jan. 17 at Golden Gate Fields. The Tourist colt, a half brother to graded stakes winner Gold Rush Dancer, rallied to a 3 1/2-length win in a 5 1/2-furlong maiden special weight race on the all-weather track against seven other California-bred 3-year-olds.

Cristiano's Dream raced in sixth under jockey Erick Lopez before picking off runners five wide on the turn. He was a head in front coming into the stretch and pulled away in a final time of 1:04.59.

Bred in California by his owner John Parker, Cristiano's Dream is out of the unraced In Excess mare Dances On Water.

Tampa Bay

Michael Dini's Double Blessed found the winner's circle in her fourth start Jan. 17, taking a 1 1/8-mile turf test for 3-year-old fillies at Tampa Bay Downs.

The Treasure Beach filly is trained by her owner and is out of Canada's 2009 champion grass mare Points of Grace.

Double Blessed raced in fifth through the first six furlongs, but was asked for more by jockey Tomas Mejia and responded well in the stretch. She just got a head in front as they crossed the wire, posting a final time of 1:51.70 on firm turf.

The filly finished third in the Juvenile Fillies Turf Stakes at Gulfstream Park West in her second start, but was fourth in her two other maiden tests, which came at Monmouth Park and Tampa Bay.

Double Blessed was bred by Helen and Joseph Barbazon in Florida. Points of Grace, by Point Given, also produced Natalma Stakes (G1T) winner Victory to Victory, who was named Canada's 2016 champion 2-year-old filly. **BH**

GOLD DREAM AND SATURNALIA RETIRED TO STUD DUTY IN JAPAN

Japanese grade 1 winners Gold Dream and Saturnalia have been retired from racing to begin stud duties this year.

Katsumi Yoshida's Gold Dream was named the Japan Racing Association's champion dirt horse in 2017, when he won the February Stakes (G1) at Tokyo and the Champions Cup (G1) at Chukyo. He also won the Kashiwa Kinen, a domestic grade 1 at Funabashi, in 2018-19 and the Teio Sho, a domestic grade 1 at Oi, in 2018.

Gold Dream is by Gold Allure, a son of Sunday Silence who was the JRA's champion dirt horse in 2002, and out of the French Deputy mare Mon Vert. In 2020, Gold Dream finished sixth in inaugural running of the Saudi Cup last February and second in the Champions Cup in December, which was his final career start.

Gold Dream arrived at Lex Stud in Hokkaido Jan. 7 and stands for ¥1 million (US\$9,540).

Saturnalia, by Lord Kanaloa, is ninth foal out of Cesario, who won the 2005 American Oaks

Invitational Stakes (G1T) at Hollywood Park to become the first Japanese-trained winner of a grade 1 in the United States. He is half brother to Epiphaneia, whose first-crop daughter Daring Tact won the 2020 Triple Tiara, and to Leontes, who ranked fourth among freshman sires in 2020.

Saturnalia, who won the 2018 Hopeful Stakes (G1) at Nakayama and the 2019 Satsuki Sho (Japanese Two Thousand Guineas, G1) at Nakayama for U Carrot Farm, stands at Shadai Stallion Station in Hokkaido. His stud fee will be announced shortly. **BH**

DEEP FIELD, IFFRAAJ COLTS CLOSE OUT MAGIC MILLIONS SALE

Yarramalong Park principal Richard Foster says the time was right to cash in on the success of exciting 2-year-old Alpine Edge by selling his half brother by Deep Field for AU\$310,000 (US\$238,951), one of two colts to make the Book 2 top price at the Magic Millions Yearling Sale Jan. 18.

Bringing the marathon and record-breaking Gold Coast auction to a close, it was veteran local trainer John Morrissey who outlasted agent Denys Chan to buy the younger sibling to the Toby and Trent Edmonds-trained Alpine Edge, who was beaten a length and a quarter when finishing runner-up behind Shaquero in Saturday's The Star Gold Coast Magic Millions 2-Year-Old Classic.

Foster said: "We sold his half brother by Better Than Ready last year for AU\$160,000 (\$110,426) and we kept 25% of him. He's gone on and won nearly AU\$600,000 in three starts and there looks a lot more to come hopefully.

"With this colt, we thought we better sell him and take some money off the table. He was always a very nice colt, right from birth, as they all are out of that particular mare.

"I'm so happy John Morrissey has got him as we've raced plenty of horses with Johnny over the years, off and on, and he's a great mate of ours and a great friend. We hope he has bought himself a champion."

