

FRONT RUN THE FED LEADS THE WAY AT F-T JULY HORA SALE

Pasig-Tipton's Newtown
Paddocks were buzzing July 12
with buyers and consignors happy
to be back at what they love after
a year like no other in 2020 due to
the COVID-19 pandemic.

Reassured by the conclusion of a strong 2-year-old sales season and anticipating the upcoming summer meets at Saratoga Race Course and Del Mar, buyers at The July Selected Horses of Racing Age Sale created an active market with competitive bidding throughout the day. Stakes winner Front Run the Fed brought the top price of the sale, going to George Sharp for \$440,000 from ELiTE's consignment.

Of 105 horses offered, Fasig-Tipton reported 79 horses sold in Monday's horses of racing age sale for gross receipts of \$5,905,500, an average price of \$74,753, and a \$50,000 median. The RNA rate fell to 24.8%. Last year's sale saw 81 horses gross \$5,072,000, with an average price of \$62,617, a \$30,000 median, and an RNA rate of 31.9%.

"I don't think there were any real surprises today," said Fasig-Tipton president and CEO Boyd Browning Jr. "A very active market. Very competitive bidding throughout the day. It's the

same story—the higher the quality of the horses, the more activity and interest there is in those horses. "It was a very solid marketplace, lots of good commerce and trade. It was not crazy—there were no prices

that were double what we thought horses would sell for."

Browning added of the sale launched in 2013, "It is an encouraging start to the middle part of the July sale process—a significant component. The sale continues to have a real place in the calendar, a service to the marketplace."



"We've been doing this for five years and we're the leader in the space, and this was the most vibrant racehorse sale we've participated in," said ELiTE co-founder Bradley Weisbord. "It was a really good sale, not only for us, but for the entire market."

"Quality, quality, quality," Browning said. "There is a great

demand for racehorses right now, but they have to have a certain level of quality and have to get through most of the scrutiny."

Front Run the Fed certainly met that criteria. The 5-vear-old son of Fed Biz was bred in Kentucky by Colts Neck Stables out of the Posse mare Lawless Miss, and was previously a \$300,000 purchase by Mike Ryan from Hunter Valley Farm's consignment to the 2017 Keeneland September Yearling Sale. Campaigned by Klaravich Stables and trained by Chad Brown, he is a stakes winner and has placed in four other stakes, two of them graded. After taking the Better Talk Now Stakes in 2019, he was runnerup in that year's English Channel Stakes, and in 2020 was second in the Runhappy Turf Sprint Stakes (G3T). Last season he also competed in the Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint (G1T), finishing sixth. This year he finished second in the Elusive Quality Stakes and last out June 20 was third in the Poker Stakes (G3T).

The bay will be transferred to trainer Caio Caramori in Kentucky. His record stands at 4-4-2 from 13 starts, with earnings of \$392,150.

Sharp was the man of the hour, who, after being outbid on a few other horses, was able to finally clinch the best—if last—on his list.

"He's a champ. He was the best horse in the sale, bar none, in terms of performance," Sharp said.
"Fearless (Hip 642, a \$205,000 purchase by Repole Stables) is nice too, but I didn't like the way he vetted out, so I decided to pass on him.

"Front Run the Fed vetted out perfectly. It showed in the price he brought. We are pretty happy. A little nervous, but pretty happy."

The future for Front Run the Fed will be in the hands of Caramori. Plans for the horse include another crack at Kentucky Downs and possibly a race at Del Mar before pursuing the golden egg at the Breeders' Cup.

"We wish them the best of luck," Weisbord said of Front Run the Fed's new connections. "I think Front Run the Fed is ideal for the \$1 million race at Kentucky Downs that he was beat a head in last year (the Turf Sprint Stakes). He's a grade 1-level turf horse and he got beat by two grade 1-level horses even in the grade 3 Poker last time ... I know they're really pumped up for a good season." BH

PROMINENT OWNER/BREEDER BERT FIRESTONE DIES AT 89


Lifelong horseman, accomplished owner/breeder, and Eclipse Award leading owner of 1980 Bertram Robert Firestone died July 12 in West Palm Beach, Fla., following a rapid deterioration of his health in the past week, according to his family. Firestone would have turned 90 next month.

Firestone's association with horses started in the show ring. He attended the New York Military Academy where he was on the jumping team and also attended the University of Virginia.

"I think horses were everything in his life," said Firestone's son, Matthew.

After graduation from college in 1954, he worked for a New York brokerage firm and then formed Firestone Properties, a company that planned, built, and leased commercial and industrial properties.

Firestone bought his first Thoroughbred yearling at Fasig-Tipton's 1966 Saratoga select yearling sale under the name Chance Hill Farm. He would find success in racing early when he won his first stakes in 1969 with a Ridan filly named Ridin' Easy, who won the Fashion Stakes at Aqueduct Racetrack and the Polly Drummond Stakes at Delaware Park. Firestone also bought yearlings overseas, acquiring a colt named

King's Company for 35,000 guineas who went on to win the 1971 Irish Two Thousand Guineas and was later syndicated for \$250,000 to stand at Gilltown Stud. According to a 1980 feature in The Blood-Horse, Firestone later bought Gilltown Stud from the Aga Khan and adjacent property to create a 1,200-acre farm in Ireland.

In 1973 he married Diana Johnson, granddaughter of Johnson & Johnson founder Robert Wood Johnson and also an accomplished equestrian with a lifelong passion for horses. Together they bought a 1,400-acre farm in Virginia they named Catoctin after a creek running through the

property. They also would

later own Big Sink Farm near Lexington.

Teamed up with trainer LeRoy Jolley, the Firestones found success at the highest level. A \$45,000 What a Pleasure colt they bought at Saratoga grew to be Honest Pleasure, a three-time grade 1 winner at 2 and the 1975 champion 2-year-old colt. At 3, Honest Pleasure won the Flamingo Stakes (G1), Florida Derby (G1), and Blue Grass Stakes (G1) and was second in the Kentucky Derby (G1). He went on to win the Travers Stakes (G1).

In 1980, the Firestones made racing history with their champion 3-year-old filly Genuine Risk, who became the second filly to win the Kentucky Derby (G1). She would go on to finish second in the Preakness Stakes (G1) and second in the Belmont Stakes (G1).

Through 2016, the Firestones campaigned 51 graded/group stakes winners, which included 17 grade/group 1 winners and five champions. Among their outstanding runners was Theatrical, a six-time grade 1 winner and 1987 Eclipse champion grass horse that put a promising young trainer named Bill Mott on the map.

"I had a private job with them for about five years, and I could not have been treated any better," said Mott. "They were the ones who got me to New York full-time. They gave me a huge opportunity, and they sent Theatrical to me. He did more for my career than any other single horse. He was my first champion and first Breeders' Cup winner. I'm forever grateful for those opportunities."

The Firestones' other champions included April Run, 1981 champion 3-year-old filly in France and 1982 U.S. champion grass mare; Blue Wind, 1981 champion

> 3-year-old filly in England and Ireland; Play It Safe, 1981 champion 2-yearold filly in France; and Paradise Creek, the 1994 champion grass horse who also was trained by Mott.

As breeders, the Firestones produced 11 graded/group winners since 1991, including nine-time graded stakes winner and four-time grade 1 winner Paradise Creek. Among the top runners they bred

are grade 1 winner Shinko Lovely, grade 1 winner Chief Honcho, and four-time grade 1 winner Winchester.

In addition to breeding and racing, Firestone at one time was a racetrack owner.

