



Tounded in 2009 by Steuart Pittman, the Retired Racehorse Project works to promote retired racehorses for second careers in the sporthorse world. Since its inception, the influence of the RRP has continued to expand by directly impacting thousands of off the track Thoroughbreds through its annual Thoroughbred

Makeover competition. This year's edition was held Oct. 12-15 at the Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington, Ky.

RRP executive director Kirsten Green spoke with BloodHorse MarketWatch to discuss the organization's growth, its importance for the racing and sporthorse industry, and improving awareness of the Thoroughbred breed.

MarketWatch: How did you get your start with Thoroughbreds and then as executive director of the Retired **Racehorse Project?**

Kirsten Green: I grew up doing dressage and eventing and did the obligatory working student thing after high school and I didn't see myself working in a

barn day in and out. It wasn't the kind of lifestyle that I was interested in. I did a couple years of retail and waiting tables and started to build some administrative and operations experience. Steuart Pittman taught somewhat regularly with the woman who owned the barn I grew up at... I knew of him, but I fell into the

orbit of his farm and the people working there about the time that he was thinking of doing something like Retired Racehorse Project. When he started to do events I decided to volunteer. I built a little bit of a side business for myself, braiding and clipping horses.

I decided that I wanted to apply some of my skill set in an equine-specific job and I volunteered enough at that point that Steuart got my resume and said 'You're going to come work here.' That was back in 2014. I came on staff part-time at first and then full-time in 2015. I worked in his basement for a while and I've been here ever since. Even when he stepped away and I worked with Jen Roytz (previous executive director) for a couple of years, I learned a tremendous amount from her and when she decided she was ready to step back, I thought about it some and threw my hat in when they went through the hiring process, and here we are.

MW: How was the RRP this year and what growth have you witnessed since becoming involved with the organization?

KG: This year is a somewhat strange feeling because last year we had the 'mega makeover.' We had to postpone in 2020, so we essentially ran a double makeover last year. I think over the years, we have really worked out our paperwork processes to really start giving us a good deal of insight into how horses are moving from the racing industry to the riding community. We're able to gather a lot of data: what people are paying to acquire horses at the point of retirement, how they're doing it, whether or not they're doing it through an aftercare facility or if they're going through direct track connections, or if they're using

a listing agent like CANTER or any of the individuals who do listing and reselling.

The biggest thing for us has been seeing a 60% increase in the price of acquisition upon retirement since 2015. We're seeing the value come up and over the last two or three years, the number of starts is trending down slightly and total earnings for horses is a little bit higher. We're thinking that it might correlate to a little bit of starting to look at early retirement before the horses are dropping down in the claiming ranks. Another data point that we are always watching is how much these trainers are investing in their horses. To do the Thoroughbred Makeover, these people are acquiring the horses completely independently and carrying them and developing them over 10 months on their dollar for the most part. We will have aftercare organizations that enter a horse that they still own as a showcase of their program, but for the large part these are private individuals either as a part of a business model where they will re-sell at the end or they are carrying them for longtime ownership.

We're currently estimating that at least \$11,000 is the average investment into these horses in routine care, boarding, clinics, shows, that sort of thing. That's excluding the price of acquisition. When you multiply that by the number of horses, we registered about 500 horses here. That's a tremendous amount of private money that's being invested into aftercare that is alleviating the pressure on some of the aftercare facilities so they can serve more horses each year.

MW: How has the RRP directly affected change in the industry when looking at post-racing careers?

KG: The reason why it really resonated with people early on, particularly Thoroughbred Charities of America, Steuart came out and said, this is essentially a market-based approach to aftercare. We've always been very cognizant that aftercare has to have many facets that work together to effectively transition horses. There will not be enough stalls in non-profit agencies to handle all the horses that are retiring each year. You absolutely have to engage the market to help with a portion of that process. For a lot of people, that makes a lot of sense. Aftercare has really been touted as a charitable type of thing

and there absolutely is a charitable element to it, but I think it's important that we understand there needs to be a market-based approach as well. When you are investing in horses and re-selling for the price of their worth, it increases the worth of the horses as well, which contributes to their safety down the road... That's where we really fit in. The Makeover is a big part of showcasing the horse and trying to highlight all of their qualities.