Cataloged as Lot 1244, he is the fourth foal out of the multiple stakes-performed mare Freezethemillions, who has produced two winners from three foals to race, including the Phelan Ready To Buy A Room Stakes and Magic Millions B.J. McLachlan Stakes (G3) winner Alpine Edge.

Morrissey bought the colt on behalf of long-time client Gundaroo Stud, who have had horses with the trainer and his son Scott since he was training from Capricorn Park near Canberra in the 1990s.

"He's a different type of horse to his half brother, but he's a very nice horse," said Morrissey.

"He's a little neat compact horse. The owner liked him more than me, but I thought he was a nice little horse.

"I feel he will make a 2-year-old. We will try to see if he can be a horse that might make the race next year. We can only try."

Foster, whose Yarramalong Park sold 14 yearlings across Books 1 and 2 for a total of AU\$1,650,000, thought his Deep Field colt was well-placed in the second session.

"I didn't push (for Book 1), because at that stage Alpine Edge hadn't run in a race," he said.

"We knew he was good but, at the end of the day, if Alpine Edge hadn't won those races, he might have got lost in Book 1.

"The fact he has been sold after the Magic Millions race has been run was no disadvantage."

Before the colt entered the sale ring, Foster thought he could have made anything from AU\$250,000 to AU\$500,000.

"We couldn't value him," he said. "You have to let the market value horses like this.

"I can't sell them and buy them, I can only sell them. When they get up into that kind of money, you leave it to the buyers to sort it out."

Iffraaj Colts Popular for Second Year in a Row

Earlier in the session Hong Kong agent Chan, who operates Golden River Investments, made sure he put a big exclamation mark on his three-month stint in Australia with a quickfire AU\$310,000 (\$238,951) acquisition of a New Zealand-bred son of Iffraaj.

It was Chan who landed the sizeable colt for a Hong Kong client after also signing for the AU\$300,000 (\$230,821) Scissor Kick filly sold on Sunday on behalf of All Winners Thoroughbreds.

Chan, who was Facetimeing his client throughout the bidding process, held off the challenge of a rival who was sitting on the other side of the auditorium.

Chan said: "I like him a lot. He's obviously a nice big horse who is a type. He is a good walker and he vetted all clean.

"He is for a Hong Kong client but he could race here in Australia before going back to Hong Kong on a PP (private purchase permit) or something like that."

Iffraaj, whose shuttling duties to Haunui Farm in New Zealand ceased at the end of 2019, has now sired the top-priced Book 2 yearling for the past two years after Orbis Bloodstock went to AU\$370,000 for another colt by the sire 12 months earlier.

The Darley stallion has sired 20 individual winners of 51 races in Hong Kong, including the stakes-placed Happy Era.

Offered by Bhima Thoroughbreds on behalf of Haunui Farm marketing manager Shannon Taylor, the colt received an important pre-sale pedigree update when his half sister Cool Change ran third in a listed race at Pukekohe. Cataloged as Lot 1186, he is the fourth living foal out of Busted Love, who herself is a half sister to Singapore's champion 2-year-old of 2017, Be Bee.

Bjorn Baker or Greg Eurell, who will train the Capitalist half sister to Hong Kong champion Golden Sixty who was sold in Book 1 and secured by Chan, are in line to train the Iffraaj colt.

Bhima's Mike Fleming, who has sold horses for a number of New Zealand clients on the Gold Coast, believes this week's results could be the catalyst for more Kiwi breeders to send stock to market in Australia.

He said: "He's a lovely horse, obviously a classic horse, and he got a good update at the right time. He paraded well all week, showed himself off well, and his sire is doing a great job. I couldn't be happier.

"He came over and was prepped here. She targeted him for the Book 2 sale, so (Haunui) can take all the credit, we just prepped him and put him through."

The end of the Magic Millions sale also brought a conclusion to Chan's extended stay in Australia after first quarantining in New Zealand last October.

"I came into Australia in late October, then I did the Hunter yearling inspections for this sale," he said.

"The market has been very strong, but it's been a good sale, though. The quality is just unbelievable. I think it's been one of the best yearling sales in the Southern Hemisphere.

"I will fly back to Hong Kong on the 20th and then maybe I will be back in May/June for the National Yearling Sale."

ROYAL ASCOT EXPANDED TO SEVEN RACES A DAY

Richard Hannon and Roger Varian led the universal approval from leading trainers, owners, and jockeys to Ascot's announcement it will permanently expand the royal meeting with seven races each day.