Firestone purchased the former Calder Race Course in June 1988 for a reported \$65 million. In 1989, Firestone bought Gulfstream Park from the Donn family under the name Catoctin International Racing Corp. He would sell the racetrack to the former Magna Entertainment Corp., which would later morph into The Stronach Group.

NO RULING YET IN BAFFERT, NYRA LAWSUIT

hearing for Bob Baffert's civil suit against the New York Racing Association was adjourned July 12 without Judge Carol Bagley Amon rendering a verdict in the Hall of Fame trainer's bid to overturn NYRA's temporary suspension that is blocking him from entering and racing horses at its three racetracks.

Judge Amon said she will take the testimony from attorneys on both sides of the lawsuit under advisement and issue a ruling later at an unspecified date. The hearing was held at the U.S. District Court Eastern District of New York courthouse in Brooklyn, N.Y.

In proceedings that lasted for about 90 minutes and with Baffert sitting alongside his attorneys in the Brooklyn courtroom, Amon heard testimony from W. Craig Robertson III representing Baffert and Henry Greenberg representing NYRA.

Robertson based much of his arguments on NYRA's failure to provide the two-time Triple Crown-winning trainer with due process through a hearing before its May 17 announcement of a temporary suspension blocking Baffert from entering and racing horses at Saratoga Race Course, Belmont Park, and Aqueduct Racetrack, and the irreparable harm the suspension has caused Baffert.

That suspension took effect a little more than a week after it was announced the Baffert-trained Medina Spirit failed a post-race drug test following his victory in the May 1 Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1).

"NYRA, without a scintilla of due process, suspended Mr. Baffert. That suspension is now at 56 days," Robertson said. "Even in Kentucky, the racing commission can only suspend him for 30 days. By suspending him without due process, they are acting as judge, jury, and executioner. They acted in a manner of fire, ready, aim. His constitutional right to due process was violated. NYRA is acting outside of its authority."

When Judge Amon asked Greenberg why NYRA did not conduct a hearing, he said Baffert could request a hearing following the Aug. 11 meeting of NYRA's board of directors when the length and terms of the suspension will be announced.

Greenberg added Baffert did not respond to the suspension until the following month, showing no urgency on the trainer's part, and that Baffert should have requested a hearing.


"He had to demand one?" Judge Amon asked.
Greenberg said NYRA had the power to suspend
Baffert and it acted quickly to fulfill its role of
"protecting the integrity of racing, the jockeys, and
the sport" given how Baffert had horses that failed a
drug test in the 2020 Longines Kentucky Oaks (G1),
the 2021 Kentucky Derby, and a total of five drug
violations in roughly a year. Greenberg said having
violations in races as prestigious as the Kentucky
Derby and Kentucky Oaks played a role in wanting
to make sure Baffert did not have a starter at NYRA
tracks and the June 5 Belmont Stakes Presented by
NYRA Bets (G1).

"NYRA has millions of fans it had to show that it cared," he said. "It is unconscionable the harm that was done to racing when (Baffert) smeared the Kentucky Derby and Kentucky Oaks and had five violations in the space of a year. Racing has the right to protect itself."

Judge Amon later asked, "Doesn't the public also have an interest in people's constitutional rights being violated?"

Greenberg pointed out how the Baffert-trained Gamine had been disqualified from third in the 2020 Kentucky Oaks, also after a drug test found 27 picograms per milliliter of betamethasone in her system. Medina Spirit had 21 picograms.

Robertson contended that betamethasone was in Medina Spirit's blood because of using a topical ointment to treat a skin disease, meaning it was betamethasone valerate and not the outlawed-on-raceday betamethasone acetate, which is injected into the horse. Because of that difference, Robertson expects that Medina Spirit and Baffert will be ultimately cleared by the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission.

Robertson also stressed the importance of being able to race in major New York stakes to Baffert's career.

"In sports, denying someone the opportunity to participate is doing irreparable harm. Opportunities lost cannot be retrieved," Robertson said. "Mr. Baffert has worked for 46 years to get to the point where he has clients who supply him with the best horses to run in the best races. If he cannot compete in those races, it harms his business."

When Judge Amon raised a question about the extent of the harm to Baffert's livelihood, and voiced skepticism about it destroying his career, Robertson talked about the importance owners place on running at Saratoga and the Triple Crown, which includes the Belmont Stakes, and how they will look for different trainers in order to race in those settings.

In regards to a question about which horses in Baffert's barn would run at Saratoga if the ban was lifted, Robertson listed just two with specific races: Illumination in the Aug. 7 Longines Test Stakes (G1) and Gamine in the Aug. 28 Ketel One Ballerina Stakes (G1). Robertson also mentioned Fenway, but did not specify which race the colt was targeting.

"This is like a lawyer who builds up a great practice and then gets barred from practicing in federal court," Robertson said. "He could still practice in state court, but he would miss out on the biggest and best cases. Harm would be done to him."

Greenberg downplayed the impact, saying Baffert averages just five starters a year at Saratoga and that 97% of his horses start in other states.

Neither Baffert nor the attorneys offered any comments after the hearing. BH





MOGER LANDS \$420K STILLETO BOY FROM COMFORT OF HOME

There was no tell when Steve Moger placed his highest bid for \$420,000 purchase Stilleto Boy July 12 at the Fasig-Tipton July Selected Horses of Racing Age Sale.

The Washington native struck from the comfort of home for the 3-year-old Shackleford gelding, who was the second highest-priced horse of the day at the Newtown Paddocks near Lexington.

"Super easy—I'm watching the horses in the ring, the bidding pops right up on the screen, and I click one button," Moger said.

Consigned by Paramount Sales as Hip 557, Stilleto Boy won the July 2 Iowa Derby in his last start for trainer Doug Anderson and a partnership that included the trainer along with breeders John and Iveta Kerber, Michael Coleman, and Aaron Kennedy. He was bred in Kentucky by the Kerbers out of the winning Marquetry mare Rosie's Ransom, and has a 2-2-2 record from seven starts and earnings of \$249,675. Rosie's Ransom is also dam of stakes winner Rosie My Rosie and stakes-placed Condo Closing.

"I just watched all of his races and liked the way he ran," said Moger, who owns a string of about 25 and campaigned 2015 Matriarch Stakes (G1T) winner Stormy Lucy. "I'm looking for some horse to send to Del Mar with my brother."

Ed Moger Jr., who trained Stormy Lucy, is the brother in question. Based in Northern California, he has been training since 1976 and his horses have earned more than \$33 million. He currently campaigns at both Northern and Southern California tracks, including Golden Gate Fields, Santa Anita Park, and Del Mar.

Moger purchased one other runner Monday, also a sophomore—the Super Saver gelding Conundrum. Consigned by Gainesway as Hip 621, the LNJ Foxwoods homebred made three starts for J. Reeve McGaughey earlier this year and came close to breaking his maiden in his last start April 27, a six-furlong test he missed by a neck at Indiana Grand. He is out of the Belong to

Me mare Mystery Trip, from the family of Weekend Surprise, the dam of A.P. Indy and Summer Squall.

Moger said he noticed Conundrum had drawn outside posts in his races and got bad trips each time.

Fasig-Tipton president and CEO Boyd Browning Jr. said it was no surprise to see a major bid come in via the online process, which Fasig-Tipton launched in 2020 as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We've seen the online bidding become fully integrated," he said. "It's part of the process. We used to do a lot of phone bidding and that has diminished. I think people feel like they have a little more control over the process, they've got an opportunity to participate. They get engaged, bidding online. But it's certainly here to stay. I think we'll see continued expansion in certain aspects of the marketplace.


