PAULINE'S PEARL CAPTURES HOUSTON LADIES CLASSIC

Trainer Steve Asmussen collected his third victory in the \$400,000 Houston Ladies Classic (G3) Jan. 30 at Sam Houston Race Park thanks to Stonestreet Stables' homebred Pauline's Pearl. The Hall of Famer now hopes the 4-year-old Tapit filly can use the victory as a launching pad to the top level.

The Houston Ladies Classic, run for the 10th time Sunday, was the season starter in 2019 for Asmussen-trained Midnight Bisou, who by that year's end wrapped up champion older dirt female honors. Asmussen won the 1 1/16-mile race again in 2020 with Lady Apple, the 2019 Longines Kentucky Oaks (G1) third-place finisher.

"That's extremely good company," Asmussen said. "This has been a very key race in the division. The mares that have won this the last several years have went on to have a big say in the important races for older mares

throughout the year and we expect that to be the same this year."

Just a year ago, Fausto Gutierrez-trained Letruska won the Houston Ladies Classic and is now expected to receive champion older dirt female honors for 2021 at the upcoming Eclipse Awards ceremony.

Joel Rosario was aboard Pauline's Pearl, the 3-5 favorite in the field of seven, and settled his mount mid-pack out of post 3. The Mary Rose broke fast from the outside and gunned for the lead, setting fractions of :23.60, :47.27, and 1:11.49 through six furlongs. Golden Curl was a length back from The Mary Rose throughout those splits, but was poised to take the lead turning for home as the pacesetter started to fade.



Pauline's Pearl was guided three wide on the far turn by Rosario, then easily powered to the front once in the straight. She put away Golden Curl then carried on to a 3 3/4-length victory.

The final time was 1:44.43 on the fast track. The winner paid \$3.20 for a \$2 win bet.

Golden Curl, another Stonestreet-bred, was second three-quarters of a length over rallying third-place finisher Audrey's Time. Becca's Rocket, The Mary Rose, Velvet Crush, and Champagne Affair completed the order of finish.

Pauline's Pearl improved her record to 4-3-2 from 11 starts and has earned \$968,500. Last year at 3 she captured the Fantasy Stakes (G3) at Oaklawn Park and closed out 2021 in November with a score in the Zia Park Oaks at Zia Park. "After her Zia Park Oaks win this was the target," Asmussen said after Sunday's race. "She has trained beautifully for it. Just an incredibly bred filly, a homebred of Stonestreet's. Just extremely proud of her victory today."

Asmussen said it would be "logical" to send Pauline's Pearl back to Oaklawn this year. That track's distaff series concludes with the April 23 Apple Blossom Handicap (G1), a race Midnight Bisou also won in 2019.

Bred in Kentucky, Pauline's Pearl is out of the Dixie Union mare Hot Dixie Chick, who was trained by Asmussen for Grace Stables (Barbara Banke, owner of Stonestreet), and won the 2009 Spinaway Stakes (G1). Hot Dixie Chick has also produced Union Jackson (Curlin), who was also a stakes winner at Sam Houston and now stands at Sequel Stallions New York. The mare's youngest foals are an unraced 3-year-old Curlin colt named Marsalis and a yearling Constitution colt. She was last reported bred to Quality Road for 2022. BH

LIFE IS GOOD TOPS VERY GOOD CROP OF 4-YEAR-OLDS

H istorical appraisals require at least several years for a proper analysis, but it's becoming more and more likely that in time the foal crop of 2018 may deserve special recognition.

Just like the foals of 2004, which included Curlin, Street Sense, Hard Spun, and the filly Rags to Riches who had a profound impact on the racetrack and breeding shed, the current crop of top 4-year-olds are proving to be highly special.

The retired Essential Quality was the 2-year-old male champion in 2020 and is likely to be the Eclipse Award winner as a 3-year-old. Yet if that voting took place Jan. 30, what happened a day earlier in the Pegasus World Cup Invitational Stakes Presented by 1/ST BET (G1) at Gulfstream Park, would have shifted the scales.

A scintillating and decisive 3 1/4-length victory

in the Pegasus over expected 2021 Horse of the Year and Longines World's Best Racehorse honoree Knicks Go surely pushed the 4-year-old Life Is Good into a position of leadership among his crop and status as the early favorite to emerge as 2022's best horse, especially with Knicks Go heading to the breeding shed.

"If they voted today, you would have to say Life Is Good would be 2022 Horse of the Year," said Brad Cox, trainer of both Pegasus runnerup Knicks Go and Essential Quality,

"but there's still 11 months left in the year and horses have to stay sound. That can be tough."

There are indeed many months and miles to go and given the quality of the 4-year-old crop and its new superstar, there should indeed be some highly exciting times ahead.

Much of the excitement will center on where Life Is Good pops up next, and that's likely to be in the Middle East at a yet to be determined locale.



Life Is Good wins the Pegasus World Cup Invitational Stakes at Gulfstream Park

Trainer Todd Pletcher said all options are on the table for the son of Into Mischief, pending how he recovers from his victory in 1:48.91 in the 1 1/8-mile Pegasus. While that could mean the \$20 million Saudi Cup (G1) on Feb. 26 may be in play, prior to the Pegasus Pletcher's conversations with the ownership group of WinStar Farm and China Horse Club centered on the turnaround for the Saudi Cup being a bit short.

The final flight for Saudi Cup horses is expected to leave the United States for Saudi Arabia Feb. 16.

If it's a no-go for the Saudi Cup then the March 26 \$12 million Dubai World Cup Sponsored by Emirates Airlines (G1) would be the likely choice.

"We'll watch the horse for a few days and huddle up and come up with a plan," said Pletcher, who reported Life Is Good came out of the Pegasus in good spirits Sunday.