The five-day meeting, which begins June 15, was expanded last season to facilitate extra runners whose campaigns were severely interrupted by the coronavirus pandemic before the resumption of racing on June 1.

But such was the popularity of the revised schedule with bookmakers and connections in 2020 that Ascot has decided to retain four of the additions—the Copper Horse Stakes, Palace of Holyroodhouse Stakes, Golden Gates Stakes, and Buckingham Palace Stakes, which was restored after it was scrapped in 2015 following the introduction of the Commonwealth Cup (G1).

Last year's consolation contests for the Royal Hunt Cup and Wokingham Stakes have not been retained, with the Kensington Palace Stakes—a new handicap for fillies and mares aged 4 and up on the round mile—the only completely new addition in 2021.

The Hannon yard is synonymous with success at the royal meeting.

"The appetite for Royal Ascot is almost unlimited," the leading trainer said, "it's a great event for the whole industry, and the more races there, the more stories created by Royal Ascot, the better. The more winning owners we can produce, the better."

"It's the flagship meeting for the whole industry in this country. I can't imagine it will be anything but well received by everybody."

Varian enjoyed an outstanding Royal Ascot in 2020, winning four races including the newly added Copper Horse Handicap with subsequent Sky Bet Ebor winner and Comer Group International Irish St. Leger (G1) runner-up Fujaira Prince.

"I think it's good news from where I'm sitting," he said. "I can't see a negative."

"We won one of them (the new races) last year, the mile and six handicap, and they have their place. They were well received and I think they were probably right not to keep the consolation races."

One man who may be sad to see the loss of the Silver Royal Hunt Cup is William Knight, who won it last year with Sir Busker.

"I think the extra races were a success last year and they fill the card," he said, "it's not an extra day just an extra race each day so it can only be a good thing."

"If it's going to increase revenue, I don't think it dilutes the meeting at all and I'm sure there will be big fields. I can't see any negatives. They had a good trial last year and it worked on figures and it makes total sense to me."

William Haggas is another who would like to see the consolation races return.

"It's such a prestigious meeting for all of us and I don't think it dilutes the product, the races they've put on are pretty good," he said. "The fillies' race is great and it's on the round mile, which is hardly ever used at the royal meeting.

"I think last year they did extraordinarily well and I think a Silver Wokingham and Silver Royal Hunt Cup could possibly be things for the future. I think it's good news all around."

Nick Smith, Ascot's director of racing and public affairs, said: "We had positive feedback from bookmakers and broadcasters, and the Levy Board was keen for us to continue the program. We also had great responses from connections of horses who ran in the extra races last year. A Royal Ascot winner means a lot and it makes sense to give more people the chance to have a runner.

"Of course, there were some people who felt it would be a shame for the meeting to become too long but seven races a day is still not a very long card and the response was overwhelmingly positive.

"Expanding the meeting was always under consideration. Last year was a needs-must situation, which allowed us to test a new schedule in an environment where it would be universally welcomed. It went well and the arguments against continuing it weren't that strong."

Prize money will be confirmed in advance of the early closing races in April and has been listed with holding values based on 2020.

"Things are so uncertain," said Smith. "Just over a month ago we were beginning our project for the return of crowds over Christmas and suddenly there was a new variant of the virus and a lockdown.

"We don't really have any idea of when crowds will be able to return and there's no magic wand in terms of the levy so we don't know the levels of prize money on offer but we'll obviously do the very best we can and we're preparing for every eventuality."

In a statement Jan. 18, Smith added: "At this time, more than ever, the increased opportunity to win prize money and to generate more levy and domestic and overseas betting income is crucial.

"After consultation with the (British Horseracing Authority), we decided to remove the two reserve races and bring in another high-quality handicap, as we are actually reducing the number of races run by one from last year.

"Last year's extended cards were only possible by reducing some field sizes slightly and because no overnight stabling was allowed under COVID-19 protocols. In order that field sizes can go up to their maximums again and with overnight stabling

extremely important, we have commissioned extra temporary stabling to be built."

The new races will be run as the final races on each day, excluding Saturday, which will end with the traditional finale of the Queen Alexandra Stakes. The first race each day will be scheduled for 2:30 p.m. local time, with the royal procession planned to continue in its usual 2 p.m. slot.

Frankel, who finished last year with another group 1-winning 2-year-old in Grenadier Guards as well as the top-level winning pair of Mozu Ascot and Mirage Dancer, will receive 24 mares from the operation, whose founder [Khalid Abdullah sadly died last week](#).