"I think we'll have some activity here tomorrow at our yearling sale, but I think horses of racing age are probably a little more conductive to online bidding than yearlings, and mares are obviously more conductive. But it's a vital part; I think people have really gotten comfortable, and I think it's a service you're going to see as part of the normal culture for Thoroughbred auctions in America and probably around the world for the rest of our lives." BH



RETURN TO RACES SLATED FOR \$300K KATIERICH BUY JOSIE

Entered in the July 12 Fasig-Tipton July Selected Horses of Racing Age sale off a career-best performance in the July 3 Iowa Distaff Stakes, 4-year-old Josie is headed back to the races and could even return to trainer Brad Cox after selling to Katierich Farms for \$300,000.

The daughter of Race Day brought the third-highest price of Monday's sale, where she was consigned by ELiTE as Hip 501.

"(Katierich founder and owner) Larry Doyle is very excited," said George Barns, the farm's vice president of operations. "He's mulling over his options. I think he's thinking about sending her back to Brad Cox and seeing what he had planned for her. She just won the Iowa Distaff, so he's thinking about the rest of the races that would fit her conditions in the midwest. Maybe the (Aug. 15 RUNHAPPY) Groupie Doll (Stakes at Ellis Park), things of that nature.

"We think she'd be a very good fit in our breeding operation eventually but we're just excited about a mare of her potential and physical.

"We thought she might go from \$300,000-\$350,000, so we were happy with the price that she brought for a filly of her physical and accomplishments. We thought that was a great price, especially for the kind of mares we usually purchase."

The Iowa Distaff was Josie's first attempt at stakes company and the winning effort came one race after

capturing an allowance optional claiming race at Indiana Grand in late April.

"She's definitely got plenty of run in her," said Bradley Weisbord of ELiTE.
"She vetted really clean and she came off her best Ragozin, Beyer, and Thorograph numbers, so we expect to see her in the stakes this summer. She could even make the (Aug. 22) Summer Colony (Stakes) in Saratoga, but I'll leave it up to the trainer to find a spot for her."

With a 4-4-2 record from 14 starts for Steve Landers Racing and earnings of \$266,867, Josie was a \$170,000 purchase by BSW Bloodstock from Kings Equine's consignment to the 2019 Ocala Breeders' Sales March Sale of 2-Year-Olds in Training. She was purchased by Kings Equine in 2018 for \$80,000 from Four Star Sales' consignment to The July Sale, Fasig-Tipton's select yearling sale in Kentucky.

Spendthrift Farm bred the filly in Kentucky out of the stakes-winning Awesome Again mare Spirited Away. This is the dam of 2012 Tampa Bay Derby (G2) and Ohio Derby (G3) winner Prospective (by Malibu Moon), who also took the 2011 Grey Stakes (G3). Josie is also a half sister to two stakes-producing Malibu Moon daughters. They are Malibu Cove, dam of this year's Santa Ynez Stakes (G2) winner Kalypso, and Enhanced, dam of graded stakes-placed Herd Immunity. Josie's third dam is North Sider, the 1987 champion older mare. BH



BUCCI SECURES DEVILS SKY WITH SIGHTS ON SARATOGA

evils Sky, a 3-year-old Into Mischief colt with champion Classic Empire on his page, brought \$250,000 from Joseph Bucci, with Donato Lanni as agent, July 12 at the Fasig-Tipton July Selected Horses of Racing Age Sale. He was consigned by Four Star Sales, agent, as Hip 627.

Owned by Randy Bradshaw and trained by George Weaver ahead of Monday's sale, Devils Sky broke his maiden in a last-to-first effort in his most recent outing June 6 at Gulfstream Park. The bay colt was pushed out at the start when his inside rival broke out, raced in seventh under Edgard Zayas, then got up to win the 1 1/16-mile maiden race in 1:42.05 on firm turf.

Bradshaw previously purchased Devils Sky for \$135,000 out of Taylor Made Sales Agency's consignment to The July Sale, Fasig-Tipton's selected yearling sale in Kentucky, in 2019.

With a maiden win under his belt, the colt will be pointed toward the Saratoga Race Course meet with a trainer to be decided, Lanni said.

"The horse vetted fine and he's shown that he can run, certainly on the grass. I just bought him for a friend of mine, Joe Bucci, who wants to have a runner this summer, so he kind of fit that profile. He's going to go up to Saratoga," Lanni said.

Devils Sky was bred in Kentucky by Farm III Enterprises out of the Aldebaran mare Glorious Sky, also dam of grade 2-placed His Glory. His second dam is stakes winner, multiple grade 1-placed In Her Glory, granddam of 2016 champion 2-year-old male Classic Empire. BH

\$205K FEARLESS HEADED BACK TO PLETCHER FOR REPOLE

Grade 2 winner Fearless will head back to his own stall with trainer Todd Pletcher after running through the Fasig-Tipton July Selected Horses of Racing Age Sale, agent Jacob West said July 12 in Lexington.

The 5-year-old Ghostzapper gelding brought \$205,000 from West on behalf of Mike Repole's Repole Stable. He was consigned as Hip 642 by ELiTE, agent for China Horse Club and WinStar Farm.

"The horse will go back to Todd Pletcher at Saratoga Race Course, back into his program," West said. "Mike Repole and his family love action, and we thought he was an action horse to have some fun with down the road. We'll hope we can get him back to his winning ways and see how it goes."

Bred in Kentucky by Helen K. Groves Revocable Trust out of the Street Cry mare And Why Not, Fearless was a \$725,000 purchase by China Horse Club and WinStar's Maverick Racing division from Gainesway's consignment to the 2017 Keeneland September Yearling Sale. He was offered at this sale in 2020, but

went unsold on
a \$120,000 final
bid and went on
to race for China
Horse Club and
WinStar in 2021,
returning from
a layoff of eight
months to win the
Feb. 27 WinStar

"He was a real character as a young horse," WinStar president, CEO, and racing

manager Elliott Walden said after the Gulfstream Park Mile win. "He didn't want to train a whole lot. He was a big, heavy horse and gelding lightened him up.

"He's a really neat horse. He's very talented. It was a great job by Destin Heath (WinStar's farm trainer) and our team at WinStar to get him ready after a long time off and then Todd does what Todd does. They come out running for him and (Fearless) ran a super race."

In two following starts this year, Fearless was second in the April 17 Oaklawn Handicap (G2) at Oaklawn Park, and finished third last out in the May 14 Pimlico Special Match Series Stakes (G3) at Pimlico Race Course. His record stands at 4-2-1 from nine starts, with earnings of \$471,280. He is a half brother to the stakes winner Just Whistle.

"He's a 5-year-old gelding, and (WinStar and China Horse Club) like to buy stallion prospects, and this horse is not going to be a stallion prospect," said Bradley Weisbord of ELiTE. "But he's got grade 1 level form, grade 1 level numbers. He was off for a little bit of a layoff now, 6-7 weeks, but Todd Pletcher and Mike Repole will figure out a plan to get him back to the races. I wouldn't be surprised to see him in the Dubai World Cup (G1) or Saudi Cup next year." BH

Robert Slack grew up without electricity or running water on a small farm in Northern England.

"We didn't have a road to the farm, because we didn't have a car, so we were pretty poor. However, we did have two Thoroughbreds, so we had our priorities right," Slack said with a chuckle July 12, after purchasing the top-priced mare at the Fasig-Tipton July Breeding Stock Sale.