Education is a big part of what we do too. When Steuart founded the organization, in the vaguest sense, he wanted young people to feel like they have support and resources to become better riders for Thoroughbreds, and the Thoroughbreds will benefit from that. It's still very core to what we do as well. We have Off The Track Thoroughbred Magazine, a lot of resources, and our website has educational articles. It's not just geared towards equestrians; we're also trying to help on the racing side to educate people on how they can effectively aftercare. That's an important piece. We need to understand the different avenues and approaches one can take. There's a certain amount that you can do in-house or you could have a particular aftercare organization or re-seller you like to work with. There are so many ways it can be done.

We've done a lot of work to try to consolidate resources for individuals who are coming from the racing side as well. There's still a lot of work to do, but I think RRP can take at least some credit and particularly with these incentive and advocacy programs like TIP and Take 2 as well that are rewarding and incentivize people riding Thoroughbreds that compete. When racing connections realize there's some demand for

their horses and they essentially have a secondary customer in an area where we want to continue to educate folks. The breed will benefit from having a continuum rather than, we're going to race, and then there's whatever else. If we can get to a point where we smooth out that siloing or partitioning of the horses' life, we'll see improvement there as well.

MW: Tell us about the RRP 'Marketplace.'

KG: Since the beginning, we have always offered a sale component. It's completely optional for makeover horses that are completing the process. If you pay a small fee to list your horse, we have a couple of different listing options. We put together a listing on our website and it also goes to print in the fall program issue of our magazine. We share every single horse on social media and we do a lot throughout the event to showcase the horses that are for sale. They have little icons or indicators on entry lists and result sheets. Otherwise, we're not party to the transaction at all, we're just trying to facilitate. We have a dedicated trial space so people can come and shop and identify who they might like to try. They can connect with a trainer, schedule a time to try the horse, we have Hagyard Equine Medical Institute on call to do pre-purchase exams. You could take the horse straight home from the makeover if you wanted; it does happen. We kind of joke about 'bring you trailer!'

MW: What does the future of the RRP and aftercare look like? What are some changes you would like to see going forward?

KG: The Thoroughbred Makeover has made its mark and it's obviously our flagship program, but we would like to do other things. It takes a lot of our resources, so our focus right now is figuring out how to balance that with some things that already exist that we want to give more attention to or other things we want to develop. As an organization, we would like to see better tracking and recognition for the Thoroughbred sporthorse.

As horses exit the industry,
tracking them becomes very difficult.

The Jockey Club has very robust
databases because they're leveraging
different points in the horse's life to be able to report
and that sort of thing is very much absent in the
Thoroughbred sporthorses' life. I think we'd like to
make some contribution there both in traceability on
the racing side and into the racing side. There is not a
lot of tracking of Thoroughbred breeding for sport and
we would like to start telling that story a little better.

For example, Prince of New York who won the jumpers and placed in the hunters this weekend is an absolutely striking stallion that has already covered a couple mares for sport and what registry is going to be acknowledging that. Where do we keep track of his influence down the road...I also see it happen a lot where people have taken their Thoroughbred Makeover mares and bred them out to warmblood stallions; many warmbloods that are influential today have a tremendous amount of Thoroughbred blood. And the Thoroughbred isn't getting a lot of credit for that.

MW: Ultimately, why should people invest in the

Thoroughbred for a second career over another breed?

KG: I think it's the proven versatility and their influence in sporthorse breeds across the board, not just in the warmbloods that are popular in jumping and dressage but the quarter horse side as well. We know there's a tremendous Thoroughbred influence there as well. It's a testament to the breed of its durability, competitiveness, and stamina. All of the things that we need for various types of sport are qualities that the Thoroughbred possesses.

for various types of sport are qualities that the Thoroughbred possesses.

Because they are bred to be competitive on the race side, it translates beautifully into sport and it also translates into pleasure. I've seen so many people that speak of the Thoroughbred heart and that there's really nothing like it. We see it daily at the Thoroughbred makeover with riders who have horses for leisure or at the highest levels of their sport. There's so many people who have made a name for themselves on the backs of Thoroughbreds and

Taylor Made Stallions has set its 2023 stallion roster and fees for the upcoming breeding season, headed by runaway No. 1-ranked Third Crop Sire Not This Time, who will stand for \$135,000 S&N. Taylor Made will further bolster its roster in 2023 with the arrival of grade 1 winner Idol, winner of the 2021 Santa Anita Handicap (G1) and a full brother to multiple grade 1 winner Nest, who will stand his initial season at stud for \$10,000 S&N as a Repole Stable/Taylor Made Stallions Venture.