The foreign races reflect the strength of the 4-year-old class as two of the main players for the

Saudi Cup are Hot Rod Charlie, who won last year's Pennsylvania Derby (G1) at 3 and was second in the Belmont Stakes Presented by NYRA Bets (G1), and Mandaloun, who was second in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) and was awarded the victory in the TVG.com Haskell Stakes (G1) when Hot Rod Charlie was disqualified for interference.

Then there's Flightline, a 4-year-old who has the kind of freakish early speed that makes him a worthy and exciting rival for the equally speedy Life Is Good.

The son of Tapit trained by John Sadler is 3-for-3 in his career and is targeting the March 5 San Carlos Stakes (G2) at Santa Anita Park. He was last seen romping by 11 1/2 lengths while capturing the sevenfurlong Runhappy Malibu Stakes (G1) in a blistering 1:21.37. Based on that performance alone, a Life Is Good vs. Flightline matchup is the race that most racing fans have atop their wish lists for 2022.

"I hope and I'm sure Life Is Good's people hope that at some point in the future Flightline and Life Is Good will be in the same starting gate," said Terry Finley, president and CEO of West Point Thoroughbreds, which owns Flightline in a partnership with Hronis Racing, Siena Farm, Summer Wind Equine, and Woodford Racing. "People will be talking about that race for generations to come."

Beyond Flightline, consider such 4-year-olds as multiple grade 1 winner Jackie's Warrior, the only horse to beat Life Is Good, Midnight Bourbon, and even Stilleto Boy, who was third in the Pegasus, and you have an outstanding group of active runners from a crop that also includes classic winners Essential Quality, Rombauer, who has also been retired, and Medina Spirit, who passed away in December. "It's a really strong group of horses," said Pletcher, who also trains the favorite for the champion 3-yearold filly crown, Malathaat, "and Life Is Good is a very special part of it."

Cox, who trains Mandaloun, says he's eager to face Life Is Good with Juddmonte Farms' grade 1 winner and sees a wide array talent among the 4-year-olds that are indeed some historical parallels.

"This could be a group like the Curlin, Hard Spun, Street Sense group, who were tremendous racehorses that made an impact on the breed," he said. "It takes a few years for that to develop but this seems like a good, very, very deep group and we were fortunate to have our hands on a few of them. It's an exceptional crop and a horse like Rombauer might have been a champion in a different year."

Time will, of course, tell, but given the quality, consistency, and durability of the leading members of the 2018 crop and the brilliance that Life Is Good has displayed in winning six of his seven career starts, history should be their friend in the years to come.

Even more importantly, with all of the court cases and negative publicity surrounding the sport, a year of phenomenal matchups on the racetrack would be manna from heaven.

"I think I can speak for everyone in the industry, after all we have been going through lately, we need a great year on the racetrack," Finley said.

With some luck, it just might happen. BH

FAMILIAR PATH MAY AWAIT COLONEL LIAM AFTER PEGASUS TURF

When trainer Todd Pletcher was asked how his Pegasus winner was doing a day later, he offered a doubly long answer.

Not only does Pletcher train Life Is Good, winner of the featured Pegasus World Cup Invitational Stakes Presented by 1/ST BET (G1) at Gulfstream Park, but also he handles that same duty for Colonel Liam, who prevailed in the Pegasus World Cup Turf Invitational Stakes Presented by Baccarat (G1T), giving the Hall of Famer a historic double.

Pletcher became the first trainer to win both races in the same year and he's the only trainer with wins in both races, regardless of the year.

"It was quite a day," Pletcher said Jan. 30 after his Pegasus double dip a day earlier.

Like Life Is Good, Colonel Liam exited his Pegasus win in fine shape. Talented enough to win last year's Pegasus Turf, the son of Liam's Map faced a number of

obstacles in posting his encore victory. Not only did he have to fend off 11 tough rivals, but the Pegasus Turf victory came in his first start since June 5.

"He's a great horse and to win a grade 1 off a 239-day layoff is a tribute to the kind of horse he is," Pletcher said.



Pletcher has yet to finalize plans for Robert and Lawana Low's son of the Bernardini mare Amazement, but said he might follow the same script as 2021 when Colonel Liam ran in and won the Muniz Memorial Classic Stakes (G2T) at Fair Grounds Race Course & Slots before finishing in a dead heat for the win in the Old Forester Bourbon Turf Classic Stakes (G1T) at Churchill Downs. Pletcher also mentioned the possibility of running once more at Gulfstream Park before running at Churchill Downs.

"We haven't firmed up a solid plan at the moment," Pletcher said about a 5-year-old bred by Phillips Racing Partnership. "We're just enjoying the moment."

Colonel Liam was purchased for \$1.2 million from the Wavertree Stables consignment at the 2019 Ocala Breeders' Sales Spring Sale of 2-Year-Olds in Training. He was originally a \$50,000 purchase by Waves Bloodstock from Darby Dan Farm's consignment at the 2018 Keeneland September Yearling Sale. With Saturday's win, his earnings stand at \$1,810,565.

Future Plans for Regal Glory Uncertain

Closing out a racing career with a win in a stakes worth nearly a half-million dollars is not a bad way to head to the breeding shed.

It can also be the incentive to continue a rather prosperous racing career.

In a nut shell, those are the options for owner Peter Brant and trainer Chad Brown as they contemplate plans for TAA Pegasus World Cup Filly and Mare Turf Invitational Stakes (G3T) winner Regal Glory.

The 6-year-old daughter of Animal Kingdom has a date with the stallion Into Mischief at some point in the future, but how soon is the question begging for an answer.

"She's had a great career and has got better every year. She doesn't owe us anything, but then again horses like her are hard to come by," Brown said. "She came into the race so sound and strong that we decided to wait and see how she runs before we make a decision about her future. In talking to Mr. Brant, we're not going to rule out running her again this year and he may breed her. We're going to give it a couple of weeks to come out of the race and let it sink in a little bit. My job is to provide Mr. Brant with all of the accurate information about how the horse is doing so he can weigh it and make the

decision that he wants."