Slack went to \$225,000 to add Hip 448, the Cairo Prince filly Jeweled Princess, to a band of about 50 broodmares kept at his new Stoneriggs Farm near Paris, Ky. The mare consigned by Gainesway on behalf of Walking L Thoroughbreds was offered in foal to Gun Runner.

Jeweled Princess brought top price at the inaugural July Breeding Stock Sale, which preceded the July Selected Horses of Racing Age Sale at Fasig-Tipton's Newtown Paddocks near Lexington. Gross receipts for the sale totaled \$2,012,000, with 44 horses sold from 51 offered for an average of \$45,727 and a \$31,000 median.

"It was interesting, I guess I probably would

have missed the market a bit," said Fasig-Tipton president Boyd Browning Jr. "I was surprised with how some of the infoal mares sold and the broodmare prospects sold. Some of the mares with foals at their side didn't bring a little more money, but it's a significant commitment. We have seen that be an area of weakness in the marketplace whether that's November, January, or February. It's

still there even if you sell a foal at the side, because you have to carry that mare, you have to breed that mare. The caring costs are not cheap, it costs money to get from point A to point B.

"It happened late—there wasn't an enormous push for it," he added of the fledgling sale. "It's hard to push until you have some idea. When we

> encourage an owner or consignor, we have to believe. Every time you walk a horse through the ring, we take it personally. (Still), in the grand scheme of things it was encouraging."

As to whether Fasig-Tipton will continue to offer a breeding stock sale at this unique place on the calendar, the jury is still out, according to Browning.

"We will continue to have discussions internally and with our customers," he said.

The new sale certainly worked out for the connections of Jeweled Princess.

"It was a new idea of Fasig-Tipton's, a 'Do you think this would fly?' kind of scenario," Gainesway's Brian Graves said of offering the mare in July instead of in late autumn at the traditional breeding stock sales. "With the popularity of the horse, the way it was going, it's something that could work. I think if you have something of quality like that, it has a chance to go well, either in July or November."

Slack, who shopped the sale accompanied by Stoneriggs general manager Martin Keogh, said he thought the price was fair for Jeweled Princess, who was bred in Kentucky by Mary Reynolds out of the Scat Daddy mare Jersey Jules. Jeweled Princess won the listed She's All In Stakes at Remington Park in 2020 when trained by Kenny McPeek.

Stoneriggs bought one other horse at the sale, the Liam's Map filly War for Peace (Hip 426), offered in foal to Lord Nelson and a \$45,000 buy from Candy Meadows Sales, agent. Out of the black-type-placed winning Speightstown mare That Voodoo Youdo, War for Peace is a half sister to 2018 With Anticipation Stakes (G3T) winner Opry, a son of Declaration of War currently racing for Cheyenne Stables and Gaillardia Racing and trainer Todd Pletcher.

"I thought (Jeweled Princess) was the nicest mare in the sale," Slack said. "I told Martin here that I wanted to buy two gray mares out of the sale and fortunately we got them both. (War for Peace) was not quite as expensive, but you have to pay for good merchandise so it's all good, we're very happy. You can't steal good horses. Everyone sees them. And we thought she would have brought at least that. There was an opportunity today, while we're in the mood, let's do it.

"We're excited to have one in foal to Gun Runner because we never bred to him this year. We bred to a lot of other good horses but unfortunately we never got to him."

Slack, who made his fortune in the real estate business in South Florida and whose holdings in that arena bring in more than \$2 billion annually, is building the Stoneriggs band on 417 acres in Bourbon County on the corner of Spears Mill and Winchester Road.

"It used to be Kilflynn Farm, and before that it used to be part of Arthur Hancock's Stone Farm," Slack said. "When Arthur refers to 'the magic field,' that is the field right on the corner that we have.

"We have about 50 mares right now. I keep telling Martin every time we buy another one, 'Martin, you know what we call her? Job security.'

"I've been shopping in Kentucky for a long time but we've moved up a little in the world; we have a little more to spend these days. Mr. Martin Keogh here is my trusted representative, runs the farm out in Paris, and does an outstanding job, so we feel very comfortable with him taking care of all these wonderful mares."

The farm is a private commercial breeding operation, "and if we get one that doesn't sell for some reason, we'll race it," Slack said. "We do have about 8-10 at the track."

Stoneriggs is hoping to recoup some of their expenditure July 13 during The July Sale, Fasig-Tipton's selected yearling sale in Kentucky.

"We have a Mendelssohn filly we're pretty proud of that will sell tomorrow," Keogh said. "She's a very nice filly."

The dark bay or brown daughter of Mendelssohn is consigned by Machmer Hall Sales, agent, as Hip 15. She is the first foal out of the Mineshaft mare Doritza, from a family that goes back to Breeders' Cup Classic (G1) winner Volponi.

Colonial Creed Goes Full Circle for Partners

Doug Branam went to \$175,000 to buy out his partners on the second highest-priced mare of the day, the multiple graded stakes-placed Colonial Creed, a daughter of Jimmy Creed offered as a broodmare prospect. Consigned by South Point Sales Agency, Colonial Creed is out of the Scat Daddy mare Neverthesame, making her a half sister to 2016 Busher Stakes winner Mo d'Amour. It is also the family of Line of Duty, winner of the 2018 Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf (G1T).

Colonial Creed was third in the 2019 Summertime Oaks (G2) and 2021 Megahertz Stakes (G3T) when trained by Richard Baltas in California. Andre Lynch, agent, signed the ticket.

"It's come full circle," said South Point founder Mike Recio. "I had her as a yearling. David Meah put together a partnership of Richard Baltas, Doug Branam, and Jerry McClanahan. She went out to Rich and he has done a phenomenal job with her. She came up with a little injury so we decided to try this new sale.

"Andre signed the ticket on behalf of Doug and his son in law Pat. She's going to go home and be a part of Doug's broodmare band. They haven't said yet who they will breed her to but being from the Scat Daddy/Distorted

Humor line, there are a lot of things we can do with her. The family is getting better and better."

Too Much Prada to Elkstone Group

Stuart Grant's The Elkstone Group picked up the 8-year-old Too Much Bling mare Too Much Prada for \$150,000 Monday, and the March 17 Violence filly by her side—along with the mare being back in foal to the son of Medaglia d'Oro—sweetened the deal.

"What really led me to her was the (filly) by her side, a beautiful filly only three months old, just gorgeous," said Grant, who bought the mare for his farm in Maryland. "She has another Violence in the belly. We have a couple of shares to Violence. We are hoping she can keep producing these beautiful Violence foals, and we hope to send her back to Violence next year."

Consigned by Stuart Morris, agent, for the Far From Over/Fountain of Youth dispersal that inspired the creation of the July Breeding Stock Sale, Too Much Prada was bred in Texas by Hall's Family Trust out of the Authenticate mare Kimbell's Prada, and won black-type stakes at Retama Park and Sam Houston Race Park in 2015-16 while racing for her breeders and trainer Danele Durham.

Another mare in foal to Violence, Medea, was also purchased by Grant, who privately bought the 12-year-old Danehill Dancer daughter consigned by Indian Creek, agent, as Hip 402 for \$40,000. Medea won the 2014 Eatontown Stakes (G3T), has produced multiple stakes-placed Sunny Dale (by Medaglia d'Oro), and is from the family of multiple grade 1 winner High Yield.

Grant attended the sale in person and, while eyeing horses in the back ring, said he was happy to be in the thick of the action.