Not This Time, a son of Giant's Causeway, continues to blaze a trail on the leading sire ranks. The leading Freshman Sire of 2020 by number of winners and black-type winners, and the leading Second-Crop Sire of 2021 in all key statistical categories, Not This Time once again finds himself at the top of the heap this season. In 2022, he boasts a crop-best 12 stakes winners, 25 black-type horses, five graded stakes winners, a pair of grade 1 winners, and progeny earnings on the year of \$10,633,215 thus far. He is the

No. 2-ranked sire of 3-year-olds by earnings, second only to Gun Runner, and he is the No. 1 Sire in North America by percentage of Black-Type Winners for the second consecutive year—8.3%, higher than Into Mischief, Quality Road, Tapit, Uncle Mo, and Curlin.

His top performer on the track this season is leading 3-year-old Epicenter, who has enjoyed a stellar season and is among the leading contenders for this year's Breeders' Cup Classic (G1). Epicenter has demonstrated his class and consistency all season long for Winchell Thoroughbreds and trainer Steve Asmussen, winning the Runhappy Travers Stakes (G1), Jim Dandy Stakes (G2), Twinspires. com Louisiana Derby (G2), Risen Star Stakes Presented by Lamarque Ford (G2), and the Gun Runner Stakes, and finishing second in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) and the Preakness Stakes (G1), amassing earnings of \$2,810,000 in his sophomore campaign.

Not This Time is also represented this year by grade 1 winner Just One Time, victorious in the Madison Stakes (G1) and the Inside Information Stakes (G2) and third in the Derby City Distaff Stakes Presented by Kendall-Jackson Winery (G1) for owners Warrior's Reward and Commonwealth New Era Racing and trainer Brad Cox. Simplification won

the Fasig-Tipton Fountain of Youth Stakes (G2), was runner-up in the Holy Bull Stakes (G3), and third in the Curlin Florida Derby Presented by Hill 'n' Dale Farms at Xalapa (G1) for Tami Bobo and Tristan de Meric and trainer Antonio Sano. Additional graded stakes winners include Midnight Stroll, winner of the Delaware Oaks (G3), and Arzak, who annexed the Jacques Cartier Stakes (G3).

In addition to their performance on the racetrack, progeny of Not This Time continue to command top dollar in the auction ring as well. In Books 1 and 2 at Keeneland September, Not This Time saw 13 yearlings sell from 14 offered. They averaged \$402,692 and included an \$875,000 colt purchased by Repole Stable and St. Elias Stable and an \$850,000 colt bought by Barry Berkelhammer for Albaugh Family Stables. The pipeline is loaded for Not This Time as his 2022 book of mares included the dams of Epicenter, Simplification, grade 1 winner Forte, and grade 3 winner Just Cindy.

Idol, a son of two-time Horse of the Year Curlin out of the stakes-winning A.P. Indy mare Marion Ravenwood, is a full brother to multiple grade 1 winner Nest and he will stand his initial season at stud in the coming year. A track-record setter at 3 and a grade 1 winner the following year, Idol demonstrated an impressive

turn of foot in winning the Santa Anita Handicap. He defeated a contentious field in the historic race, recording a career-best Beyer Speed Figure of 102 and leaving in his wake grade 1 winners Express Train and the previously unbeaten Maxfield in the impressive performance.

Knicks Go, Horse of the Year, Champion Older Male, and Longines World's Best Racehorse of 2021, will stand his second season at stud for \$30,000 S&N. A gate-to-wire winner of the \$6 million Longines Breeders' Cup Classic (G1) at Del Mar—just two clicks off the 18-year-old track record set by Candy Ride—Knicks Go recorded a 112 Beyer in the scintillating score—the fastest Beyer of the 2021 Breeders Cup.

A two-time track record-setter and a grade 1 winner at two, four, and five, Knicks Go banked over \$9.2 million in his sensational racing career. He is the fastest miler in Keeneland history, winning the 2020 Big Ass Fans Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile (G1) in the new track record time of 1:33.85, and is one of just six horses to win two different Breeders' Cup races. He was an effortless winner of the historic Whitney Stakes (G1) at Saratoga, winning by 4 1/2 lengths and earning a 111 Beyer. Knicks Go was also precocious, winning the Claiborne Breeders' Futurity (G1) at Keeneland at two and was runner-up in the Sentient Jet Breeders' Cup Juvenile (G1) at Churchill Downs en route to career earnings of \$9,258,135.