Out of the More Than Ready mare Mary's Follies, Regal Glory was bred by the late Paul Pompa and started her racing career for Pompa and Brown in 2018. Following Pompa's death in 2020, she was bought by Brant for \$925,000 at the Keeneland January Horses of All Ages Sale out of the Lane's End consignment.

Winner of the Matriarch Stakes (G1T) prior to her Pegasus win, Regal Glory has won 10 of 17 starts with earnings of \$1,529,884.

A 4-5 favorite in the Pegasus Filly and Mare Turf,

Regal Glory's victory was not much of a surprise, nor was it a shock that the initial edition of the race was captured by Brown, who has the nation's deepest and most talented band of turf females.

"This race was a great addition," Brown said. "It was a needed race and is well-positioned on the calendar, especially for older horses because you don't miss anything in terms of breeding. For a late-blooming horse who you don't want to stop on during the winter, it's also a great option."

Knicks Go Retires After Runner-Up Finish

It may not have been the result Brad Cox wanted for Knicks Go's last race, but the Eclipse Award-winning trainer took great satisfaction in knowing the 6-year-old horse turned in a strong

"We were obviously up against it going into the far turn," Cox said. "When we were that far behind on the backstretch, I couldn't see how we were going to catch a horse as good as Life Is Good."

The Korea Racing Authority sent Knicks Go to Cox after the grade 1 winner at 2 was winless at 3. The son of the Outflanker mare Kosmo's Buddy won the

> **Big Ass Fans Breeders' Cup** Dirt Mile (G1) in 2020, and in 2021 he had five wins in seven starts with three grade 1 wins, including the Whitney Stakes (G1) and Longines Breeders' Cup Classic (G1). All told, it earned him 2021 Longines World's Best Racehorse honors and make him an odds-on choice to be named Horse of the Year and the champion older male dirt horse.

Bred by Angie Moore, he will head to Taylor Made Stallions with a record of 10 wins in 25 starts with glittering earnings of \$9,258,135. He was purchased by the Korea Racing Authority for \$87,000 from the Woods Edge Farm consignment at the 2017 Keeneland September sale. As a

effort while finishing second to Life Is Good in the Pegasus dirt race in his farewell performance.

"It was a good horse race," Cox said. "We had a good run with him. We're happy he's going out happy and healthy and sound and hope he can start his career at stud successfully."

Knicks Go, a Maryland-bred son of Paynter, was bidding for back-to-back Pegasus wins but was outrun for the early lead by Pegasus winner Life Is Good and could never catch up. He was $4 \frac{1}{2}$ lengths behind Life Is Good after six furlongs in 1:10.15 and at that point Cox knew it would take a miraculous rally to outsprint the frontrunner to the wire.

weanling at the 2016 Keeneland November Breeding Stock Sale with consignor Bill Reightler, he sold for \$40,000 to Northface Bloodstock.

"So many horses are retired early due to their value, so it was good for the sport for a horse to come back and run one more time like he did," Cox said. "I don't think the loss devalues him. That's narrow-minded thinking. He's a very good horse. I can't say it yet, but I'm sure he'll be Horse of the Year next week and there's no disgrace in getting beat by a very good horse like Life Is Good. It was a big, big run with him. We had a couple of great years with him." BH

ANOTHER MYSTERY, FANTASIOSO DEAD HEAT IN CONNALLY TURF

Lt was an exciting finish to a wide-open rendition of the Jan. 30 \$200,000 John B. Connally Turf Cup (G3T) as two hard-knocking veterans hit the wire together. After a nearly five-minute deliberation following the finish of the Connally, the Sam Houston Race Park stewards ruled that 6-year-old Another Mystery and 7-year-old Fantasioso were simply inseparable at the wire. Dead heat.

A full field of 12 lined up for the three-turn turf

test at Sam Houston, with Ajourneytofreedom, one of three contenders for trainer Mike Maker, going off as the slight favorite. As the gates opened, both Bloom Racing Stable and trainer Ignacio Correas' Fantasioso and Team Block's Another Mystery settled well off the pace in eighth, and 10th respectively behind early splits of :24.30 and :50.54. As the pacesetters crawled through six

furlongs in 1:15.48 and a mile in 1:41.18, Fantasioso, under jockey James Graham, began his assault on the leaders at the top of the stretch, with Another Mystery beginning to kick into high gear under Jareth Loveberry with a five-wide bid around the turn. Down the lane Fantasioso battled nose to nose with Strong Tide, finally putting that rival away late until Another Mystery, rallying furiously down the center of the track, caught that rival as they hit the line together.

"They went slow up front of us, which didn't help our cause but (Fantasioso) finished off the right way," said Graham after the race. "He felt that other horse coming and they dived at the wire together so can't be upset about it."

Another Mystery (\$23.60) and Fantasioso (\$10.80) ran the 1 1/2 miles on a firm turf course in 2:31.28.

"He was really grabbing the bit at the five-sixteenths pole and I knew we would have a good run turning for home," said Loveberry of Another Mystery. "I knew he had his head down at the right time I just didn't know if we had quite got (Fantasioso) or not but we did."

"As my dad would say, (Another Mystery) has been crying for three turns and we just needed the set-up to come into it," said trainer Chris Block. "He was training great coming into this thing and I

was confident he would run well."

Strong Tide was a head back in third while Ajourneytofreedom performed the best of the Maker trio, checking in sixth.

Fantasioso, bred in Argentina by Luther Eduardo Carlos, earned his first U.S. stakes victory in the Connally. A multiple graded stakes winner and grade-1 placed in his native country, he was sent to Correas' barn at Keeneland last year as a 6-year-old. He is by Strategic Prince and out of the winning Lucky Roberto mare Soy Maja.