"It's great being back," he said. "We bought a couple horses of racing age at Keeneland a few months ago, we did that online. So it's nice to be here. Both for the sales and seeing the horse flesh, but it's also great to see everyone in the industry again." BH



The return of the Freshman Sire Showcase highlights the July 13 edition of The July Sale, Fasig-Tipton's sale of selected yearlings in Kentucky, as North America's yearling season kicks off at the Newtown Paddocks near Lexington.

Last seen in 2010, the Showcase puts yearlings on display by popular young stallions, including progeny by Accelerate, Always Dreaming, Army Mule, Awesome Slew, Bee Jersey, Bolt d'Oro, Bucchero, City of Light, Cloud Computing, Free Drop Billy, Funtastic, Girvin, Good Magic, Good Samaritan, Justify, McCraken, Mendelssohn, Mo Town, Mor Spirit, Ransom the Moon, Sharp Azteca, Tapwrit, and West Coast.

"I think it's a solid group, which was part of the impetus for bringing back the freshman sire showcase," said Fasig-Tipton president and CEO Boyd Browning Jr. "The market shifted back to where (freshman sires) came back en vogue. This is a really strong, deep group of sires. It is the perfect opportunity in 2021 to bring it back."

This is also the return of The July Sale to its usual spot on the calendar. Last year the sale was postponed and combined with The Saratoga Sale and the New York-bred Select Yearling Sale into the Selected Yearlings Showcase, held in Kentucky in September due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"You have to focus on conformation," he said. "We have a nice uniform set of horses here. Fasig-Tipton, once again, it's their hallmark; getting a good, homogenous group of good physicals, no bad surprises. I think they have done that, and in this market where you have some polarization and selectivity from the buyers' side, that always helps because a good physical always sells."

Taylor said he likes what he has seen from progeny of Good Magic and Bolt d'Oro so far. The former, a son of Curlin, stands at Hill 'n' Dale at Xalapa, while the latter, by Medaglia d'Oro, stands at Spendthrift Farm.

"When you look at (Good Magic's yearlings), they are prettier than a lot of that sire line, Smart Strike and Curlin. These horses have a little more eye appeal, and they maybe look like they could be a little earlier to me," he said.

"Bolt d'Oro, I have seen a few, and they look racy. They have a look about them; being scopey and two-turn-looking horses. They look like they could have some speed."

"As we get through September, we are going to see a lot more of the quantity, and you really start to get a profile of what that horse is throwing, but early results I think Bolt d'Oro and Good Magic are two that I like."

Meg Levy of Bluewater Sales always has an eye on freshman sires, and has found a standout in a daughter of City of Light, a son of Quality Road standing at Lane's End.



In her consignment of 14, a filly by City of Light out of Grand Sofia consigned as Hip 174 has been commanding attention from lookers and earned Levy's respect long before she arrived at the sales grounds.

"I love (Hip 174's) presence. She looks like a grade 1 filly coming into the paddock checking out the competition. She has her eyes on everything.

"I call it a dragster look—the hip is so much higher, and all that power is there. The City of Lights take after Quality Road, maybe a tad more refined; they have that great walk, move back and forth like an accordion, and are slinky. I love the way their backs are made—long neck, beautiful head.

"City of Light is probably one of my very top picks as a freshman sire; they are so consistent."

Levy also appreciates the entire package from progeny of American Freedom, a son of Pulpit standing at Airdrie Stud whose first 2-year-olds hit the track this year.

"American Freedom has done so well; he has had several winners already, and the 2-year-old people have done very well with them," she said. "They are very stout, well-made, and balanced. A lot of bone; it's hard to find good bone on horses anymore because we have bred for speed for so long. So when you see one that has the body, the bone, presence, head, and eye, they stick out."

Being a physically mature individual with a standout pedigree is just the beginning for Carrie Brogden of Machmer Hall.

"We have 16 horses here, and the biggest thing I try to convey to people is you can't bring a horse that

doesn't have a good mind, is not a good doer, is a stall walker, or is nervous," she said. "I think that is why there are so many good runners out of this sale; many of them we know from the farm and if they have the mentality to deal with it. They have to come in here in July of their yearling year and walk the walk. I can't bring any nervous or immature horse here.

Ultimately, I think that shows in

the race results of this sale."

WATCH: Sales Spotlight: Justify's First Yearlings

The atmosphere and grounds are buzzing with buyers looking for their next runner or pinhook prospect.

"I think we are going to have a very diverse buying group; we have seen lots of interest pre-sale from all segments of the buying bands," Browning said. "We are looking for mature, precocious individuals. I hope what we will have is deep support from professional buyers looking for athletic horses. I can look around the grounds already, and I see that there are some very savvy shoppers here, hard at work already.

"I think there is a sense of optimism surrounding the sales, and that's encouraging. The sense of optimism covers both buyers, sellers, sales companies. For all segments that are involved in the industry, there is a little bounce in their step. The interactions with people are generally positive, and there is some energy, excitement, and enthusiasm. It's a lot more fun to sell in that environment than the atmosphere we faced in 2020."

Levy agreed with Browning's assessment.

"I feel like there is some excitement at the sale," she said. "I have noticed it in the market; people want to get out and travel. They want to do what they did before. I am hoping that comes to fruition here; with this being a pinhook mecca with the physicals already chosen for you, I think this makes it a fertile ground for them to come to and buy horses in their range." BH

MALLORY'S BOUTIQUE CONSIGNMENT STANDS OUT AT JULY SALE

Cott Mallory, the owner of Mallory Farms, sat down with BloodHorse MarketWatch to discuss his farm, the upcoming yearling sales, and his thoughts on the market. A third-generation horseman in the Thoroughbred industry, Mallory has been running his farm off Royster Road in Lexington and selling at all the major yearling sales since 2009.

MarketWatch: Tell us about Mallory Farm; what all does it encompass?

Scott Mallory: We do everything boarding, breeding, foaling. We usually foal around 70 mares a year and breed about 115 mares a year. I sell about 60 yearlings a year between all the sales, I go up to Timonium, and last year I went down to the Ocala Breeders' Sale (for the first time). Between Fasig-Tipton July, Keeneland September, and Fasig-Tipton October, I usually sell around 50-60 yearlings.

MW: This year, at Fasig-Tipton's The July Sale, you have a select group of yearlings for offer. What stands out about your group?

SM: The Free Drop Billy filly out of Cedar Summer (Hip 5). They are big, have a lot of bone to them, going back to Union Rags. They usually have a lot of flash to them and are eye-catching. We are always excited to

> sell these freshman sires at Fasig-Tipton July, getting them out there and showing.

> A colt by Mor Spirit from the dam Palmilla Moon (Hip 62); he is a nice big colt, has a free-flow way of moving about him. I think he will be well accepted. I think the 2-year-old pinhookers will be after them, and they look early to me.

The Violence filly (Hip 113) out of Bold Union; (Violence) puts some size on them, comes from a deep mare with some high selling horses in the family. Violence, I mean, what can you say? He has turned into a solid sire, has 2-, 3-, and 4-year-olds out there right now doing it.

Bonita Mia's colt by Lord Nelson (Hip 114). The 2-year-old guys really like the Lord Nelsons. This colt has good size and a nice way of going about him. Having

Bueno Bueno win a maiden claimer on July 2 at Ellis Park to be Lord Nelson's first winner is an excellent update.

The Malibu Moon colt (Hip 141) out of Daring Kathy has done everything right. He is big and eyecatching. Malibu Moon's legacy will be around for a while.

MW: Every year, you sell some horses from Spendthrift Farm. What's the connection?