Tacitus, a multiple graded stakes winner and earner of more than \$3.7 million and a son of perennial leading sire Tapit out of Champion Older Female and five-time grade 1 winner Close Hatches, will stand for \$10,000 S&N, the same fee he stood for during his first season at stud a year ago.

The Juddmonte Farms Rowayton \$7,500 homebred won or placed in 10 graded stakes, including five grade 1s and two Classic races. He won the Lambholm South Tampa Bay Derby (G2) in his 3-year-old debut, setting a new stakes record of 1:41.90 for 1 1/16 miles, just 0.15 off the track record. He proved much the best in the Wood Memorial Stakes Presented by NYRA Bets (G2) and was a dominant winner of the Suburban Stakes (G2) as a 4-year-old. He also finished third in the Kentucky Derby (G1) and was runner-up in the Belmont Stakes (G1), as well as the Travers Stakes (G1) at 3 and recorded six triple-digit Beyers during his spectacular career, including a lifetime best 104 in the 2020 Breeders' Cup Classic (G1).

Instagrand, a dominating son of Champion Sire Into Mischief and a \$1.2 million Gulfstream acquisition at Fasig-Tipton's Florida Select 2-Year-Olds in Training Sale, will stand for \$7,500 S&N. Instagrand welcomed first foals in 2022 and his initial book of mares included Longines Breeders' Cup Distaff (G1) champion Blue Prize, grade 1 winner and five-time stakes winner

Concrete Rose, as well as graded stakes horse and grade 1-placed Brill, and Indian Miss, dam of Champion Sprinter Mitole and grade 1 winner Hot Rod Charlie.

A precocious juvenile, Instagrand led wire-to-wire to win the Best Pal Stakes (G2) at Del Mar by 10 3/4 lengths in just his second lifetime start at two. He was named a TDN Rising Star after breaking his maiden by 10 lengths in his debut, clocking five furlongs in :56 flat, just.32 of a second off the Los Alamitos track record. He also placed in the Gotham Stakes (G3) and the Santa Anita Derby (G1) at three.

Like Instagrand, Instilled Regard also saw his first foals arrive this year, and he will stand the upcoming season for \$7,500 S&N. Instilled Regard's first book of mares included multiple grade 1 winner Cambier Parc, four-time grade 2 winner Beau Recall, stakes winner and grade 1-placed Meadow Dance, and Hung the Moon, dam of grade 1-placed Brill.

> During his racing career, Instilled Regard won the Manhattan Stakes (G1T), defeating six graded stakes winners, including grade 1 winners Sadler's Joy and Channel Maker. A four-time graded winner on dirt and turf, Instilled Regard earned \$983,240 during his racing career and he hails from a prolific family—his second dam is champion

mare Heavenly Prize, the dam of Pure Prize.

Rowayton, a multiple grade 1-placed juvenile by Into Mischief, returns for his second season at stud and will stand for \$7,500 S&N. A debut maiden special weight winner at Del Mar, Rowayton was runner-up in the Del Mar Futurity (G1), earning a 90 Beyer, and also placed in the American Pharoah Stakes (G1) to subsequent Champion 2-Year-Old Colt Game Winner.

At 3, Rowayton won an allowance at Belmont Park in the near-track record time of 1:14.94 for 6 1/2 furlongs, earning a career-best 97 Beyer. He placed in the Dwyer Stakes (G3) behind multiple grade 1 winner Code of Honor and was just a neck shy of winning the H. Allen Jerkens Stakes (G1) at Saratoga Race Course, earning a 96 Beyer. NEW HEARING OFFICER NAMED IN MEDINA SPIRIT APPEAL

A new hearing officer has been appointed to preside over the appeal of Medina Spirit's disqualification in the 2021 Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1).

Eden Davis Stephens, deputy executive director of Kentucky's Office of Administrative Hearings, received the appointment over the signature of Shawn D. Chapman, OAH executive director. The

information was obtained by BloodHorse through an open records request to the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission.

Stephens is an attorney whose LinkedIn account describes her as an Administrative Law Judge and says she's been OAH deputy director since July 2020.

Before joining the Office of Administrative Hearings Stephens was,

in reverse order, an administrative law judge for the Kentucky Department of Corrections from 2013 to 2020; in private practice and a hearing officer for the Kentucky Department of Juvenile Justice for two years; a trial attorney handling criminal and involuntary commitment cases for the Kentucky Department of Public Advocacy for 3 1/2 years; and a staff attorney for the Fayette County Family Court in Lexington for a year.