Another Mystery is a Team Block Illinois-homebred son of Temple City out of the tough racemare Ioya Two (Lord At War), a graded stakes winner who was also campaigned by Team Block. The dam of nine winners from 10 foals to race, Ioya Two is now the dam of three graded stakes winners with Another Mystery's Connally score along with Ioya Bigtime (Dynaformer) and Amazing Results (Grand Slam).

Red Run Prevails in Texas Turf Mile

The 2021 leading first-crop sire Gun Runner has rewritten the history books with his cardinal flight of runners, eclipsing Uncle Mo's first-crop progeny earnings record set in 2015. The sire of six stakes winners on the dirt, the brilliant stallion now boasts a stakes winner on the turf after Red Run's late-rallying score in the \$200,000 Bob Bork Texas Turf Mile Stakes.

Red Run was actually his sire's first ever winner when he landed his debut last May as a 2-year-old at Churchill Downs. After three failed stakes attempts on both dirt and turf, the Winchell Thoroughbreds homebred finished a solid second after hopping at the start in a Nov. 27 allowance optional claimer going two turns on the dirt at Churchill.

Sent away at 5-1 in the field of 10 Sunday, Red Run raced near the back of the pack early under jockey Joel Rosario while favored Stolen Base trailed the field. After a first quarter in a spirited :22.99 set by Chanceux, Red Run steadily improved his position down the backstretch and launched a strong five-wide bid turning for home, Stolen Base hot on his heels. The Steve Asmussen trainee was closing faster than the favorite, however, and collared a game Bloodline strides before the wire.

Red Run (\$12.80) prevailed by a half-length over Bloodline, who was 1 1/4 lengths ahead of Stolen Base. He raced the one mile on a firm turf course in 1:37.75.

"Bob Bork opened Sam Houston, the first parimutuel racetrack in Texas, and we started running here regularly 20 something years ago," said Asmussen. "(Bork) was very instrumental in getting it up and going. Sam Houston has always been so good to us and it's very special to win this race.

"(Red Run) was Gun Runner's first winner. We kind of got in a hurry with him (as a 2-year-old). He's a nice colt with beautiful action. I think he's just developing the right way and he has a very good future."

Red Run is the first foal out of the Tapit mare Red House, herself a full sister to champion 3-year-old filly and Longines Breeders' Cup Distaff (G1) heroine Untapable and a half sister to grade 1 winner Paddy O'Prado. Red House has an unnamed juvenile full brother to Red Run. BH

FRIAR'S ROAD MAKES THE GRADE IN SAN MARCOS

M r. and Mrs. William Warren Jr.'s Friar's Road has shown a liking for the Southern California turf, capping 2021 off with three graded stakes placings. The 5-year-old son of Quality Road had his breakthrough moment Jan. 30 at Santa Anita Park, flying down the stretch under Flavien Prat to a clear victory in the \$225,000 San Marcos Stakes (G2T).

"We think he's been quite a horse," William Warren Jr. said. "He's fun to watch with that real kick he has in the stretch. We brought two other couples from Tulsa to come watch and it's a great pleasure to see such a masterful ride from Flavien Prat, he had him in position the whole way."

Friar's Road bested several familiar rivals in the San Marcos. In October he earned his first graded placing when third in the John Henry Turf Championship (G2T), beat two noses by United and comebacking Acclimate. The next month he was third in the Hollywood Turf Cup (G2T) to Say the Word, also in the San Marcos, and Acclimate. He ended 2021 second a nose behind fellow San Marcos runner Bob and Jackie in the San Gabriel Stakes (G3T).

In Sunday's 1 1/4-mile turf affair, Prat settled

Friar's Road in third several lengths off the pace of Acclimate and Bob and Jackie. Acclimate showed the wav with fractions of :22.69, :46.60, and 1:11.09 through three-quarters of a mile, with Bob and Jackie pressing him to his outside. Bob and Jackie got his head in front to post a mile in 1:34.98, at which point Friar's Road

still had three lengths to make up. But once set down for the drive, Friar's Road sped past the frontrunners and on to a 4 1/4-length win.

The final time was 1:58.67 on firm turf. Michael McCarthy-trained Friar's Road, the even-money favorite, returned \$4.20 on a \$2 win bet.

"I had been on him a few times in the morning and I was really happy with the way he was training," Prat said. "He was doing well coming into this race and he broke well and got me into the race. There was a strong pace today and he was there for me when it was time to make a move. The pace was key today. He's a big horse with a long stride and you don't want to take too much hold of him."

Bob and Jackie held on for second by a head over Say the Word. Lincoln Hawk and Acclimate completed the order of finish. Dicey Mo Chara was scratched.

Friar's Road's record now stands at 3-4-2 from 13 starts and his earnings increased to \$346,500.

"It was fantastic, a great way to end the weekend," McCarthy said.

Friar's Road was bred in Kentucky by Robert and Lawana Low. He is out of the Giant's Causeway mare My Sugar Bear, whose four foals to race are all winners and include stakes-placed Vevina (More Than Ready). My Sugar Bear also has a 2-year-old Malibu Moon colt and was bred to More Than Ready for 2022.

Mike Ryan, agent, purchased Friar's Road for \$500,000 out of Taylor Made Sales Agency's consignment to the 2018 Keeneland September Yearling Sale. BH

EMMANUEL REMAINS A PERFECT 2-FOR-2 AFTER TAMPA WIN

TinStar Farm and Siena Farm's Emmanuel ran to his lofty 1-5 odds Jan. 30 at Tampa Bay Downs, cruising to the wire a fashionable winner of a one-mileand-40-yard allowance optional claiming contest to remain undefeated in two starts.