SM: I have always enjoyed supporting the new and older stallions at Spendthrift; they are a good farm to work with. The guys are very easy to deal with. They go above and beyond to solve any issues (as far as breeding

to their stallions). We have a good working relationship and are a good friend to have in the industry.

MW: What are your feelings on The July Sale?

SM: The July Sale is always challenging, trying to get my clients to put horses in the sale. It's the first sale of the year, and no one knows which way it's going to go. I believe, just like with any sale, if you take good horses, they sell well. The pinhook guys made some money this year, coming off a good June sale (at OBS), which helps. They bought some horses last year at a little bit of a discount due to COVID-19, I think. Most (pinhookers) I have talked to are excited about the yearling market. I think it will be a good atmosphere. Fasig-Tipton always does a good job putting on a sale.

MW: You sold graded stakes winner Suntracer at the 2015 Keeneland November Breeding Stock Sale and brought him home to Kentucky in 2020. How is he doing?

SM: He bred one mare this year. I didn't bring him up from Florida particularly to stand him; I brought him up to get him out of the situation he was in. We will see what happens with him, but he's living a good life right now.

MITCHELL: Suntracer Rescued and Returned to Kentucky

MW: As a consignor, what makes for a memorable sale?

SM: It doesn't have to be the most expensive horse. I have a mare, Miss Henny Penny, with a partner, and we have sold a few of her foals up in Timonium; she continuously keeps throwing winners. This year I will be taking her Tapwrit (yearling) colt to Timonium. Any time you can have one (do well) for the home team, it goes a little further. I like to keep my numbers small as a consignor; I

like the personal touch with the clients. Last year we sold three nice ones for Team Block; our history with them goes back 12 years. Any time you can do well for your longstanding clients, it's special.

MW: Thoughts moving forward for this year's sales? SM: A lot of the sales companies have implemented a lot of new things. I think everyone needs to give them a chance, see if it works. You can't please everybody; you have to be patient and keep an open mind as we move forward. Try new things out with the sales formats; see if they work before you condemn them completely. The market is changing, and it's an interesting time right now. BH

The practice of pinhooking is not for the faint of L heart. Successful pinhooking requires a wellhoned skill set that includes intuitive instincts, a keen ability to educate young horses, and a healthy dose of fortuitous timing. This is especially true when it comes to weanling-to-yearling pinhooks, which, unlike horses acquired as yearlings to be sold the following year as 2-year-olds in training, will not have the opportunity to demonstrate their athletic prowess on the racetrack for prospective buyers before going through the auction ring.

Taking that key factor into account, as well as the inherent risks involved in pinhooking, yearling prospects must meet a similar set of requirements as their race-ready juvenile counterparts when they are being evaluated by prospective buyers. Knowing that yearling-to-2-year-old pinhookers, as well as end-users, will be vying for top prospects, a greater emphasis is placed on pedigree, conformation, and maturity as sellers seek to maximize their pinhook investments for profit at the yearling sales while offering the type of horses that will appeal to both sets of buyers.

The July Sale, Fasig-Tipton's sale of selected yearlings to be held July 13 in Lexington, has attracted a slew of pinhooks, ranging in price from \$3,000 to well over six figures. Topping the list of the most expensive acquisitions slated to sell Tuesday is Hip 301, a Violence colt acquired for \$140,000 by Bill and Corinne Heiligbrodt out of the Bedouin Bloodstock consignment at last year's Keeneland November Breeding Stock Sale.

Consigned by Taylor Made Sales Agency, the chestnut colt, who was bred in Kentucky by SF Bloodstock, is produced from the winning Mutakddim

> mare Sumthingtotalkabt, making him a half brother to \$902,387 earner and multiple stakes winner Lady Shipman and multiple stakes-placed Just Talkin. This is also the family of Golden Pal (who is out of Lady Shipman), winner of last year's Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf Sprint (G2T), and the colt's second dam is multiple stakes winner Nannetta, the dam of stakes winner Rules of War and multiple grade 3-placed Nanogram.

"He is coming up to the sale great," said Mark Taylor of Taylor Made Sales Agency. "He actually reminds me a lot of Speightstown when he was a yearling, and we sold Speightstown. Every time I see him out there it just triggers me back to when Speightstown was a yearling. Speightstown was medium-sized, but everything fit, all the angles, and he was very well balanced. This horse just looks like he is going to be fast. He has a great body on him. He is really well balanced, and he has a big, loose, athletic walk.

"I love what the family is doing," Taylor continued.
"Lady Shipman was obviously a tremendous race mare and now she has Golden Pal going for her and he was a Breeders' Cup winner last year. Golden Pal is a very elite-level horse, and this colt is from the same family. They paid a fair price for him as a weanling, but I think with what's going on in the family and how this horse has come together, there is plenty of blue sky left."

Taylor Made Sales will also lead into the ring Hip 84, a dark bay or brown colt from the first crop of grade 1 winner Army Mule. The colt, bred in Ontario by Elevage II and St. Elias Stables, was previously purchased as a weanling by Castleton Stables for \$80,000 from the Hill 'n' Dale Sales Agency consignment at the 2020 Keeneland November sale.

Produced from the winning Unbridled's Song mare Stormy's Song, the colt's third dam is multiple grade 1-winning millionaire Lady Tak. This is also the family of grade 1 winner Volatile.

"The colt is a very cool horse," said Taylor. "I haven't seen a lot of the Army Mules yet, but I have been very impressed by this horse. I've been following him all spring—just looking at him once a month—and he keeps getting better and better. He is out of an Unbridled's Song mare, and I think you can see a lot of Unbridled's Song in this horse. He has a lot of scope, a lot of stretch. He is bay, but he looks like one of those good Unbridled's Songs to me.

"He has as a very nice pedigree down the page," Taylor added. "Lady Tak has really filled in over the last few years, and this horse is a top individual. We were thinking about taking him to Saratoga, but we decided to put him in this spot instead. Army Mule is a new sire and people are going to have to figure out what they are supposed to look like; this colt is a very good representative. Army Mule himself was such a brilliant racehorse. The talent was there.

I think if the Army Mules look like this one, then he is a horse to get excited about as we go further into the year and we see more of them."

As for what he anticipates in the market following a strong 2-year-olds in training sale season, Taylor offered, "I am optimistic. The backbone of this sale are the pinhookers. In recent years, since they brought the horses of racing age sale on board, you've seen a lot more trainer participation in the sale. There are more end-users here now. (The 2-year-olds in training market) was strong, and those guys should be in a lot better shape than they were last year, and I think that will help the sale.

"There's an appetite for people to get back into it and buy yearlings," Taylor added. "There is a lot of hunger for a horse in the market right now, and I think it's going to be good. If you have a marginal individual that doesn't really stack up, obviously those horses you're going to need to be realistic on or you are going to be taking it to a later sale or going racing. Horses that are well-placed and fit and can hold their own against this competition are going to do well."

Testament to the value of well-timed updates, the least expensive pinhook in the sale is Hip 10, a filly from the first crop of Ransom the Moon bought by Westbrook Stables for just \$3,000 at last year's

Keeneland November sale. Originally sold by her breeder, Calumet Farm, the filly is out of the grade 2 winner Dancing Afleet, by Afleet Alex, and will sell Tuesday in Carl McEntee's Ballysax Bloodstock consignment.

Since being acquired by her current connections last November, the filly's catalog page has received a significant dose of recent black type. Her half brother Bourbonic captured this year's Wood Memorial Stakes Presented by Resorts World Casino (G2) at Aqueduct Racetrack, vaulting the son of Bernardini into the starting gate for the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1). Still a maiden when Hip 10 went through the ring at Keeneland last year, Bourbonic has now amassed earnings of \$525,880.