Among them are Bird Flown, the dam of last year's Tattersalls Irish Two Thousand Guineas (G1) hero Siskin; Nimble Thimble, who produced Quadrilateral to the son of Galileo; multiple top-level victress Ventura, the dam of group 3 heroine Fount, who is by Frankel; and Emulous.

Also included in the dual world champion's book are the group 2-winning pair of Soffia and Modern Look plus Very Good News, the dam of the classic-placed Weekender and the promising Andre Fabre-trained Media Stream.

Flare of Firelight, the dam of Cheveley Park's dual group 2-winning juvenile Threat, is another leading name on the 13-year-old's dance card, alongside group 3 scorers Big Break, Dandhu, and Visit.

Two half sisters to Kingman in Panzanella and Present Tense will also be sent to Frankel, along with Atone, a sister to Midday, and Sleep Walk, a half sister to William Hill St. Leger (G1) hero Logician.

Kingman's Harem

The irrepressible Kingman, who was responsible for the top-class milers Palace Pier and Persian King last season, will also receive strong support

Among Kingman's illustrious mares are Enable, Frankel's dam Kind, and group/grade 1 heroines such as Capla Tempress, Passage of Time, and Romantica.

The son of Invincible Spirit will also cover Scuffle, the dam of Logician, her stakes-placed daughter Battlement, and Helleborine, who produced Coventry (G2) scorer Calyx.

Sun Maiden, a group 3-winning and group 1-placed daughter of Frankel, will also visit the 10-year-old.

Expert Eye's Visitors

Expert Eye covered 50 stakes winners in his first two books and had his first foals hit the ground last year. Among the Juddmonte mares set to visit the son of Acclamation are the multiple listed scorer and group 1-placed Principal Role; Kilo Alpha, the dam of grade 3 winner and grade 1-placed Juliet Foxtrot; and Photographic, the dam of Shutter Speed.

The Breeders' Cup Mile (G1T) winner will also cover the well-related pair of Palmette, a full sister to Showcasing, and Strelka, a Kingman half sister to Investec Epsom Derby (G1) and Arc hero Workforce.

Bated Breath's Book

Bated Breath enjoyed another productive year in 2020 and had his first top-level winner when Juddmonte homebred Viadera—who remains in training for 2021—struck in the Matriarch Stakes (G1T) at Del Mar in November for trainer Chad Brown.

The son of Dansili is also responsible for the Aga Khan's Makaloun, a group 3 winner and placed in the Criterium de Saint-Cloud (G1).

Oasis Dream, the venerable member of Banstead Manor Stud's five-strong stallion squad, reached a landmark 200 stakes winners in 2020, while he also made a significant impact as a broodmare sire with four group 1 winners including Siskin and Ladbrokes Cox Plate (G1) winner Sir Dragonet.

The son of Green Desert will cover a book that includes Bonne Idee, a winning Frankel half sister to Oasis Dream's group 2 victor Imaging and the dual-winning Bated Breath filly It's A Given.

Other notable names for Oasis Dream are Occurrence, an unraced Frankel filly out of Hasili's sister Arrive, and Shared Account, the dam of Oasis Dream's group-placed daughter Sand Share and juvenile group 3 scorer Pocket Square.

Outside Stallions

Among the Juddmonte mares being sent to Darley supersire Dubawi are Quadrilateral, Goldika—a daughter of the brilliant Goldikova—and dual listed winner Franconia, while new Dalham Hall recruit Pinatubo will be visited by Announce, winner of the Darley Prix Jean Romanet (G1) and dam of the stakes-placed Tapit filly Maquette.

Enable's dam Concentric will revisit Nathaniel, while Enable's group-placed Dansili half sister Entitle will be covered by Sea The Stars.

Top-level winners African Rose (who will visit Dark Angel), Middy (No Nay Never), Proviso (Wootton Bassett), Promising Lead (Calyx), and Timepiece (Night Of Thunder) are among the stellar book of mares going to outside stallions, while Frankel's Prix de Sandringham (G2)-winning daughter Obligate and Ribblesdale (G2) runner-up Mori will visit Siyouni alongside Headman's dam Deliberate.

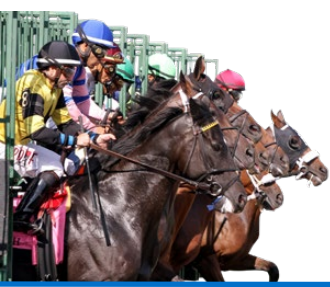