Emmanuel dictated the pace from the three path, cruising through easy fractions of :25.03 and :49.88 before kicking away from his opposition around the final turn. The Mark Casse-trained Glider put up a fair fight from the inside but Emmanuel was simply too much in the final final furlong, spurting clear by $4 \frac{1}{2}$ lengths at the wire.

The Todd Pletcher trainee was ridden by jockey Pablo Morales and was timed in 1:40.24 on a fast main track.

"Just a class horse. I felt like I had so many gears underneath me," Morales said after the race. "Every time I would just move a hair, (Emmanuel) would take off a little bit more and just do it easily. He felt (Glider) coming on the inside down the lane, so I decided to give him a little bit of a hand ride and I could feel him extending more and more.

"He just did it easy—it felt like a workout for him. He acts like an older horse who has run 100 times and he gives you what you ask out of him. I'm thankful I was considered to ride him. It was a pleasure."

The 3-year-old son of More Than Ready had been previously entered Jan. 7 at Tampa Bay Downs but

was scratched after spiking a fever. He returned to the work tab about a week later and clocked two bullet works in succession at Palm Beach Downs in preparation for his effort Sunday.

In last week's second pool of the Kentucky Derby Future Wager, Emmanuel closed at 17-1 odds off his dazzling debut victory Dec. 11 at Gulfstream Park.

"I'm very pleased with the way he handled the two turns," Pletcher said via text message to the Tampa Bay Downs media team. "We will keep all options open for his next start."

Pletcher added that the Feb. 12 Sam F. Davis Stakes (G3) would be too soon to bring him back, but Tampa Bay Downs racing office officials will be working overtime to land him for the March 12 Lambholm South Tampa Bay Derby (G2).

Bred by Helen K. Groves Revocable Trust, Emmanuel was sold to Maverick Racing, the buying arm of WinStar, for \$350,000 at the 2020 Keeneland September Yearling Sale from the Gainesway consignment. His dam, the Hard Spun mare Hard Cloth, is a half sister to group/grade 1 winners Hawkbill and Free Drop Billy. BH

"I think John Sadler said it best: a horse like this gets you up and out of bed quickly every morning."

NEWGRANGE EXITS SOUTHWEST WELL; BARBER ROAD EYES DERBY

Though it was the Bob Baffert-trained Newgrange who came out on top in the Jan. 29 Southwest Stakes (G3) at Oaklawn Park, it is runner-up Barber Road who collected the most qualifying points from the race toward a spot in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1).

"Aiming for the Kentucky Derby now," John Ortiz, who trains Barber Road for WSS Racing, said in a text message to Oaklawn media Sunday. "The dream is finally feeling very realistically possible. So, the next step would be the Rebel (G2). Thoughts about going to Dubai have been put on the table as well, but most likely we'd love to stay home and run over the track he is loving right now."

Barber Road, by Race Day, collected four points for his runner-up finish Saturday and now has eight overall to rank 13th on the Road to the Kentucky Derby leaderboard. The Kentucky Derby is limited to 20 starters, with starting preference based on horses with highest point totals accumulated in qualifying races.

Although the Southwest offered 17 points (10-4-2-1, respectively) to the top four finishers, Newgrange was running for purse money only because of Baffert's suspension from Churchill Downs. The suspension followed 2021 Kentucky Derby (G1) winner Medina Spirit's positive postrace test showing betamethasone, a corticosteroid prohibited on race day in Kentucky. A ruling has yet to be issued by Kentucky stewards, but a hearing is scheduled for Feb. 7. Baffert trainees are ineligible to collect Kentucky Derby qualifying points due to the suspension.

"I'm not going to worry about that right now," Baffert said in a phone interview with Oaklawn media moments after the Southwest.

In a text message Sunday morning, Baffert said Newgrange emerged in "great" shape physically from his Southwest victory and would be flown back to his Southern California base Tuesday.

Newgrange and grade 3 winners Rockefeller and Messier were Baffert's three nominees to the Southwest, which is Oaklawn's second of four Kentucky Derby points races.

Newgrange and Messier worked against each other in a half-mile drill Jan. 23 at Santa Anita Park. Both horses were credited with :47 1/5, which ranked second of 114 times published at the distance.

Baffert, subsequently, opted to keep Messier home for the Feb. 6 Robert B. Lewis Stakes (G3) and send Newgrange to Oaklawn for the Southwest. The colt arrived Wednesday—a day later than originally scheduled—following a flight from Southern California.

"I thought this horse kind of had a good mind," Baffert said. "The ship in there is a little bit tougher now. You've got to go to Memphis (about 190 miles northeast of Hot Springs, Ark., where Oaklawn is) and get them a van. I thought Newgrange's got a great mind and Messier's going to run here in the Bob Lewis with some other ones. Try to spread them out, try to see where they fit. So, that was the reason."

Also under consideration for the Lewis is Doug O'Neill-trained debut winner Happy Jack, while stablemate and Los Alamitos Futurity winner Slow Down Andy is being considered for an an out-of-town stakes.

Newgrange stalked the pace in third in the Southwest. Jockey John Velazquez took the colt four wide before continuing on to a 1 1/2-length win over Barber Road, who was rallying from 11th under Ricardo Santana Jr.


"I think he needed it (in the Southwest)," Baffert said of Newgrange. "He had to really gut it out. Turning for home, I wasn't sure. Then, he came on. I thought it was a good spot for him and, hopefully, he just continues on. He showed (Saturday) he's a pretty solid horse. I always try to bring my best horses up there that are doing the best."

Baffert said next-race plans are pending for Newgrange, a son of Violence owned by SF Racing, Starlight Racing, Madaket Stables, Robert Masterson, Stonestreet Stables, Jay Schoenfarber, Waves Edge Capital, Catherine Donovan, Golconda Stable, and Siena Farm.