Stephens graduated from the University of Kentucky with a bachelor's degree in political science in 2003. She received her law degree from the University of Louisville three years later. She is a member of the Kentucky Association of Administrative Adjudicators and lists "Causes" on her LinkedIn account as arts and culture, civil rights and social action, economic empowerment, politics, poverty alleviation, science and technology, and social services.

The new hearing officer succeeds Clayton Patrick, who recused himself from presiding over the appeal a few days following the conclusion of a six-day hearing when he learned Clark Brewster bought a yearling partially owned by Patrick and his farm at the Keeneland September Yearling Sale. Brewster represents Amr Zedan's company, one of the parties who appealed the stewards' disqualification of Medina Spirit. Trainer Bob Baffert also appealed.

The KHRC response to the BloodHorse open records request indicates there's been no formal determination of whether the Medina Spirit appeal will be re-tried by Stephens or decided on the existing record; that there are no records of the parties' positions on that matter; and that there's no record that a hearing about any subject has been scheduled.



Lab reports showed
Medina Spirit tested
positive for betamethasone
after the 2021 Kentucky
Derby. Following a
hearing in February
2022, stewards Barbara
Borden, Brooks Becraft,
and Tyler Picklesimer
disqualified the colt and
moved Mandaloun, who's
since been retired, into
first place. Last December,
Medina Spirit died on the
track at Santa Anita on

the morning of a workout. The six-day hearing before Patrick concluded Aug. 30.

Ultimately, the hearing officer in the appeal will decide on a recommendation to KHRC, which is free to adopt or reject it, at which time the losing party is likely to take the matter to court.

In addition to the winner's disqualification, stewards suspended Baffert for 90 days and fined him \$7,500. Baffert served the time after requests for a stay were denied by the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission, Franklin Circuit Court Judge Thomas Wingate, and a three-judge panel of the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

Shortly after detection of the prohibited substance in Medina Spirit and numerous media appearances by Baffert, Churchill Downs banned him from entering horses at its tracks for two years. Baffert countered with a federal court lawsuit. Reports have said Baffert is no longer pursuing the case, which is dormant after being fully briefed, but not dismissed. BH

ZAYAT DISCHARGE GRANTED, BUT CREDIT PROBLEM PERSISTS

A discharge in bankruptcy was granted to Ahmed Zayat late last week by the U. S. Bankruptcy Court for New Jersey, but legal and financial issues still loom.

The bankruptcy case, which is more than two years old and is still not administratively closed, appears to be over for Zayat, who bred and campaigned 2015 Triple Crown champion American Pharoah. A discharge generally frees the debtor from paying pre-bankruptcy debts.

However, debts secured by collateral such as real estate have their own set of rules. A motion that would enable a mortgage holder to seek foreclosure on the New Jersey residence owned by Zayat and his wife Joanne has loomed in the background of the case most of this year.

According to court filings, Zayat has plunged almost \$360,000 behind on a mortgage note owed to Wilmington Savings Fund since March 2021.

The Zayats agreed to a Consent Order entered four days before the bankruptcy discharge that lays out a roadmap to get current.

Under the terms of the order, the Zayats, starting Nov. 1, must make regular monthly mortgage payments of \$19,154.73 and pay an additional \$10,845.27 each month until the arrearage is extinguished.

The order says if any payment due hereafter becomes more than 30 days late, the mortgage holder may pursue its rights in state court, which would include foreclosure. According to the terms of the Consent Order, now that a discharge has been granted to Zayat the mortgage holder need not seek permission from the bankruptcy court to enforce its rights. BH

EXTRA ANEJO, JULIA SHINING DRAW ATTENTION AT KEENELAND

This column highlights the performances of maidens who have made no more than five starts and who either sold for more than \$500,000 at public auction, have siblings that are grade/group winners, or have dams that are grade/group winners. BloodHorse research shows maiden winners in particular who meet these criteria are more likely to go on to be graded stakes winners.

Keeneland

Winchell Thoroughbreds saw a start to their return on investment Oct. 13 at Keeneland when their \$1.35 million yearling purchase, Extra Anejo romped in his debut by 9 1/2 lengths. The Into Mischief colt was bought from the colt's breeder, Mt. Brilliant Farm and Ranch, at last year's Keeneland September Yearling Sale.