The filly is also a half sister to multiple graded stakes-placed Avant Garde, by Tonalist. Avant Garde finished second to Fearless in this year's WinStar Gulfstream Park Mile Stakes (G2) at Gulfstream Park, was third in the Fred W. Hooper Stakes (G3), also at Gulfstream, and most recently finished third in the Godolphin Mile Sponsored by Mohammed Bin Rashid Al Maktoum City-District One (G2) at Meydan Racecourse.

"(The filly's dam) has had two graded stakes performers this year," said McEntee. "This filly did really well over the winter. She is a pretty, elegant filly with a really good step to her. I feel like she has been getting the attention she deserves, and I think the owner that bought her will be very pleased come mid-day tomorrow (Tuesday)."

Ballysax Bloodstock has another modestly-priced pinhook selling Tuesday in Hip 99, a dark bay or brown colt from the initial crop of Bucchero. The colt, bred in Florida by Curtis Mikkelsen and Patricia Horth, was bought by Jaime Centeno for \$5,500 at the Ocala Breeders' Sales Winter Mixed Sale this past January. The Sunshine State product is out of the Adios Charlie mare Adios Dawn and hails from the family of multiple stakes winner Cajun Delta Dawn, an earner of \$488,105, and stakes winner Mom'z Laugh.

"He is owned by a good friend of mine in Florida. He was a bit immature when he got him, but he has turned into a big, strong horse," said McEntee. "He has a great hip. He looks a little bit like his sire, he looks very fast. My friend who owns him is in Ocala and I have a fair feeling that this colt is going to be purchased and head back to Ocala."

While not a pinhook, McEntee is especially excited about the prospects of Hip 151, a colt by The Factor out of the winning Street Cry mare Even Song. The colt is a half brother to multiple graded stakes-placed Dream Shake, who was second in the Pat Day Mile Stakes Presented by LG&E and KU (G2) at Churchill Downs and third in both the Runhappy Santa Anita Derby (G1) and the San Felipe Stakes (G2) at Santa Anita Park. An earner of \$280,600 thus far in his career, Dream Shake was a \$75,000 purchase at the 2020 OBS Spring Sale of 2-Year-Olds in Training.

"Dream Shake has had a heck of a year and is running in the Oceanside Stakes (at Del Mar) on Friday," McEntee said. "This is a really nice colt. He

> is a May foal, but he is garnering so much attention. He has a heck of a walk, and he is a horse people should be watching out for."

McEntee, who launched Ballysax Bloodstock in 2018 after four years as director of sales and bloodstock for Darby Dan Farm, is bullish on the upcoming sale season.

"It's a very active sales arena right now," McEntee said. "The bounce back from the 2-year-old consignors getting \$200 million put back into the marketplace is obviously very beneficial. So, I think we're looking at very good sales coming forward no matter whether it's July, Saratoga, September (Keeneland), and even moving into November. I think everyone will have a good year. Everyone knows the importance and they all need to stay around and keep trading, keep doing business. I think this year will surprise a lot of people." BH

Fury Kapcori's death was first reported by the Paulick Report. Fernung said the son of Tiznow became sick about a month ago.



Produced from the Go for Gin mare Gin Running, Fury Kapcori was a full brother to grade 2 winner Tizfiz, dam of multiple grade 1 winner Tiz the Law.

He was bred in Kentucky by Diamond A Racing Corp. and purchased by Jerry Hollendorfer for



\$100,000 from the Taylor Made Sales Agency consignment to the 2011 Keeneland September Yearling Sale. Trained and co-owned by Hollendorfer, along with Rick Awtrey and George Todaro, Fury Kapcori raced from ages 2-5, collecting a 6-5-1 record and \$521,040 from 18 starts. He won the Precisionist Stakes (G₃), Santana Mile Stakes, and Charlie Palmer Futurity, and was second in the CashCall Futurity (G1) and Californian Stakes (G2). BH



NYRA ANNOUNCES AQUEDUCT FALL MEET STAKES SCHEDULE

The 2021 fall meet at Aqueduct Racetrack will include 26 total stakes, including 10 graded contests, across 18 days of racing from Nov. 5-Dec. 5, the New York Racing Association announced July 12.

Offering total stakes purses of \$4.9 million, the fall meet will be highlighted by a four graded-stakes card on Dec. 4, headlined by the \$750,000 Cigar Mile Handicap (G1) for 3-year-olds and up.

The stacked Cigar Mile undercard will also include the \$250,000 Remsen Stakes (G2) for juveniles going 1 1/8 miles with 10-4-2-1 qualifying points to the 2022 Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) on the line. Its counterpart for 2-year-old fillies, the \$250,000 Demoiselle Stakes (G2), will offer 10-4-2-1 points towards the 2022 Longines Kentucky Oaks (G1). Also on tap for the Dec. 4 card is the \$250,000 Go For Wand Handicap (G3) for fillies and mares 3 years old and up competing at one mile.

In 2020, during a season largely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Cigar Mile purse was cut

\$500,000 to \$250,000, while the fall meet's total stakes purses remained at about \$3.4 million. The 2021 fall meet not only sees a restoration of the Cigar Mile purse, but an increase of about \$1.5 million in total stakes purses.

The Big A fall meet stakes action begins on opening day, Nov. 5, with the \$150,000 Tempted Stakes for juvenile fillies going one mile and the \$100,000 Atlantic Beach Stakes for 2-year-olds at six furlongs on the turf. Opening weekend at the Big A continues Nov. 6 with the \$150,000 Turnback the Alarm Handicap (G3) for fillies and mares 3 and up at 1 1/8 miles and the \$100,000 Stewart Manor for juvenile fillies at six furlongs on the grass. The \$150,000 Nashua (G3) will bookend the opening weekend stakes offerings.

Following the \$150,000 Artie Schiller Stakes and \$150,000 Winter Memories stakes Nov. 13-14, the \$200,000 Red Smith Stakes (G2T) highlights a strong weekend on Nov. 20-21, which will include the \$100,000 Key Cents and \$100,000 Notebook stakes Nov. 21.

Thanksgiving weekend will offer 10 stakes over three days beginning Nov. 26 with the \$200,000 Comely Stakes (G3) for 3-year-old fillies at 1 1/8 miles, the \$150,000 Gio Ponti Stakes for sophomores at 1 1/16 miles on the turf, and the \$150,000 Forever Together Stakes for fillies and mares 3 and up at 1 1/16 miles on the grass.

Four stakes will be contested Nov. 21 including the \$400,000 Long Island (G3T) for fillies and mares 3 and up in a marathon 1 1/2 miles on the turf, the \$150,000 Aqueduct Turf Sprint Championship for 3-year-olds and up sprinting six furlongs, the \$150,000 Discovery Stakes (G3) for 3-year-olds at 1 1/8 miles on the main track, and the \$100,000 Central Park Stakes for juveniles at 1 1/16 miles on the turf.

Thanksgiving weekend racing at the Big A will close with three stakes Nov. 28, including the \$200,000 Fall Highweight Handicap (G3) for 3-years-olds and up at six furlongs, the \$150,000 Autumn Days Stakes for fillies and mares 3 and up at six furlongs on the turf, and the \$100,000 Tepin for juvenile fillies going 1 1/16 miles on the grass.

The Big A fall meet will conclude Dec. 5 with a pair of \$150,000 New York Stallion Stakes Series races going seven furlongs on the main track, with the Thunder Rumble for 3-year-olds and up and the Staten Island for fillies and mares 3 and up.