Oaklawn's Kentucky Derby prep series continues with the Rebel Stakes at 1 1/16 miles Feb. 26 and the Arkansas Derby (G1) at 1 1/8 miles April 2. Baffert has won the Rebel a record eight times.

"We'll definitely have something for the Rebel," Baffert said. "I just don't know which one."

The Rebel will offer 85 total points (50-20-10-5) to the top four finishers. The Arkansas Derby is a 170-point race (100-40-20-10). BH

COURVOISIER LEADS JEROME RUNNERS EYEING WITHERS RETURN

Hill 'n' Dale Equine Holdings and James Spry's Courvoisier worked five-eighths of a mile in 1:02.41 Jan. 28 over the Belmont Park dirt training track in preparation for the Feb. 5 \$250,000 Withers Stakes (G3). The 1 1/8-mile test offers qualifying points on a 10-4-2-1 scale toward the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1).

"He's doing well," trainer Kelly Breen said. "He breezed Friday by himself. It was a maintenance workout and he's good to go."

The regally-bred Tapit chestnut is out of 2014 champion 2-year-old filly Take Charge Brandi, who is a half sister to multiple grade 1 winner Omaha Beach. Courvoisier graduated at fourth asking traveling nine furlongs Dec. 2 at the Big A ahead of a 1 1/4-length score in the one-turn mile Jerome Stakes contested over a sloppy and sealed main track New Year's Day. He garnering 10 Road to the Kentucky Derby points for his Jerome win.

Breen said he is taking a cautiously optimistic approach on contesting the Kentucky Derby.

"We nominated him, but one race at a time," Breen said.

Breen said a decision on a jockey for Courvoisier will be made in the next few days.

Trainer Michael Trombetta said he is eyeing a return to New York for R. Larry Johnson homebred Mr Jefferson in Saturday's Withers.

The Maryland-bred Constitution chestnut shipped to Aqueduct for his last two starts, finishing a distant fourth in the nine-furlong Remsen Stakes (G2) Dec. 4 ahead of a sixth-place finish in the Jerome.

A two-time winner, Mr Jefferson broke his maiden going six furlongs in August at Colonial Downs two starts before defeating allowance optional claiming company at 1 1/16 miles in November at Laurel Park.

Trombetta said Mr Jefferson will benefit from the stretch out in distance.

"More than likely, I'll send Mr Jefferson up. The two turns definitely help him," Trombetta said. "The first time I brought him up, I thought he ran well. The last time I don't think he liked the track very much. That might have had something to do with the sub-par performance."

Mr Jefferson was initially breezing over the synthetic surface at Fair Hill Training Center in Maryland, but has posted his last two works over the main track at Laurel. He went an easy half-mile in 50:80 Jan. 30.

Edward Potash, Brad Yankanich, and trainer Jim Ryerson's Unbridled Bomber returned to work Jan.25 in his second breeze since a fourth-place finish in the Jerome.

A dark bay son of Upstart, Unbridled Bomber breezed a bullet five-eighths in 1:00 3/5 over Belmont Park's dirt training track, giving his connections the green light to point to the Withers.

"We're headed to the Withers next and we're happy with how he's doing. We're happy with how he ran last time and with his last couple races," Ryerson said. "We'll see if he can stretch out and handle the ground."

Unbridled Bomber finished eighth on debut in July at Saratoga Race Course sprinting 5 1/2 furlongs before stretching out to nine furlongs and then back

to one mile to break his maiden at fourth asking Nov. 7 at Belmont.

Unbridled Bomber stuck to a one-turn mile in the Jerome next out and was held off the pace in seventh by regular rider Dylan Davis through the first quarter-mile after breaking a step slow. Swung three-wide in the turn, the he seemed ready to unleash a bid for the lead but

never kicked away and lost show honors to favored Cooke Creek by three-quarters of a length.

"As the way the day went, speed was so dominant over that track," said Ryerson. "We really couldn't have put him into the pace and so we just had to see how it would go (from off the pace). I thought he ran very well."

Ryerson also noted that Miss Marissa, winner of the 2021 Delaware Handicap (G2) and 2020 George E. Mitchell Black-Eyed Susan Stakes (G2) for Cammarota Racing, has been privately sold by her owners to Japanese interests. **BH**

Joseph said Drain the Clock is one of three horses, along with grade 1-placed stakes winner Ny Traffic and Three Chimneys Farm and e Five Racing Thoroughbreds' stakes-placed Collaborate, under consideration for the April 9 \$300,000 Carter Handicap (G1) going seven furlongs at Aqueduct.

Both Drain the Clock and Ny Traffic could also point to races on the Dubai World Cup Sponsored by Emirates Airline (G1) undercard March 26 with the six-furlong Dubai Golden Shaheen (G1) and Godolphin Mile (G2) possible.

"Drain the Clock is doing well," Joseph said. "He'll run in the Gulfstream Sprint in February and then he might go to Dubai. It's between the Carter and Dubai, but we hope to bring someone up for the Carter—either Ny Traffic or Collaborate."

Drain the Clock returned Dec. 10 at Gulfstream after more than a three-month layoff for a gritty, front-running allowance optional claiming score at six furlongs.

John Fanelli, Cash is King, LC Racing, Paul Braverman, and Team Hanley's New York-bred Ny Traffic is likely to make his next start in the March 5 \$200,000 WinStar Gulfstream Park Mile Stakes (G2). The 5-year-old son of Cross Traffic bested fellow state-breds last out in the Hudson Handicap contested over a sloppy and sealed main track Oct. 30 at Belmont Park.

The versatile gray was a game second around two

turns in the nine-furlong 2020 TVG.com Haskell Stakes (G2), but Joseph said he would like to focus on one-turn events this season.