Ridden by Tyler Gaffalione, the Steve Asmussen trainee took on a field of nine other 2-year-old maidens in an about seven-furlong contest on the main track. After speeding to the lead, Extra Anejo set fractions of :22.57, :45.19. and 1:10.28 through six furlongs. With no

other rival able to keep pace, the colt was 6 1/2 lengths clear in the stretch before widening that margin even more and stopping the clock in 1:27.17 on a fast track.

While Asmussen is known for having his horses train slow prior to a race, Extra Anejo posted three bullet five-furlong works in September and October at both Keeneland and Churchill Downs.

Extra Anejo is the first foal out of the Irish-bred Hard Spun mare Superioritycomplex. His third dam is 1990 Aston Upthorpe Yorkshire Oaks (G1) and Ribbesdale Stakes (G2) winner and St. Leger (G1) runner-up Hellenic, who is the dam of 2003 Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Turf (G1T) winner Islington and group 1 winners Greek Dance and Mountain High.

Stonestreet Stables continued to reap the rewards of their dual grade 1 winner acquisition, Dream Rush, who went on to produce grade 1 winner Dreaming of Julia for the farm. Stonestreet sold Dreaming of Julia's first foal to race for \$1.05 million to Shadwell Estate during the 2019 Keeneland September Sale. Having already earned more than \$2.75 million, five-time grade 1 winner and 3-year-old champion filly Malathaat proved to be the one that got away.

Stonestreet chose to retain Julia Shining, who lived up to the potential of her full sister in her first outing Oct. 16, taking an about seven-furling maiden race. The daughter of Curlin came from far back after dealing with kickback to make a sweeping move from the five path and win by 2 3/4 lengths.

Ridden by Luis Saez, Julia Shining was next to last in the 12-horse field of 2-year-old fillies as a quarter-mile went in :23.10 and moved into ninth as a half was timed in :46.88. Once she had clear running on the outside, Julia Shining picked up the pace near the three-quarter pole and was two lengths ahead at the top of the turn. Julia Shining stopped the clock in 1:29.43 on a fast track.

Trainer Todd Pletcher has had the honor of being the trainer of Dreaming of Julia, Malathaat, and Julia's Shining.

Aqueduct

A pricy colt made his way to the winner's circle in just his second start as Signator won a one-mile maiden test for 2-year-olds Oct. 14 at Aqueduct for trainer Shug McGaughey. The Tapit colt drew away to a 4 1/2-length victory after coming from near the back of the six-horse field.

Ridden by Javier Castellano, Signator bobbled at the start and was bumped, leaving him in fifth. As a half-mile went in :48.73, Signator made his way

to fourth but really made up ground on the turn, drawing clear in the stretch to finish the race in 1:37.89 on a muddy track.

Bred by Gainesway Thoroughbreds, Signator is the final foal out of the Seeking the Gold mare Pension, who also produced grade 2 winners Annual Report (by Harlan's Holiday) and Thoughtfully (Tapit). With the colt's deep pedigree, Lane's End Racing and West Point Thoroughbreds partnered to purchase Signator for \$1.7 million at the Ocala Breeders' Sales Companies Spring Sale of 2-Year-Olds in Training this year from Eddie Woods. Additional partners Woodford Racing, Gainseway Stable, Phipps Stable, Ken Langone, and Edward Hudson Jr. joined to campaign the colt. BH

A colt (Hip 196) from the first crop of multiple grade 1 winner Vekoma sold for \$150,000 to Glencrest Farm, Dailey Bloodstock, agent, to complete the top three. The chestnut colt was consigned by Stuart Morris, agent for breeders Constance Wickes, Amy Rabanal, and Highclere. Hip 196 is the first foal out of Nice Smile, a Smiling Tiger half sister to multiple grade 1 placed stakes winner Red Vine and stakes winner Breakthrough.

Reeves Thoroughbred Racing purchased back-to-back six-figure weanlings to round out the sale's top five prices. They first went to \$140,000 for a filly (Hip 96) by Maclean's Music from the consignment of RFHF Bloodstock, agent. Reeves struck again on the sale's next offering, going to \$130,000 for a filly (Hip 97) from the first crop of stakes winner King for a Day (Uncle Mo) consigned by Saratoga Glen Farm, agent. Out of the winning Sky Mesa mare Downtown Daria, Hip 97 is a half sister to current New York-bred multiple stakes winner Dream Bigger and stakes placed Downtown At Noon. The filly was bred in New York by Saratoga Glen Farm and Beals Racing Stable.