The Aqueduct winter meet will commence on Dec. 9, with seven stakes carded through the end of the calendar year. The first stakes of the winter meet will be the \$100,000 Garland of Roses Stakes for fillies and mares 3 and up at six furlongs Dec. 11.

The following Saturday will again showcase a pair of NYSSS contests with half-million dollar

purses for juveniles competing at seven furlongs, with the \$500,000 Great White Way for males and the Fifth Avenue for fillies.

The next day, Dec. 19, will offer the \$125,000 Queens County Stakes for 3-year-olds and up at 1 1/8 miles and the \$100,000 Gravesend Stakes for 3-years-old and up sprinting six furlongs in the final stakes action before a 10-day holiday break.

Live racing will resume Dec. 30 with the \$100,000 Bay Ridge Stakes for New York-bred fillies and mares 3 and up at 1 1/8 miles. New Year's Eve will feature the \$100,000 Alex M. Robb Stakesfor state-bred 3-years-old and up at 1 1/8 miles. BH

MAIDEN WATCH

DESERT RULER, WAR MACHINE BREAK MAIDENS

By Mary LaRue

This column highlights the performances of maidens who have made no more than five starts and who either sold for more than \$500,000 at public auction, have siblings that are grade/group winners, or have dams that are grade/group winners. BloodHorse research shows maiden winners in particular who meet these criteria are more likely to go on to be graded stakes winners.

Gulfstream

Daniel Pita's Desert Ruler scored a 1 1/4-length victory in his second start July 10, taking a 5 1/2-furlong maiden special weight for 2-year-olds at Gulfstream Park.

Trained by Pita and ridden by Cristian Torres, Desert Ruler raced in second as Akingisalwaysking ran through a first quarter-mile in :22.88 but soon held a head lead to post a half-mile time of :46.61. The Candy Ride colt sustained his momentum as the runner-up faded and opened a length lead in the stretch. Desert Ruler stopped the clock in 1:05.37 on a fast track.

Bred by Mrs. O. M. Patrick, Desert Ruler is out of the Rubiano mare Lavender Baby, who also produced grade 2-placed and grade 3 winner Baby J, as well as grade 1-placed Laureate Conductor, group 2-placed Gossamer Wings, stakes winner Lavender Chrissie, and stakes-placed Que Posse.

In his May 29 debut, Desert Ruler finished fourth in a five-furlong maiden race at Gulfstream.

Woodbine

The same day Mt. Brilliant Stable's War Machine also won his second start, taking a 7 1/2-furlong turf event for 3-year-olds and older at Woodbine by a nose for trainer Michael Stidham.

The War Front colt raced to the lead, but then allowed Ocelot to open a clear lead while he and jockey Gary Boulanger tracked the rival, who set fractions of :23.67 and :47.18 through a half-mile. War Machine moved up on the turn to engage the pacesetter and Small Talk, who rallied along the rail. War Machine fought through the stretch to win the head bob at the wire. The final time was 1:30.49 on firm turf.

Bred by Mt. Brilliant Farm and Ranch, War Machine was offered at the Keeneland September Yearling Sale but failed to meet his reserve on a final bid of \$575,000. War Machine is out of the Bluegrass Cat mare Ithinkisawapudycat, a half sister to champion Canadian 2-year-old filly Spring in the Air. Ithinkisawapudycat also produced Spinaway Stakes (G1) winner Sweet Loretta.

In his first start, War Machine finished eighth and last Oct. 18 at Keeneland as a 2-year-old and had not raced since.

Indiana and Ellis

Earlier in the week two other 3-year-olds with ties to graded stakes winners found their way to the winner's circle. On July 6 at Indiana Grand, Kingsport Farm's Sting Like Abby won her debut for trainer Ignacio Correas, taking a six-furlong maiden test for fillies and mares by 5 1/4-lengths.

Sting Like Abby is the second foal out of the Unbridled's Song mare Simply Sunny, whose first foal is group 3 winner Fore Left.

The other winner was Flaxman Holdings' Uyuni, who won her third start July 9 at Ellis Park for trainer Wesley Ward. After racing through the 1 1/16-mile maiden on turf for fillies and mares, Uyuni put her nose in front at the wire.

The Uncle Mo filly is out of the grade 3 winner Pachattack, who placed in three grade 1 races including when third in the 2011 Breeders' Cup Ladies Classic (G1). Pachattack also produced Irish group 3 winner Liquid Amber. BH



JRHA SELECT SALE YEARLING SESSION REACHES NEW HEIGHTS


The first lot of the day at the Japan Racing Horse Association Select Sale July 12 at Northern Horse Park—one of four yearlings offered from the final crop of Deep Impact—was the co-highest-priced lot of the yearling session.

Japan's super sire Deep Impact passed away in July 2019.

Yuji Hasegawa, who has been active at yearling and breeze-up sales in the United States in the last couple years, bought Hip 1, a colt, for ¥300 million (US\$2,702,703).

"We inspected all four yearlings by Deep Impact, and we are convinced this is the best one," Hiroyasu Takeuchi, bloodstock adviser to Hasegawa, said of the colt out of Go Maggie Go, who won Gulfstream Park Oaks (G2) and Black-Eyed Susan Stakes (G2) for Dale Romans in the U.S.

Hip 100, a colt by Lord Kanaloa out of Finest City—the 2016 champion female sprinter in the U.S. after winning the Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Sprint (G1)—was also bought for ¥300 million by Susumu Fujita, the leading buyer Monday who spent ¥1,541,000,000 (\$13,991,200) to buy 12 yearlings.

A total of 226 lots from 242 offered were bought for a cumulative of ¥11,638,000,000 (\$105,665,000), an 11.6% increase from 2020. The average price, ¥51,495,575 (\$467,544), was up 13.1% and the clearance rate improved from 92% in 2020 to 93.4% in 2021. The median was ¥35 million (\$317,776), up 12.9% from 2020.

Monday's gross sales, average price, median price, and clearance rate set new records for the yearling session of the JRHA Select Sale. BH

GROUP 1 WINNER ULYSSES REPRESENTED BY FIRST WINNER

Cheveley Park Stud's first-season sire Ulysses became the latest stallion to be represented by his first winner when the appropriately Niarchos family-owned and -bred Piz Badile struck at Killarney Racecourse for trainer Donnacha O'Brien July 12.

The 2-year-old is the first foal out of the listed-winning Elusive Quality mare That Which Is Not, another Flaxman Stables homebred, and from the family of the Vodafone Epsom Oaks (G1) heroine Light Shift, Tattersalls Gold Cup (G1) scorer Shiva, and the Niarchos' wonderful Lingerie.

Ulysses, a son of Galileo and Light Shift, proved a hugely talented performer on the track for trainer Sir Michael Stoute. A winner on his third start having run once at 2, Ulysses ran in the 2016 Investec Derby (G1), finishing unplaced behind Harzand, but flourished later on in the year with a win in the Beringice Gordon Stakes (G3) and a fourth in the Longines Breeders' Cup Turf (G1T).

As a 4-year-old, Ulysses scored the biggest victories of his career in the Coral-Eclipse Stakes (G1) and Juddmonte International (G1). He also finished second and third to Enable in the King George VI & Queen Elizabeth Stakes (G1) and Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe (G1) the same season.

The 8-year-old stands at Cheveley Park Stud in a partnership between the Niarchos family and the Newmarket operation.

Having stood the 2021 breeding season for a fee of £10,000, he has 87 first-crop juveniles to represent him this year.