"He seems to be best cut back to one turn," Joseph said of Ny Traffic, who had to miss the Cigar Mile (G1) in December at the Big A after an illness. "He fought off the bug he had and he's probably going to go to the Gulfstream

Mile in March. He's been working well."

Joseph nominated both A.P.'s Secret and Eldon's Prince to the Feb. 5 Withers Stakes (G3) but said both are unlikely to make the journey with A. P.'s Secret under consideration for the Feb. 19 Risen Star Stakes Presented by Lamarque Ford (G2) at Fair Grounds Race Course & Slots.

"I might look at the Risen Star for one (A.P.'s Secret) and Eldon's Prince is going to stay on the grass for now," Joseph said. BH

Loves Only You is out of the unraced Storm Cat mare Loves Only Me, who was bred by the Niarchos Family and bought by Northern Farm's Katsumi Yoshida for \$900,000 from Lane's End, agent, at the 2009 Keeneland November Breeding Stock Sale. She's a full sister to 2016 Dubai Turf Sponsored by DP World (G1) winner Real Steel, who has been standing at Shadai Stallion Station since 2019.

Loves Only You was offered at the yearling session of the 2017 Japan Racing Horse Association Select Sale and bought by Tokyo-based syndicate DMM Dream Club for \$160 million (US\$1,404,800).

Trained by Yoshito Yahagi, she won eight of 16 starts, including the 2019 Yushun Himba (Japanese Oaks, G1), and last year the FWD Queen Elizabeth II Cup (G1) and Longines Hong Kong Cup (G1), as well as the Filly & Mare Turf.

"While mating plans are not finalized yet, Epiphaneia, sire of Efforia, (Japan Racing Association) Horse of the Year in 2021, is the leading candidate," Takumi Nomoto, DMM Dream Club president, commented during the ceremony. BH

ROMANTIC WARRIOR WINS FIRST LEG OF HK DERBY SERIES

) omantic Warrior took a big step toward potential **N**stardom with a rallying victory Jan. 30 in the Hong Kong Classic Mile at Sha Tin Racecourse-the first leg of the series that leads to the BMW Hong Kong Derby.

It was a textbook effort by jockey Karis Teetan and the 4-year-old son of Acclamation.

Breaking from the inside post in a field of 14, Romantic Warrior skimmed the rail, well positioned but well back of the early speed, as he raced down the riverside backstretch. Turning into the straight, Teetan was boxed behind pacesetter California Spangle, with

traffic to his outside.

Once he found a narrow opening midway down the lane, Romantic Warrior kicked into gear, eased outside California Spangle, and ran on to win more convincingly than the half-length margin would indicate. The Irishman was third as the 3-1 favorite in a wide-open field, Packing Victory, faded to get home last.

"He's a lovely horse,"

Teetan said. "He's actually a really nice horse. He had the draw and I think it helped him. I just wanted to follow California Spangle and I knew he would take me into the race. But when this horse got the clear run, he really let down and I think he's got a very bright future.

"Man, the last 100 meters, when he got a clear run, he gave me a really good feel."

Romantic Warrior completed the distance in 1:33.80 on good turf.

Trainer Danny Shum said he will consult with owner Peter Lau but the second leg of the 4-year-old Classic Series, the Feb. 27 Hong Kong Classic Cup at 1,800 meters (about 1 1/8 miles), is the next logical target. Success there would open the door to a run in the March 20 Hong Kong Derby-the race that's No. 1 on the "to do" list of local owners.

\$1M PINK BONUS TO BE OFFERED BY INGLIS RACE SERIES

Inglis will significantly ramp up its pitch to female racehorse owners as well as boost prize money for its already lucrative sales-restricted races in a sign it is actively engaging its Australian auction house rival Magic Millions in an apparent incentive scheme arms race.

Inglis has announced a massive overhaul to the prize money structure for five of the company's signature sales-restricted races—headlined by the introduction of an AU\$1 million 'Pink Bonus' targeting horses majority-owned by women—in a move which further demonstrates the fierce competitiveness of the Australian bloodstock market.

Under the revamp, an additional AU\$1.55 million will be up for grabs for horses who are entered in the Inglis Race Series from the beginning of next season, taking the prize money pool for 2022 graduates to AU\$7.55 million.

The Pink Bonus is similar to the highly successful AU\$500,000 Magic Millions women's bonus for its 2-Year-Old Classic and the AU\$250,000 purse for its 3-Year-Old Guineas races, but instead of the money being split between the owners of multiple horses, it will be a 'winner takes all' scenario for the Inglis initiative.

From the 2022-23 racing season, a Pink Bonus of AU\$400,000 will be awarded to the first eligible horse home in the Inglis Millennium and AU\$200,000 in the Inglis Sprint, the Inglis Banner, and the Inglis Nursery.

A horse must be at least 75% owned by women to be eligible for the Pink Bonus and the changes will come into effect for horses born in 2020 that are purchased through an Inglis auction, starting with next weekend's Classic Yearling Sale.

Inglis Bloodstock chief executive Sebastian Hutch on Jan. 30 made no secret of the fact female owners had become a major segment of buyers in the yearling market, and he praised Magic Millions for its own "fantastic initiative and one that we've admired."

"We have taken a patient approach in assessing what we feel would be the most effective step and, clearly, particularly through the pandemic, it has been evident that the volume of people interested in participating in racing is growing," Hutch told ANZ Bloodstock News.

"Certainly the fact that the show (racing) has stayed on the road during the pandemic and now we have wall-to-wall free-to-air coverage of racing has been very positive features in achieving that, and the female ownership base is an important part of that.

"Twelve of the runners in the Millennium in 2021 had female owners involved and I think that's indicative of a developing ownership base amongst the female population and that is something we want to try and embrace, consolidate, and grow."