Purchasing a total of six horses Monday, Reeves Thoroughbred Racing was the leading buyer by gross, spending \$500,000 at an average price of \$83,333.

The sale's top broodmare offering came in the form of Ventriloquist (Hip 38), sold for \$90,000 to MWG from the consignment of Stuart Morris, agent. The 4-year-old daughter of Nyquist was offered carrying her first foal by Frosted. The mare is a half sister to three winners, including group 1 placed graded stakes winner Conquest Tsunami.

Overall, 142 horses changed hands of the 182 on offer for a gross of \$4,599,700, up 25.7% from when 163 horses sold for \$3,657,800 in 2021. The average rose to \$32,392, an increase of 44.3% from \$22,440 last year, while the median doubled to \$20,000.

Consigned by Coulonces, the Haras de Saint-Laurent homebred is out of listed winner Alzubra, which has already produced this season's Australian





ASCOT CHIEF EXECUTIVE CURRIE DEPARTS FOR FAMILY REASONS

Vivien Currie has left her position as chief executive at Ascot after less than six months.

In a short press release, Ascot stated Currie had stood down from her role in order to return to Scotland for family reasons. Alastair Warwick, managing director at the Berkshire track, has been appointed acting chief executive.

Currie's departure leaves Ascot looking for a second permanent chief executive this year after she took over from previous incumbent Guy Henderson, who had been in the role since 2015 and retired at the end of June. The pair spent a short spell working together in the build-up to this year's royal meeting.

Currie's appointment was announced in December last year. She said at the time she was "looking forward to this new, very exciting chapter at Ascot."

She had previously worked as chief executive at Hamilton since 2008, with her tenure coinciding with the development of a £10 million on-site hotel. She was also a non-executive director at the BHA between 2016 and 2019 and served as vice-chair of the Racecourse Association for six years from 2010 until 2016.

Currie received an MBE last November for her services to racecourse management, business, and charity.

Sir Francis Brooke, His Majesty's representative and chairman at Ascot, said: "We understand Vivien's decision and she leaves with our best wishes for the future."

BUICK TO RIDE WITHOUT A FIGHT IN MELBOURNE CUP

rewly crowned champion flat jockey William Buick is set to return to Australia after being snapped up to ride British contender Without A Fight in next month's Lexus Melbourne Cup (G1).

Joint-trainers Simon and Ed Crisford have pulled off a coup to get Buick following a parting of ways between the 5-year-old's regular rider Andrea Atzeni and owner Sheikh Mohammed Obaid Al Maktoum.

William Buick With British and Irish-based jockeys unable to compete in the Melbourne Cup for the last two years due to COVID-19 restrictions, Buick's last ride in the

Flemington spectacular came in 2019 when aboard 2018 winner Cross Counter, who finished eighth having been ridden to victory by Kerrin McEvoy the year before.

With Cross Counter's trainer Charlie Appleby not represented this year, Buick was free to ride and the Crisford team moved to secure his services.

"William is one of the best jockeys in the world with an international record that speaks for itself and when he was available to ride the horse, we were delighted to book him," said Ed Crisford.

Buick has had four rides in the Melbourne Cup, with his best finish a sixth place on Lost In The Moment in 2011. He will take over from Atzeni, who has ridden Without A Fight in all but two of his 17 starts.

Winner of the John Smiths Silver Cup Stakes (G3) at York in early July, Without A Fight is a general 14-1 shot for the Nov. 1 Melbourne Cup and completed his big-race



preparation with a second in a listed race at Newmarket last month before making the trip to Australia.

"The horse traveled down there well and will be in quarantine for another week or so," Crisford said.

> "He's in good form and we're looking forward to him running.

"He had a break over the summer and came back at Newmarket and we were very happy with the run. He's had a nice prep; he's fit and well and goes into the race with every chance."

Crisford added that Jadoomi. who was found to have knocked a joint after finishing third in the Oct. 15 Queen Elizabeth II Stakes (G1) at Ascot, was likely to be put away for the year rather than go to the Breeders' Cup.

The 4-year-old son of Holy Roman Emperor's last two starts

previous to his defeat at Ascot included front running scores in the William Hill Celebration Mile Stakes (G2) at Goodwood and the Clipper Logistics Boomerang Mile (G2) at Leopardstown.