As well as the introduction of the Pink Bonus, the auction house has also returned the prize money purses to pre-pandemic levels for the Flemington-run Inglis Sprint, the Inglis Banner at Moonee Valley, and the Inglis Nursery, held at Randwick.

The Inglis Bracelet, which was run for the second time at Flemington on VRC Oaks day last November, will also have its prize money increased from AU\$250,000 to AU\$350,000.

The fourth running of the Millennium, for which Arrowfield Breeders' Plate (G3) and Inglis Rural Property Golden Gift winner Sejardan is the favorite, will take place at Randwick on Saturday.

"We like the fact that the opportunities are spread right throughout the year, at a variety of different tracks, and that appeals to people," Hutch said of the Inglis Race Series.

"The feedback that we get is that it is an important part of our race series and that it'll be something that we will be looking to maintain and further develop as time goes by."

The changes to the Inglis Race Series comes just three weeks after Magic Millions announced that, from next year, it would hold The Syndicate, a 3-year-old and upwards race worth AU\$1 million for graduates owned by a minimum of 20 people, and an AU\$500,000 The Debut for unraced juveniles on its AU\$11.75 million January Gold Coast race day.

Hutch dismissed suggestions Inglis had to respond to Magic Millions' latest race day innovation, instead saying the advent of the Pink Bonus came after canvassing of clients for some time on how to improve its own race series. "We've been focused for a long time on how we would look to develop this series, what additions we would make to it and we have felt, after careful consideration, this was an appropriate step to take," he said.

"We race in a country where the prize money returns to owners are well in excess of AU\$800 million, so there's massive prize money independent of the incentives we or anybody else may offer.

"By the same token, we have a mandate to try to develop the ownership pool and we feel this is an appropriate step that can make a contribution towards doing that."

Hutch believes the healthy competition in the Australian market is what helps generate not only enormous domestic demand for bloodstock but also immense international interest.

"Other jurisdictions around the world look at what happens here with genuine envy," he said. "We are fortunate enough that we've had a number of international visitors looking to participate in our sales as buyers but, similarly, there's an ever-increasing number who are participating as sellers as well.

"You take someone like John and Carolyn Warren (of Highclere Stud), who have a very successful breeding business in Britain. John is part of a Golden Slipper (G1) favorite, Coolangatta, whose dam went through an Easter Yearling Sale and a significant part of his business is his breeding business in Australia.

"I think it's a tremendous compliment to the market here that so many international people want to get involved in it. It's demonstrative of the fact that the market is so well serviced here by the auction houses and by the other various providers."

The timing of the improvements to the Inglis Race Series, which in the past has produced Longines Golden Slipper winner She Will Reign, Wild Ruler, Nature Strip, and Extreme Choice, will generate more interest in the company's opening auction of the 2022 season, the Classic Yearling Sale, which begins at the Riverside Stables complex on Sunday, Feb. 6.

TRAINER BURROWS RELISHING NEW PUBLIC ROLE

A soon-to-be-named 3-year-old filly by Muhaarar is due to be Owen Burrows' first runner in his new guise as a public trainer at Lingfield next month, and he hopes his profile can rise further when classy stable star Hukum appears in Dubai not long after.

Burrows, who assisted the legendary Sir Michael Stoute in Newmarket before starting in Lambourn in 2016 in a private role for the late Hamdan Al Maktoum, has been allowed to open his doors to other owners and has spent the winter on the hunt for new clients.

He has also relocated to Farncombe Down Stables, a 40-box former rehabilitation yard close to his former Kingwood House base.

The pre-Christmas move means his string, who will use the same gallops, no longer have to cross a 60-miles-per-hour country road to access them, which will result in a 45-minute turnaround between lots.

That will create time for an extra lot, although Shadwell cutbacks in staff following the sheikh's death last year has also necessitated that, but Burrows—a former jump jockey for Martin Pipe—is not afraid to muck in, or embrace modern methods of getting his name out there.

"I see people have a winner and film it as it comes

probably everyone else in the country has, bar Charlie Appleby and Saeed bin Suroor.

"It's good and I'm not too far up myself to think I'm too good to pick up a shovel or a fork—if you want it bad enough, you're going to do what it takes.

"We were incredibly well supported by Sheikh Hamdan, but I'm relishing things and want to prove to people I can train anything."

That might even include Burrows going back to his roots with a jumper or two, but also a change in approach from the Shadwell way of targeting pattern performers.

That comprises four Shadwell 2-year-olds—two by Dubawi and one each by Kingman and Siyouni—while Sheikh Ahmed Al Maktoum's familiar yellow silks and the green and white of Ahmad Al Shaikh will also represent the stable, but Burrows, eternally grateful for the support of the Maktoum family and its associates, has made clear his business is open for all.

"Ahmad Al Sheikh said to me that when I start having runners in different silks people will realize I'm not just Shadwell now," he added.

"I'd love to have a few for everyday people or a little syndicate, which is something I'll try to organize. I knew it was never going to be easy to attract owners because everyone is coming off the back of the pandemic, but I thought it might have been easier to buy at the sales. "I went there hoping to buy four and, quite naively, thought if we came away with two I'd be happy. I drove back that night from Newmarket with none, which was a bit of a reality check."

Burrows will attend another sale in Newmarket in the coming days before his first runner in three months in a seven-furlong fillies' novice at Lingfield on Feb. 18, two weeks before multiple group winner Hukum preps at Meydan for the \$6 million Longines Dubai Sheema Classic (G1) at the end of March.

"I'm very lucky I'm not starting from scratch and Hukum goes to Dubai, while Minzaal will go to York for a group 2 in May and then hopefully all the group 1 sprints," he said.

"I've stuck Anmaat, who was second in the Cambridgeshire, in the Lincoln and we'll see how he shapes up in the next month and whether it comes too soon."
